Donley County leads state in DWI arrests group says

Donley County is number one in the state for DWI arrests in 1997 according to Associated Texans Against Crime, but county residents aren't to blame for that.

When ranked, Donley County leads the state's 254 counties with 24.1 DWI arrests per thousand population. The total arrests for 1997 were 92, and the estimated population of the county is 3,810.

County Judge Jack Hall says the anti-crime groups figures are unfairly reflected on the county's population.

"Only a small percentage of those DWI arrests were citizens of Donley County," Hall said.

Hall said of the 92 arrests, fewer than 20 were citizens of the county and many are just passing through town.

Rob Peebles, who is the research director for Associated Texans Against Crime, said a large share of out-of-town traffic relative to population might explain the high rate of DWI arrests.

"Maybe these counties [with high DWI arrest rates] are simply better at catching drunk drivers," Peebles said. "And of course, all this could be a statistical fluke."

Figures released by the anti-crime group did not include arrest numbers from previous years for comparison.

Duckwall-Alco stores reports record results

ABILENE, KAN. — Duckwall-Alco stores recently announced record results for the first quarter ended May 3, 1998.

First quarter highlights: 18.5 percent increase in net income and 18 percent increase in diluted earnings per share mark 21st consecutive quarter of earnings growth; strong sales performance produces 17 percent increase; a record 21 new stores opened in quarter; revolving credit facility increased to \$85 million and extended to 2001.

Duckwall-ALCO reported its 21st consecutive quarter of year-to-year earnings growth as net income for the first quarter ended May 3, 1998 increased by 18.5 percent to \$1,006,000 from \$849,000 in the prior

year. Diluted earnings per share increased by 18 percent to \$.20 per share from \$.17 per share a year earlier.

Net sales for the quarter increased by more than 17 percent to \$81.1 million from \$69.3 million during last year's first quarter. The company made significant progress on its store opening program during the first quarter, opening 15 Duckwall and 6 ALCO stores for a record 21 new openings. During the quarter, the company completed negotiations to increase its revolving credit facility to \$85 million with a bank group headed by BankAmerica Business Credit, Inc. and Transamerica Business Credit Corporation. The new credit agreement has a three year term.

Glen L. Shank, President and

Chief Executive Officer, said "I am very pleased with Duckwall-ALCO's operating results for the quarter. They are particularly impressive in light of the fact that during the quarter we also opened a record number of new stores. With these new openings, 80 percent of our stores now operate in non-competitive markets."

Shank continued, "Our increased revolving credit facility now provides us with the financial flexibility to continue our aggressive expansion program. We intend to open at least 35 stores during this fiscal year."

Flag Amendment: False Patriotism

The Senate is poised to vote on a proposed constitutional amendment to prohibit flag desecration, a radical approach to a near nonexistent dilemma, akin to the atomic bombing of a city because there may be a felon in the area.

The flag is a beautiful and inspiring banner representing freedom and justice for all Americans. It is freely displayed and can be protected only by us, the people. Each citizen can gaze upon it, and it can mean what our heartfelt patriotic beliefs tell us individually.

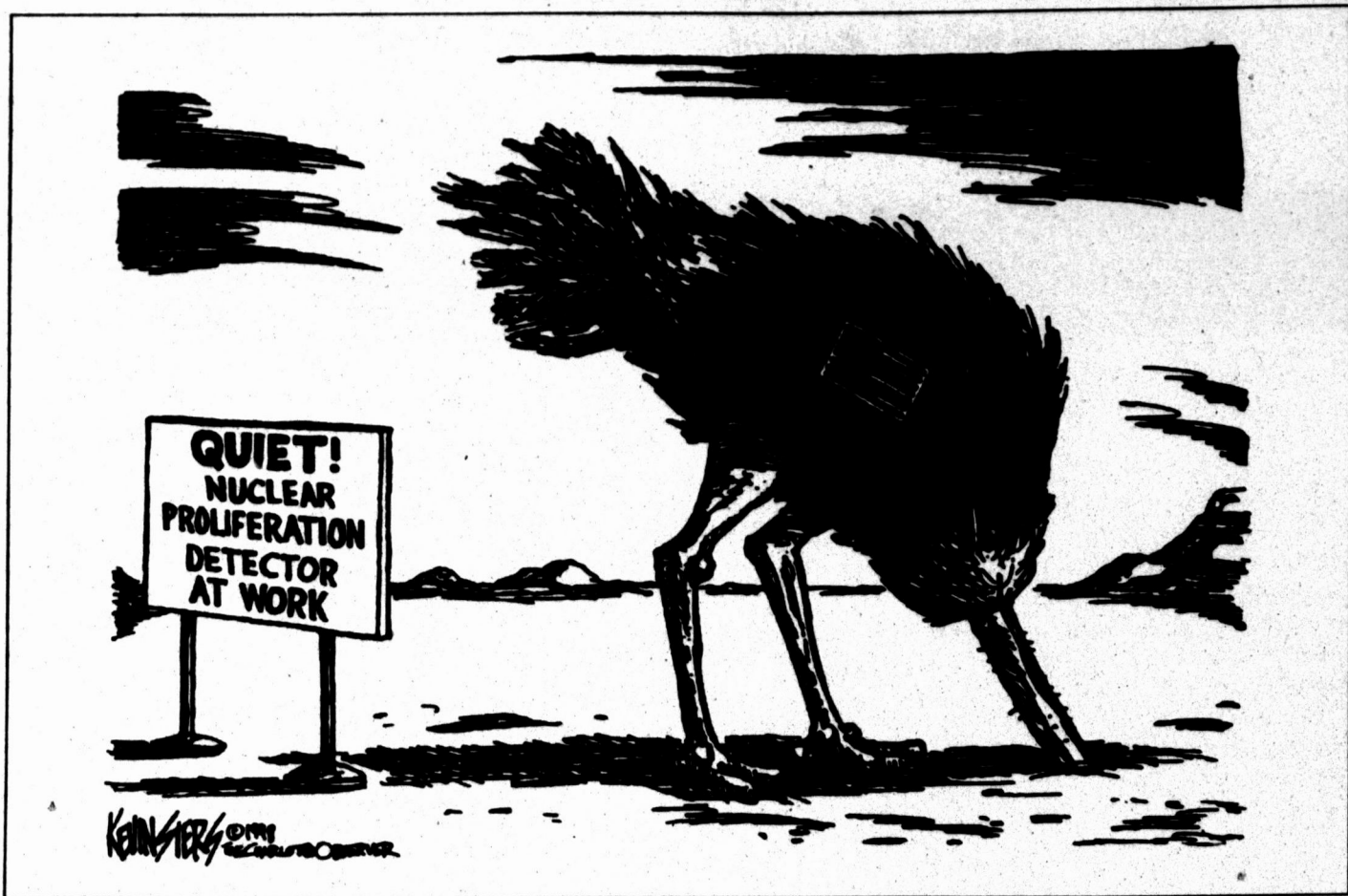
Government "protection" of a nation's banner only invites scorn upon it. A patriot cannot be created by legislation. Patriotism must be nurtured in the family and educational process. It must come from the heartfelt emotion of true beliefs, credos and tenets. Our beautiful flag represents those beliefs, credos and tenets that are outlined by the Constitution of the United States of America.

Yes, the Constitution can be amended. But will an amendment that is in obvious conflict with the First Amendment accomplish a purpose, or will it bring further confusion and discontent, diminishing the beauty the flag has today as it hangs free, revered by us, the people, not ordered by Government edict?

Our nation was not founded on devotion to symbolic idols, but on principles, beliefs and ideals expressed in the Constitution and its Bill of Rights. American veterans who have protected our banner in battle have not done so to protect a "golden calf." Instead, they carried the banner forward with reverence for what it represents - our beliefs and freedom for all. Therein lies the beauty of our flag.

The proposed amendment would stain the image of our banner, as it would no longer wave free, unprotected by Government and freely held high by the citizens of the United States of America. Are we now, after 209 successful and glorious years, going to knuckle under to the pressure of modern lobbying techniques to pursue pseudo patriotism? Organizations exploiting high tech lobbying, spending millions pressuring lawmakers and pandering to a false patriotism, should rethink their priorities and not succumb to the temptation of this "golden calf."

We must not delegate to government our responsibility of citizenship lest we endanger our most precious freedoms. Teaching in the home and in our schools the principles evident in our Constitution and Bill of Rights requires responsibility and sacrifice. That energy enhances pride in our heritage. Respect for our beautiful flag can only come from the hearts of the people. Attempts to bestow honor by government decree upon the flag are idle myths and must not prevail.

National security means keeping our nuclear deterrent safe, viable

When the Cold War ended nine years ago, a lot of people thought that we could relax our defense efforts. The nuclear tests by India and Pakistan over the past two weeks show again that we can't.

In fact, with the spread of nuclear weapons a greater threat today than at any time since the end of World War II, the world is in many respects a

more unstable place now than it's ever been before. We have to make every effort to make sure our own nuclear deterrent is safe and viable.

As it stands now, our nuclear weapons are growing old. They were built to last about 20 years, and are fast approaching the end of their design life.

We no longer build new weapons, and we no longer test the weapons we already have. Instead, we rely on a system based on scientific study and computer simulations to tell us whether or not our nuclear weapons will work.

The only problem is this system's still un-

proven. But it's the only thing we've got since we no longer actually test nuclear weapons, so we need to do all we can to make sure it works. If it doesn't work, we need to be ready to resume nuclear testing, and replace our nuclear weapons if we need to down the road.

The bottom line is the world's not getting any safer and we have to do all we can to keep our Nation secure. For as the recent explosions in India and Pakistan remind us, keeping our Nation secure also means keeping our nuclear deterrent strong.

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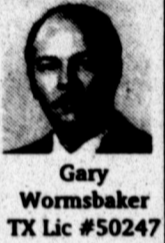

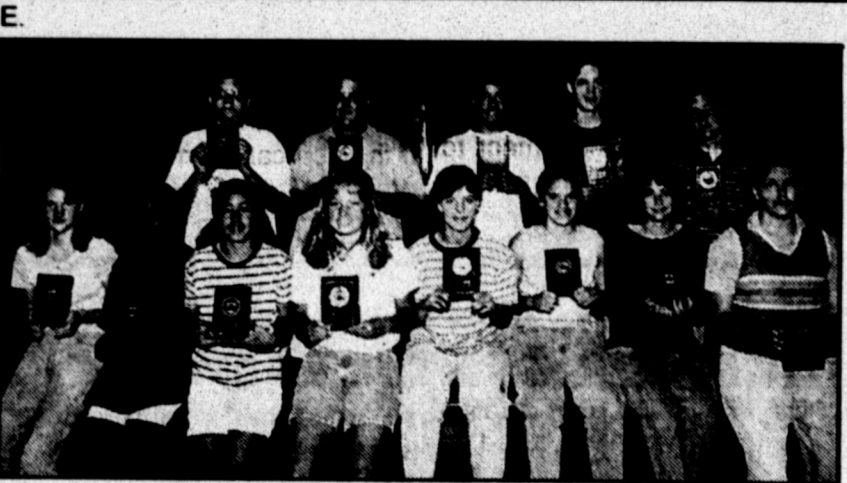

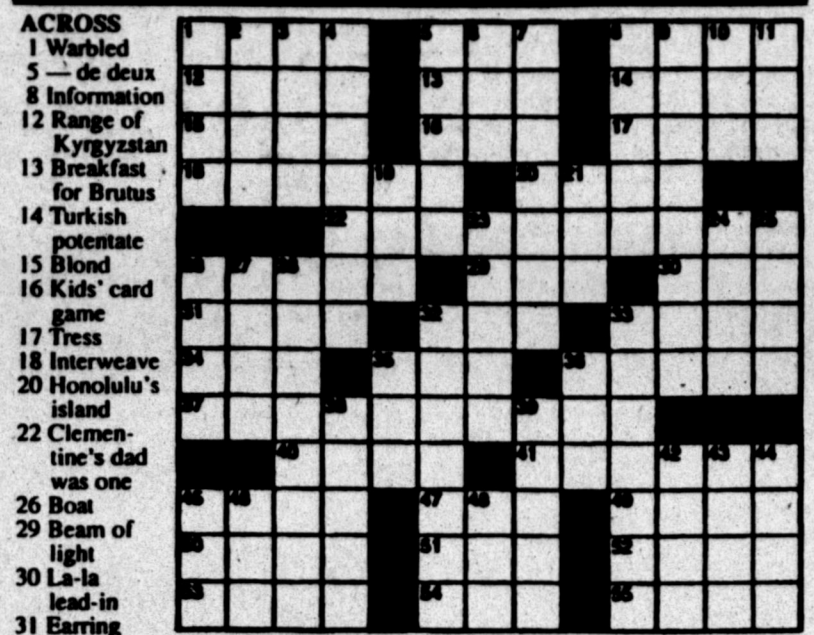
