As many volunteers as possible are needed to help.

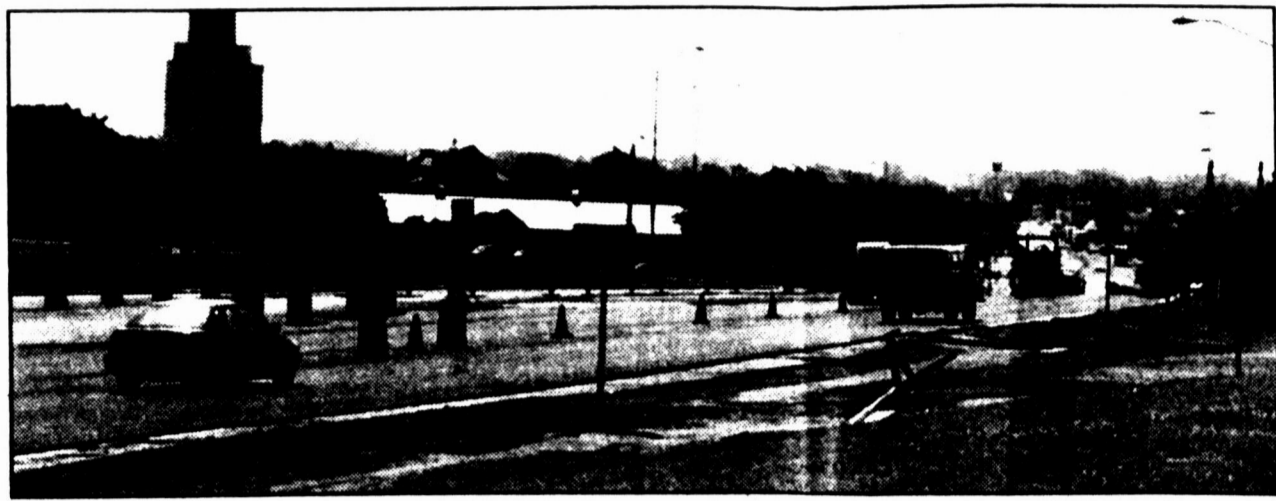

City to open dumpsite on weekends

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen held a regular meeting on May 12, 1998, and new aldermen Mac Stavenhagen, Billy Jack Land, and John Tom Morrow took the oath of office at that time.

Alderman Stavenhagen reported that the Patching Club House sold May 9 during a Public Auction for one dollar above the minimum requested bid. The board approved a motion to pay Jack Moreman \$200 for auctioning the property.

An employee for the dumpsite for week-ends was discussed. The board hired Marion Bollinger to have the dumpsite open from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday for minimum wage beginning June 6, 1998.

The aldermen discussed the con-

dition of streets connecting to the renovated US Hwy. 287 during a called meeting on May 20, 1998.

The streets in question are brick streets intersecting with the highway which need to be raised to meet the new road. The board voted in favor of a motion by Mac Stavenhagen, seconded by Billy Jack Land, to have bricks used on those streets rather than asphalt.

During the board's regular meeting on May 26, 1998, Ernest Johnston reported on the problems with the trash truck. He will be looking into the cost of repair or replacement of the truck.

The board voted to spend \$2,000 from the Motel Bed Tax for advertising July Fourth activities via the

Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association.

Nickless Devin addressed the board concerning a proposed Eagle Scout Project. Devin wants to paint some of the city fire hydrants for his Eagle Project and set up a long term service project for other Boy Scouts to paint the remaining hydrants. The Aldermen approved the project, and the city will provide the paint.

It was reported that repairs were made to a flood structure south of town.

In other city business, the board appointed James Owens to look into the cost of cleaning up some vacant lots and elected Mac Stavenhagen to serve on the Economic Development Board, replacing Shawn Barker.

Plans for the Highway 287 Project this week are for driveways and sidewalks to be completed throughout the project.

Structure work will be performed at the Koogle Street intersection and from "Sam Hill" BBQ to the Western Skies Motel.

Traffic switches will occur as asphalt paving is done on the south bound and north bound lanes. Striping will also be performed.

Curb and gutter work will be completed on the west end of the project, and backfilling will occur throughout the project.

Herring awards scholarship to local graduate

The Herring National Bank has awarded a two-year scholarship to Paula Jackson Davis to attend Clarendon College. The award is worth \$1,000 over four semesters.

Herring National Bank plans to offer this scholarship every year to one graduating senior from Clarendon High School to support local students and the college and to develop and encourage future business leaders for the community.

As Clarendon continues to grow and prosper, a statement from the Herring National Bank says the community will need banking, accounting, finance and general business professionals, and the current pool of qualified applicants is minimal.

To qualify for the scholarship, a graduate must be in the upper half of the graduating class; graduate with a B average; participate in extracurricular activities; be enrolled as a full time student at CC; declare a finance, ac-

counting, business, or agribusiness major. Other conditions apply during the student's time at college.

The initial scholarship is based on merit, high school faculty or other recommendations, citizenship, extra cur-

ricular activities, community service, and an essay. Selection is made by a high school selection group.

An identical scholarship was offered for a Hedley graduate, but no applicants were received.

Texas Cattle Feeders: Checkoff working hard for the industry and independent producers

Livestock markets nationwide recently received petitions requesting a referendum on the \$1-per-head checkoff. The Livestock Marketing Association, which is encouraging auction markets to support the petition effort, has a year to collect the estimated 117,000 producer signatures needed to force a referendum.

"I cannot understand why anyone wants to terminate the beef checkoff," said Bob Sims, president of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association. "Check-off-funded programs are our first and only line of defense, plus the only way we have of being proactive in the marketplace."

However, Sims can understand why some cattlemen might question some of the programs funded with checkoff dollars. "Anytime you have programs that are approved by independent cattlemen, you can expect

disagreement. It's just like selling fed cattle to a packer - we all have our independent ideas on how to sell cattle. Why should we expect to agree on every program approved by state beef councils or the Cattlemen's Beef Board?"

Sims understands independent thinking. However, he says the check-off is one of the best examples he knows of how independent thinkers like cattlemen can come together and develop plans and programs to benefit their industry. "Make no mistake about it - the checkoff is governed and controlled by the cattlemen who pay the money to make it happen."

Here's how it works. State beef councils (45 in all) collect the \$1-per-head when cattle are sold. More than 600 cattlemen serve on state beef council boards. Each state has the option of keeping up to 50 cents of

each dollar it collects to use for in-state beef promotion and education efforts. The rest goes to the Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board for national programs.

The Cattlemen's Beef Board is governed by 111 producers who are designated by the 45 state beef council boards to represent the states at the national level. But it doesn't stop there. The national board sets program priorities based on the recommendations of various industry committees with a combined membership of more than 1,600 cattlemen, dairymen, importers, packers, purveyors, and retailers designated by state councils and various cattlemen's and agriculture organizations. Some of these organizations include the Farm Bureau, Farmers Union, National Livestock Producers Association, National Milk

"We are inviting all cancer survivors to come and participate in this celebration. This lap will honor those who have battled against cancer and will serve as a powerful reminder

of the real reason we hold this fundraiser," said Chris Hurt, Field Representative for the American Cancer Society.

A cancer survivor is anyone who has ever had a cancer diagnosis and is alive today. Those who are unable to walk a lap are encouraged to attend. This event is a great time for celebration of life.

At least 7 million people in the US have survived five years past a diagnosis with cancer.

"The funds raised will enable us to continue our services to cancer patients and families, to offer more educational programs, and to expand cancer research programs. In Donley County last year, 38 cancer patients received 178 services or help through the American Cancer Society," Hurt said.

Ambulance Authority plans to hold Intermediate Classes

In the last few weeks the Associated Ambulance Authority in Clarendon has learned that there is some interest in putting on an Intermediate Class. If you are interested in possibly taking this class, please contact the office at 874-3139 between the hours of 8:00-5:00. For anyone to qualify for this class they must have an Emergency Medical Technician rating through the Texas Department of Health, a current CPR card, and an Anatomy and Physiology class is also required.

The class will probably be held on Tuesday and Thursday nights from 6:00-10:00 p.m., and the class will be limited to fifteen students. The class will consist of 152 hours of classroom, 112 hours of hospital internship, and

60 hours of ambulance internship. Skills requirements for the class are as follows: each student will be required to perform six oral or nasal intubations, two endotracheal suction, ten successful peripheral IV's, two observations of childbirth, and ten medication administration. The cost of the course will be between \$600-700, malpractice insurance will also be required.

At the end of this program, the student will have completed the requirements to sit for the State Credentialing Exam to obtain Texas Certification as an EMT-Intermediate. The student must complete all course requirements before being allowed to sit for the State Credentialing Exam by the course coordinator.

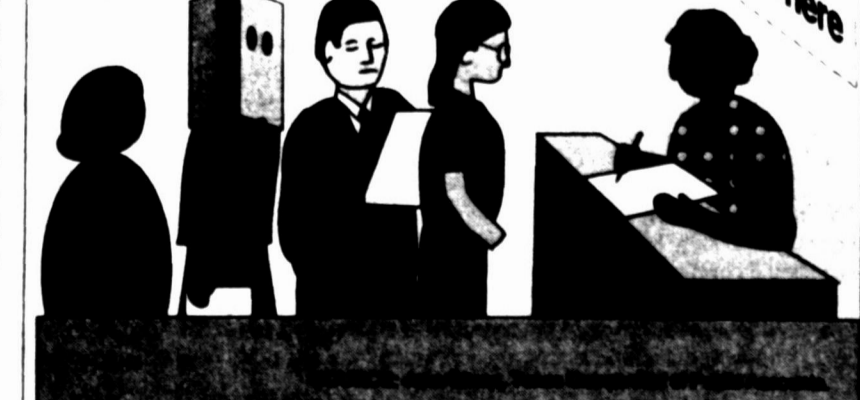

Producers Federation, and the Live-stock Marketing Association. "Every group with a vested interest in the cattle business and its success or failure has a seat at the table. Nobody is excluded and all voices have a chance to be heard," Sims says. "Not all cattlemen will agree on all programs funded by checkoff dollars. But we know that cattlemen support the beef checkoff," Sims says. "In

January 1998, a producer attitude survey showed that 70 percent of cattlemen approve of the checkoff." So what needs to be done about the recall effort?

"Don't sign the petition," Sims suggests. "Let's not waste time and resources arguing about whether or not to have a checkoff. Instead, let's spend our time improving programs."

Men, women of our armed forces are real military strength

We've got the strongest military in the world — there's no doubt about that.

But the real strength of our military doesn't rest with our guns, our tanks, or our planes. The real strength of our military rests with the men and women of our Armed Forces.

From Valley Forge to the Persian Gulf, the

backbone of our national defense has always been our people. Yet in recent years, the federal government has been letting them down. Nowhere is that more true than in the area of military retiree health care.

The federal government promised retirees they'd receive free health care for life if they served our Nation for 20 years. But with base closings around the country and declining defense budgets for 14 straight years, Washington is backing off that promise and, as a result, a lot of retirees are feeling betrayed.

Last week, the House passed an amendment I

introduced that would help move us back the other way. In a nutshell, my plan would look into giving military retirees access to the same health coverage that civilian federal retirees currently have.

This plan isn't a cure-all to end-all by any means. But it is a step in the right direction and something that will help the federal government fulfill its commitment to military retirees and their families.

It's also something that will help us preserve the health and well-being of the backbone of our national defense — the men and women of the United States Armed Forces.

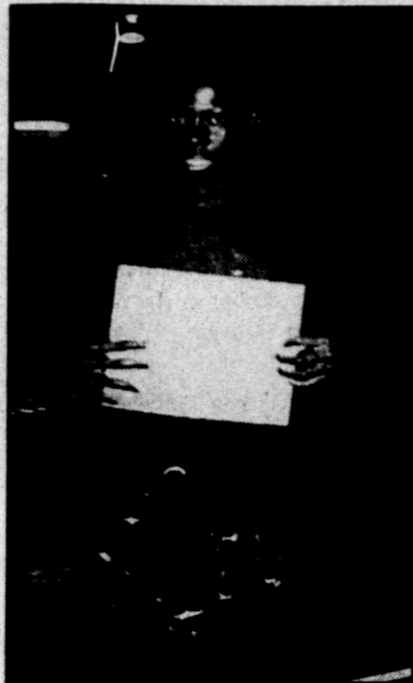

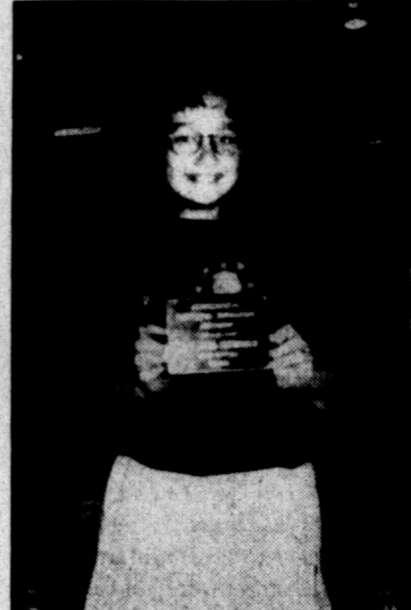

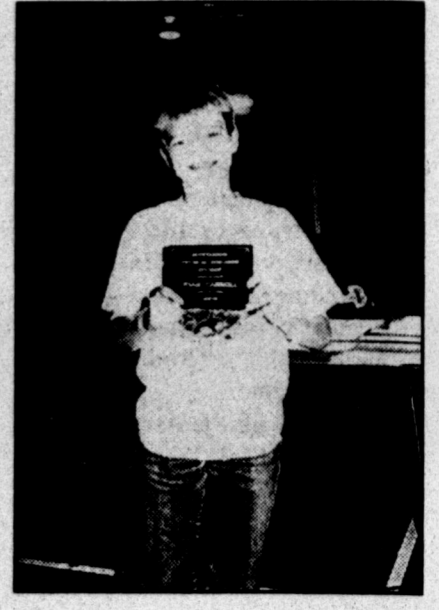

Presidential Education Award winners from Clarendon Elementary.

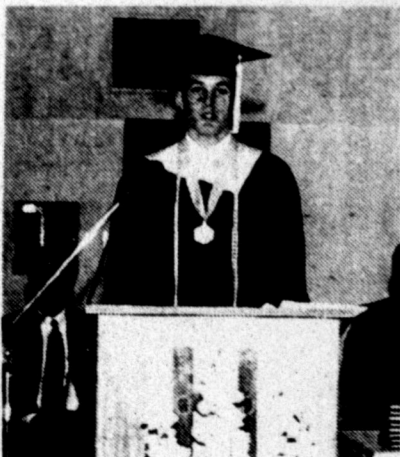


Enrollees in the Duke University Motivation for Academic Performance Program from Clarendon Elementary.

"Texas is a lot different than Labrador," he said. The junior Johnson speaks with a definite accent, but it wasn't Texan.

During the month of April, the Saints' Roost Museum welcomed 115 visitors, 26 of them from out of town. Thus far in May we've greeted 135 visitors from as far away as Delaware, California, Tennessee, Oregon, Kentucky, and Maine.

Among the out-of-towners visiting in May was Linda Naylor of Fort Worth. Although she lives in the Metroplex area, Linda isn't exactly a stranger to Clarendon and Saints' Roost, she was born here.

"I brought my kids back for a visit and showed them what was then the delivery room," said Linda. "Of

course now it is the buggy room with dirt on the floor. My kids are convinced that I was born so long ago hospitals had dirt floors."

Dandy Donations
Winnie Mandril of Amarillo came by to drop off a large size spinning wheel donated to the Museum in the name of Letha Warren Welborn. The spinning wheel is a valuable addition to our collection and is much appreciated. Ms. Mandril said that although she now lives in Amarillo, she grew up here in Clarendon and still considers it "home."

A member of our Board of Directors, Lester Meyers, donated a stack of property deeds dating from 1881 to the Museum collection. It is amazing to look over these documents, all of them hand written, including copies, and realize the amount of work that went into keeping up with the daily business of government. It is no wonder teachers stressed the importance of hand writing in school a few years ago, they had little idea that technology would make handwriting nearly obsolete by the year 2000. These old documents are not only important for what they record, but for the labor and care that went into creating them.

A Glimpse Into The Future

Be sure to make plans to drop by Saints' Roost museum after the Fourth of July Parade and before the Rodeo. The Museum is planning the traditional Open House and sloppy joe supper, but this year there will be a surprise in the way of entertainment. Can't say exactly what is in the works by the Independence Day Committee, but better not miss it. Afterward it will be the talk of the town. By Open House time our Model T Ford will be on exhibit in the Depot and all of our recent acquisitions will be on display. Be sure to look for the Saints' Roost float in the Fourth of July Parade and drop by the booth on the courthouse lawn for a visit.

Saints' Roost Psychic Reading
We have at least three ghosts residing here at Saints' Roost according to Molly Redfern from Anadarko, Oklahoma, who described herself as a "psychic reader" of the Osage Indian tribe. Redfern said that she visited the Saints' Roost web site and got strong feelings that she should pay a visit. She dropped by on the

Sunday before Memorial Day and spent an hour or so collecting the "psychic emanations" from the building before passing judgment.

Ms. Redfern said that there were three definite spirits residing in this building. One, a young Native American woman, died a very long time ago, before the white man came. Both of the other spirit presence are men, one a former cowboy who worked for both the JA and RO ranches before becoming a rustler. Ms. Redfern had the feeling that stealing led to his violent death. The

other spirit was very shy and although he made his presence known to the visiting psychic, he would not let her "read" any other information about himself.

"I do not know why these three chose to reside in this particular place," Redfern said. "But they seem content to remain where they are and have no plans for moving on."

Redfern also said that there were positive signs pointing to at least one more "spirit" in the building, a more recent spirit, who wished to remain anonymous.

This is a very commonly asked question this time of year. Yellow trees, shrubs and lawns seem to be a way of life in this area where we have high pH soils. Most yellowing of plants, if pests are not involved, is caused by lack of iron in the plant. Iron deficiency in a plant can be caused by the plant's inability to utilize available iron in the soil or simply the lack of iron in the soil. Because most soils in Texas contain an abundance of calcium which cause an alkaline soil condition, many of the minor elements such as iron are not in a usable state for plant uptake even if they exist in the soil.

Some of the most susceptible plants are: maple and honey locust trees, grapes, peaches, pears and apple trees. Trees left untreated can become yellow and eventually may die.

The best solution for this problem is to plant adapted native plants or plants that can tolerate

higher pH levels. However, that does not take care of the problem that currently exists. Trees/plants will respond to foliar or leaf applied chelated iron and green up to a degree. This is a short term treatment and can be used at this time of year to give your plants a feeding and reduce their stress so that some other pest does not attack and cause death.

In addition, apply to the soil, by poking holes under the tree at the drip line every three to four feet, Iron Sulfate. Pour iron sulfate into each hole so that you apply the recommended amount according to the label. This feeding is slower acting but works in two ways.

First the Sulfate changes chemically into sulfuric acid and reduces the pH level, making iron more available.

Secondly, iron is being added as a supplement. This procedure works well if applied in the fall.

Results will not be seen until spring. By applying this now you are getting a jump on the process and maybe help your tree go into winter in a more healthy state.

As was stated earlier, the best solution to iron deficiency problems is to plant adapted trees. Some trees that are well adapted to this area are; Pecan, Bradford Pear, Red Oak, Chinese Elm, Siberian Elm, Fruitless Mulberry, Chines, Pistachio, Red Bud, Sycamore, Cedar Elm, Juniper, Mexican Pin-yon Pine, Black Pine, Washington Hawthorne, Bur Oak, Shademaster Hackberry, Honey Locust, Blue Spruce, Afgan Pine (Mondell), Austrian Pine, and Scotch Pine.

Trees need our help. We have introduced them into this area. Some have been able to survive others have not. Select those trees that have the best chance of survival and treat them with care.

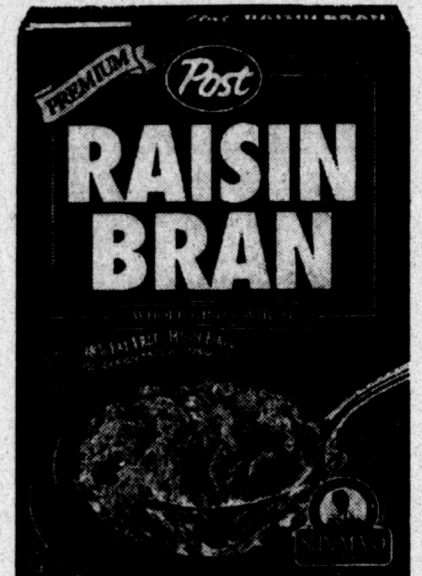
