## Air Age Educational Program To Be Presented Here March 13-14th

A new deal in education is being launched through a project sponsored jointly by the State Department of Education and the Texas Aeronautics Commission. It is designed to bring about through directed courses of study a better understanding of the Air Age in which we are now living. It is aimed at showing teachers and schools from the primary through the collegiate grades how they can adjust their curriculums to meet the demands made upon them by the Air Age.

March 13 and 14th Miss Ziggy Hunter, inspector from the Texas Aeronautics Commission, will bring the Commission's Mobile Unit to Clarendon. The Mobile Unit includes a trailer, a school Link trainer which is set up like a real airplane, and other teaching aids. Schools for sixty miles around Clarendon have been invited to attend the program and will be given stated hours to be here at the local gym.

No effort is being made to force flight training courses into the present curriculum of Texas schools. The program deals rather with making available to Texas teachers through institutes and class presentations, sources from which Air Age Education material may be obtained and in pointing out to these teachers the various methods which they can use to enrich their present curriculum.

## Wheat Growers To Organize At Groom March 15

According to Lee Shaller, vice president of the Donley County Farm Bureau, arrangements are in progress for a meeting to be held at the American Legion Hall in Groom for Donley & Gray county wheat growers March 15th at 2:30 p. m. for the purpose of organizing a Wheat Growers Association.

"It is high time that wheat men take the responsibility of doing something for themselves instead of taking a free ride on what others might think is best for us, even though their intentions might be good enough, sometimes these principles are not applicable to our best interest," stated Mr. Lee Shaller, vice president of the Donley County Farm Bureau.

He pointed out that it was the hope of the new organization to have the co-operation of the elevator men to collect 1/4 of 1c per bushel from the wheat producers with the understanding that if there is any objection from the individual, that the amount will be refunded upon written demand. The money collected will be used for marketing and research purposes. That is to find more uses for our wheat as well as developing a more adaptable wheat for particular localities.

At the meeting above, a president for Donley county will be elected, and it is to the interest of all wheat growers to attend this meeting and all work together, Mr. Shaller added.

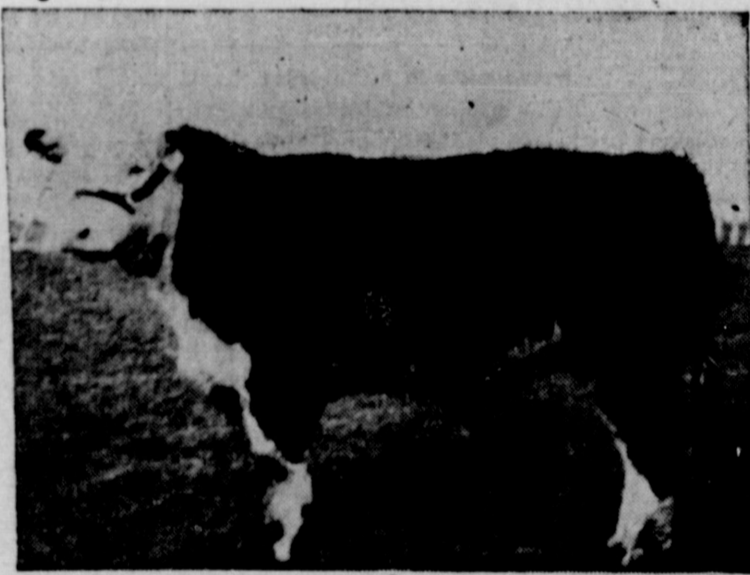

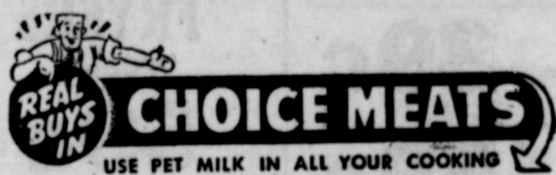

Washington and Jefferson were kindred spirits in their love for trees, and the "Jefferson Pecans" are a living illustration of this congeniality.

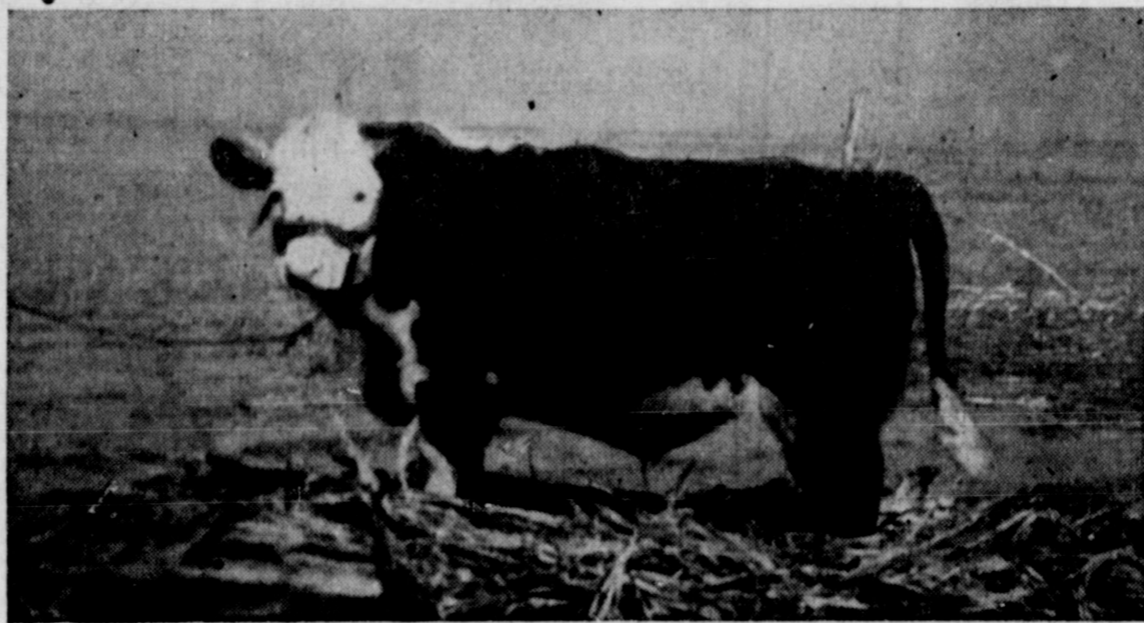
If there is anything worse than being stuck with a speaker that doesn't know when he or she is through - - I doubt that I could think of it right now.

**French And German Orphans Receive CARE Packages**

Proverbial Texas hospitality and friendship recently spread across the sea, when more than 300 French and German orphans became the recipients of 77 CARE food packages, donated by Governor Allan Shivers' Special CARE Committee.

The committee was founded by the Governor last fall as the Lone Star State's first organized move to aid CARE in its far-flung work abroad. In four years, the cooperative, non-profit welfare agency has distributed American aid in form of more than nine millions of its food and textile packages, valued at 88 million dollars, to the needy of a score of overseas countries. With the active help of local CARE Committees and outlets at Houston, San Antonio, El Paso and Fort Worth, the Governor's Committee raised the money

to purchase the CARE food packages for the two European orphanages. That these packages were delivered by the CARE missions in France and Germany during the Christmas season added greatly to their value as an American good-will gesture.

At the Orphanage of St. Louis in Paris, the arrival of the CARE packages was greeted with a song of their own composition by the 133 boys, six to fourteen years old. "Thank you, thank you so much, dear American friends," they chanted as the packages were brought into the mess hall.

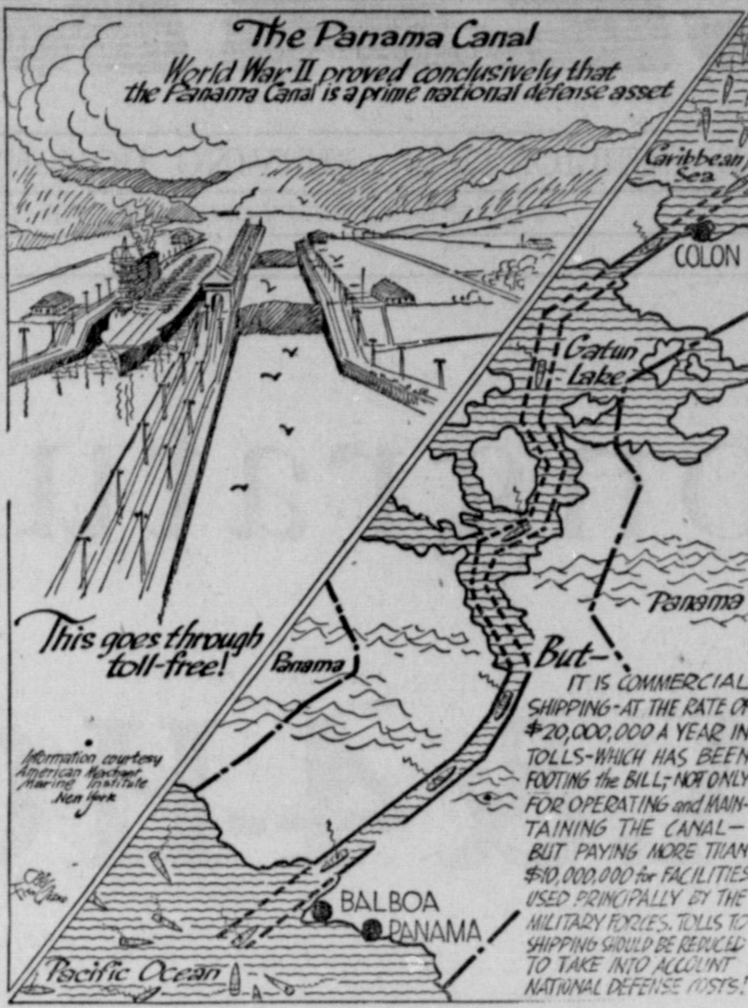
The orphanage, conducted by seven Sisters of the Order of St. Vincent de Paul, is nearly a hundred years old and prides itself on having never turned a needy child away. Many of the youthful charges of the seven hard-working Sisters, who double as cooks and teachers, are foundlings and children abandoned by their parents. "One of the most tragic results of the war," the Mother Superior told the CARE mission

chief, "was that many families and homes were broken up." Thanks to CARE's Texan friends, the 133 youngsters could now enjoy delicacies many of them had never known. Jam appeared with their morning milk and bread. Magnificent cakes were produced by the Sisters from the flour, powdered eggs, sugar and shortening of the CARE packages. Every meal was enriched by the addition of some CARE delicacy.

"The fifty wonderful CARE packages mean even more to us Sisters than they do to our little boys," the Mother Superior declared. "All seven of us know from bitter experience what it is to worry about feeding a household of growing children on very slim rations."

The remaining 27 Texas CARE packages went to Marienfelde Orphanage, located close to the border of the Russian Zone in West Berlin. A large room in the basement of the former factory building has been converted into an

### 1950 State Fair To Be Gigantic Mid-Century Exposition

The 1950 State Fair of Texas will be a gigantic Mid-Century Exposition, a hats-off salute to the first half century and an eye-popping preview of the second, State Fair President R. L. Thornton has announced. Dates of the 1950 fair will be Oct. 7-22.

"Since the 1950 fair takes place at very nearly the end of the first half century, this will be a good time to pause and take a refreshing look at what has been accomplished and appraise the challenge of what lies ahead," Thornton said.

"We have arrived at a fascinating moment in history, and the 1950 fair will provide an unsurpassed view of the achievements of the Twentieth Century, as much of it as we can see at this time."

To support the mid-century theme, the grounds will be given an extensive job of face-lifting, plans reveal. The front entrance will be rebuilt as a "pylon of time" and a "court of the decades," with an outdoor "lobby" extending into the Esplanade.

Decorations on the Esplanade will include dramatic theme stanchions suggested by various types of time instruments used down the centuries.

Already announced for the 1950 fair are South Pacific as the Auditorium attraction, and the All-American Jersey Show, America's largest cattle show.

Museums of the civic center will have special displays. One museum already has its mid-century show in advanced stages of preparation.

"Every facility on the grounds is being pressed into service for the 1950 fair, which is destined to be the largest, most mass-appealing ever produced in Texas," the fair official said. "All special events, including a music festival, pageants and daily parades, will be keyed to the mid-century idea."

"It will be a great spectacle, the likes of which have never been seen before and perhaps will not be seen again for another fifty years."

### Cold Storage Holdings

AUSTIN — Cold storage holdings of dairy products in January 1949, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

With the exception of a 2-per cent increase in cheese of all varieties, all holdings of dairy products showed decreases. Plastic cream fell 65 per cent; fluid cream, 43 per cent; creamery butter, 15 per cent; and evaporated and condensed milk, 4 per cent.

In comparison with January 1949, cold storage holdings of dairy products rose 15 per cent in January 1950. Holdings of evaporated and condensed milk rose 54 per cent, while cheese of all varieties stepped up 26 per cent. On the other hand, plastic and fluid cream fell 94 and 87 per cent, respectively.

Meat and meat products presented the largest increase in cold storage holdings in January from December—39 per cent; followed by fresh vegetables, 33 per cent; hides and pelts, 31 per cent; and frozen vegetables, 20 per cent.

January-to-December declines in holdings were registered by shelled eggs, 75 per cent; dried

and evaporated fruits, 29 per cent; frozen eggs, 25 per cent; frozen fruits, 11 per cent; poultry, 10 per cent; and dried eggs, down fractionally.

In comparison with January 1949 holdings of fresh vegetables rose 91 per cent in January 1950. Other increases were recorded by frozen vegetables, 46 per cent; poultry, 19 per cent; and nuts, 17 per cent.

Yearly decreases were registered in holdings of meat and meat products, 36 per cent; hides and

pelts, 28 per cent; frozen fruits, 21 per cent; and dried and evaporated fruits, 16 per cent.

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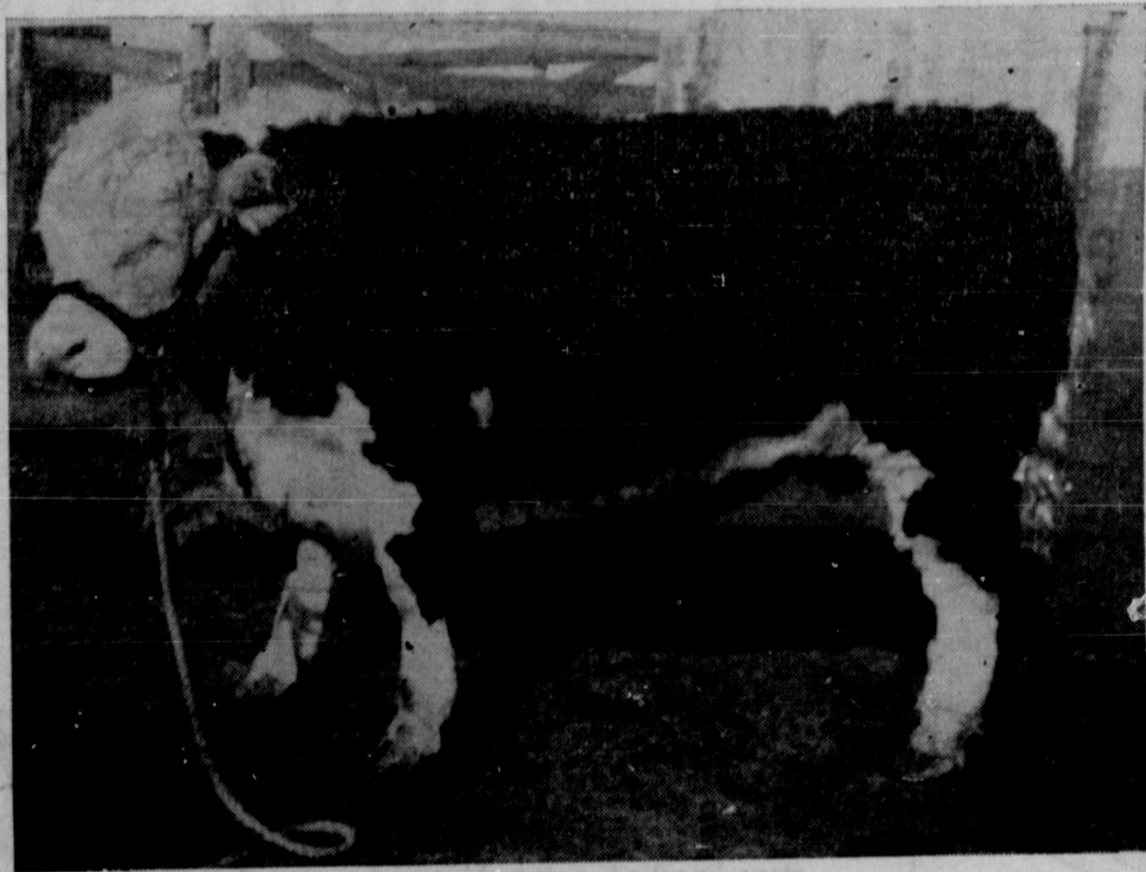

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# AMERICAN LEGION NEWS

**EDITOR'S NOTE** — In his third article on recommendation of the Hoover Commission on veteran affairs, Commander Mike McCully discusses the proposed new United Medical Administration and how it would affect the disabled or sick veteran.

**VETS OR GUINEA PIGS?**

The present Veterans Administration hospitals have difficulty in providing beds for all veterans among the nation's 19,000,000 in need of hospitalization. The last VA report showed 19,717 veterans on the waiting list unable to get a hospital bed! Today the competition for sufficient VA beds is often a trial for sick veterans unable to afford private hospital treatment.

The Hoover Commission proposes to take away the exclusive right of veterans to their hospital facilities by merging the VA hospital and medical service with the Army and Navy Hospitals and the U. S. Public Health Service in gigantic new federal agency to be known as the United Medical Administration.

Under the proposed UMA set-up, The American veteran would have to compete for hospital beds with the Merchant Mariner, the civil service employee and the personnel of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps and their dependents!

The veteran is in overwhelming majority. There are 19,000,000 of him! Yet he would not have his exclusive hospital facilities. The proposed UMA would be a clear case of the tail wagging the dog!

Under the UMA Plan, veterans, active members of the armed forces and their families, members of the Merchant Marine, and civil service and other government employees all would be hospitalized under different and completely dissimilar authorizations.

A veteran is done with the armed forces. He must no longer be accounted for on a morning report, or on a sick report, or on a clothing report or on a pay record. But the active members of the armed forces admitted to UMA Hospitals all would have to have all of these records kept. Imagine the confusion in the hospitals.

**Costly Merry-Go-Around**

Under the Hoover Commission Plan, a disabled or sick veteran requiring hospital treatment would have to go to the VA and make application.

The VA, no longer having hospitals or doctors of its own, would send him to the United Medical Administration, thus ending "one stop" service! There he would be examined to determine whether need for hospitalization was indicated! All his records, of course, would be back at the VA.

If the UMA finds the veteran should be hospitalized, his admission to a hospital would then be contingent upon availability of beds NOT OCCUPIED BY NON-VETERANS!

The American Legion feels this whole Hoover Plan of dealing with the veteran needing hospital

care is the entering wedge to divorce the American veteran from his identity as a veteran. He would go back to being a serial number again as he was in time of war.

That's how this one change would affect the veteran. It would make him a founding! Now how will it affect you and me as taxpayers?

Setting up of such a colossal new federal agency as the proposed United Medical Administration would involve inevitably the creation of thousands of new jobs.

It would mean the training of many inexperienced new officials, a costly operation in time and money.

It would involve many duplicating functions and still worse, many specialized functions—one

special system for each of numerous classes of patients.

It would mean a huge mass of needless paperwork, the routing of case folders back and forth and back and forth.

Such ramifications would not work for economy!

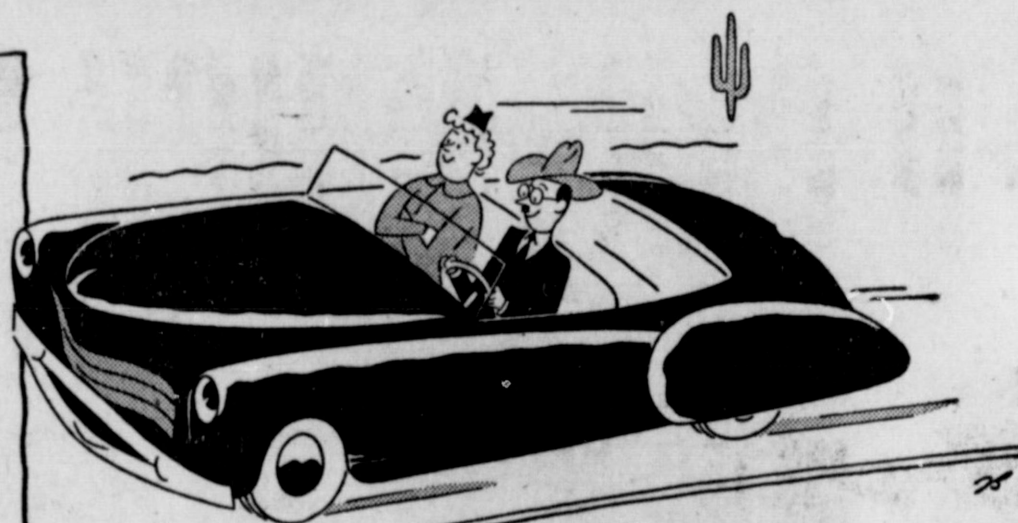

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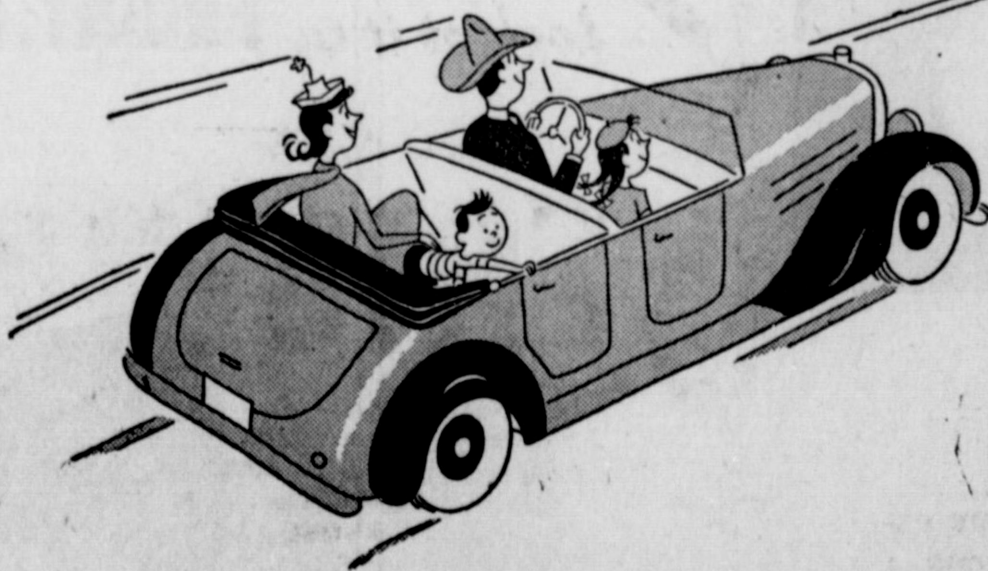

Jesus said: "I am the vine, and ye are the branches. He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit; for without me ye can do nothing. If man abide not in me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered; and men gather them, and cast them into the fire, and they are burned." Jno 15: 5, 6. Why charge them to abide in him, if they could not do otherwise than abide in him? and why liken them to withered and dried

branches which men gather and cast into the fire to be burned, if by reason of the immutability of the decrees of election they could not do otherwise than persevere to the end and be eternally saved? Paul tells Timothy of "Hymeneus and Philetus; who concerning the truth have erred, saying that the resurrection is passed already; and over throw the faith of some." Tim 2:18. Here were persons who had faith, and that faith was overthrown by false teachers.

Surely, these persons were of the elect, for the creed tells us that "The grace of faith, whereby the elect are enabled to believe to the saving of their souls, is the work of the Spirit of Christ in their hearts." 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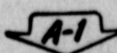
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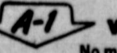
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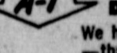

### TB Control Program Is Sore Spot On Texas Public Health Record

The increasing seriousness of tuberculosis is pointed out in a survey sponsored by the H. E. Butt Foundation and conducted by The University of Texas Institute of Public Affairs.

There are an estimated 50,000 persons with TB in the state, the survey reports. They are eating and, in some instances, working in cafes, riding buses, sitting in theatres, and daily threatening the health and lives of fellow citizens, the survey emphasizes.

Although the state can boast of great economic wealth, its TB control program is a sore spot on its public health record, the survey asserts.

Basing its facts on interviews during a six-month period with more than 150 persons close to the TB problem, the survey claims state facilities are inadequate to handle existing cases and urges immediate legislative action before additional citizens are infected.

The current special session of the Legislature is considering the TB problem, along with the problems of mental hospitals. While inadequate facilities have forced mental hospitals to crowd their patients in close quarters, TB hospitals have turned away cases and sent infectious persons back to their homes to endanger their families and friends, the survey indicates.

A comparison of Texas' facilities and practices with those of other states in the survey shows Texas in a very poor light.

The survey repeatedly emphasizes that TB can be prevented if active cases are hospitalized. Tex-

ans pay more now for the cost of additional cases than it would cost them to increase state facilities and cure tuberculosis persons before they begin their chain of infection.

Dependent children of parents who die of TB are supported by the state through the Aid to Dependent Children program. Adequate care for the parent might have prevented his death and saved the cost to the state of supporting his children, the survey states.

To combat the spread of TB, the survey recommends that steps be taken to increase hospital facilities, and existing policies be broadened to include admission to state hospitals of all infectious persons regardless of age, and

provision for their hospitalization until they are non-infectious.

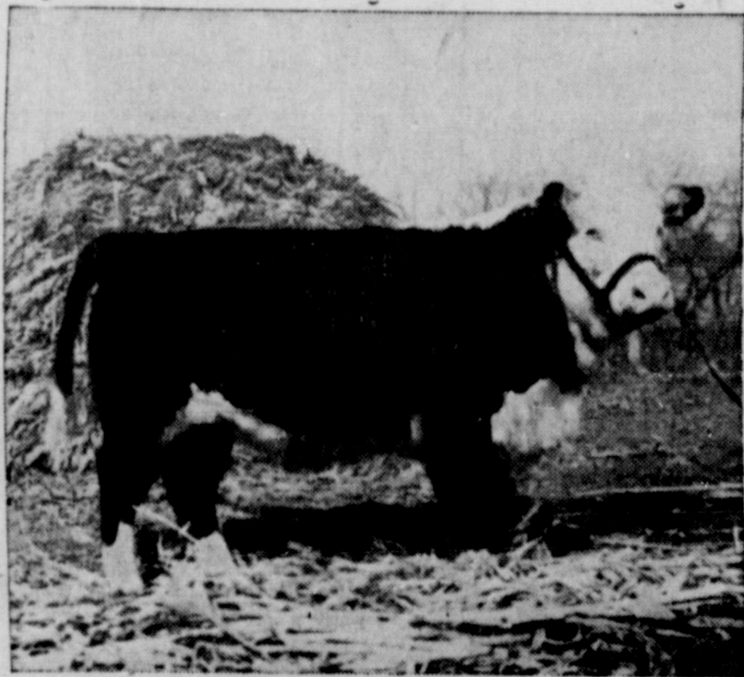

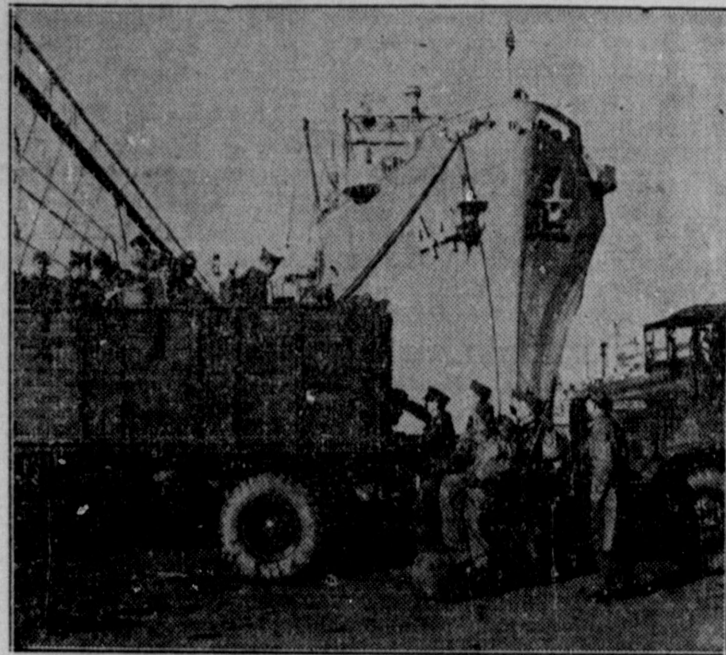

**Texas Retail Sales**  
--- Preliminary

AUSTIN—Preliminary tabulations placed Texas retail sales at \$360,000,000 in January 1950, a 28-percent drop from December, 1949, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported. In comparison with January 1949 all establishments registered a 13-percent gain in January 1950.

Durable goods store sales dropped 9 percent from December and nondurable goods store sales slid 41 percent. In comparison with January 1949, durable stores tallied a 31-percent rise in contrast to a 1-percent dip for non-

chandise stores showed a 50 percent decline and florists presented a 41 percent drop.

Apparel store sales sagged 50 percent from December, as declines ranged from 42 percent for shoe stores to 60 percent for "other" apparel stores. January sales of men's and boys' clothing stores fell 54 percent, and family clothing store sales lagged 52 percent behind December.

"Other" apparel and shoe stores increased their January 1950 sales over a year earlier by 6 and

4 percent, respectively, while other types of apparel stores reported small decreases.

From a year earlier, sales of drug stores and eating and drinking places gained 4 percent from January 1949, and department stores 3 percent.

Food store sales sagged 18 percent from December and 5 percent from January 1949. Grocery stores without meat showed decreases of 23 and 7 percent and combination stores turned in declines of 15 and 6 percent, respectively.

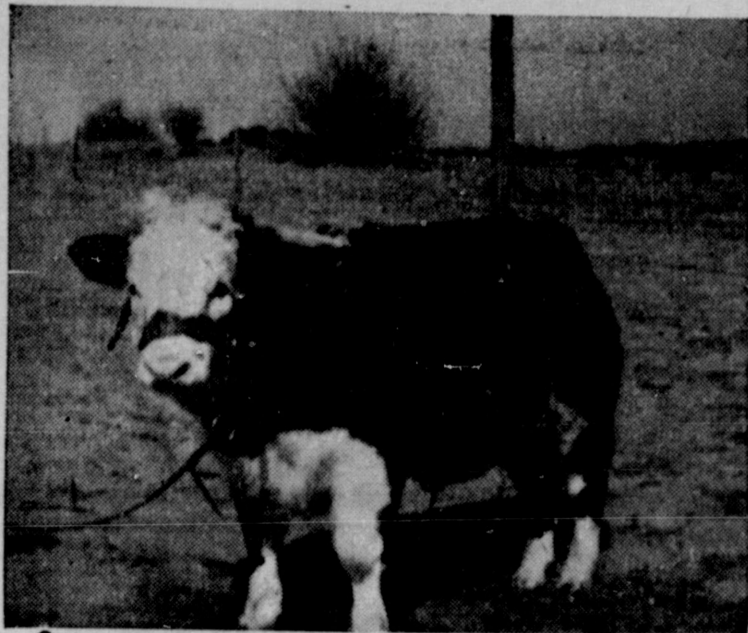

Motor vehicle and farm implement dealers, with advances of 8 and 5 percent respectively, showed the only December-to-January increases among both durable and nondurable goods stores.

From December, January sales of jewelry stores dropped 77 percent, household and appliance stores 48 percent, hardware stores 38 percent, and furniture stores 31 percent.

As compared with January a year ago, all durable goods stores

except jewelry (down 1 percent) registered sales increases. January 1950 sales of motor vehicle dealers climbed 39 percent, lumber and building material dealers 28 percent, furniture stores 19 percent, and household and appliance stores 13 percent.

All nondurable goods stores reported lower sales in January than in the preceding month. Sales decreases varied from 2 percent in office, store, and school supplies to a 57-percent drop for department stores. General mer-
