health care system. Home health care is a critical and important part of our health care system. But it's also become one of the fastest growing parts of Medicare, and, studies show, one of the most abused. The reforms passed last summer were aimed at slowing down this growth, and clamping down on this abuse.

Unfortunately, the agency which runs Medicare - an agency called the Health Care Financing Administration, or HCFA - has taken some of these reforms and turned them on their head.
I've been in touch with HCFA a number of mes about its handling of these changes and to
express my concem that some people in rural ar-

So this past week, 1 threw my support behind a bill to delay the establishment of a new home health payment system until October of this year. Most everyone agrees that a new payment system is needed. But the way HCFA is doing it is hurting efficient home health We've poorly run.

We've got to make reforms in the home healt way that makes sense, and preserves home health benefits to the people who need them the most.
