





"When a worker has social security taxes deducted from his pay he is paying premiums on an insurance policy. This insurance helps to provide financial security in the worker's old age after retirement. It also provides insurance payments to eligible survivors if a worker dies," Sanderson

"Eligibility for benefits hinges on the length of time a worker has been employed in jobs covered by social security. The amount of benefits payable depends on the total wages credited to his account. It is to the worker's advantage to have credit on his wage record for all wages earned. If his wages are reported under the wrong social security number," Sanderson concluded, "he may not be credited with those wages. Later on, he and his family may lose benefits which
