Donley County included in new boll weevil eradication zone

AUSTIN — Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry has finalized the designation of the Northern Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone.

This designation is based on extensive comment and full consideration of all the economic, agronomic, and entomological aspects of this important cotton-growing area

of Texas.

The new Northern Rolling Plains zone consists of approximately 290,000 acres of cotton in 14 counties: Childress, Clay, Collingsworth, Cottle, Donley, Foard, Gray, Hall, Hardeman, King, Wheeler, Wichita, Wilbarger, and a portion of Archer.

Perry also appointed John Inman

of Childress to continue representing the zone on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors until a director's election is held. Inman farms in Childress County.

When cotton producers and the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation indicate they are ready to pro-

ceed with an eradication program in the zone, TDA will set a referendum. At that time, growers and crop sharing landowners in the new zone will vote on whether or not to establish an eradication program and to approve a maximum assessment. A director's election would also be conducted during the referendum.

VFW Buddy Poppies will be available this Friday

VFW Auxiliary ladies will be at Clarendon Outpost and B&R Thriftway on Friday, May 22, to accept donations for the annually distributed buddy poppies.

The red silk poppies are made by disabled patients in veterans hospitals throughout the United States. The work provides needed therapy for hands and minds crippled by ravages of war.

lation of all battlefields; the green of the stem is symbolic of forests, meadows, and fields where generations of Americans have perished to make this land free."

Poppy proceeds, used for various rehabilitation programs of our nation's service organizations, will be funded back into Donley County to benefit disabled veterans as well as widows and orphans of those deceased.

Local sales tax rebates down slightly for May

AUSTIN — State Comptroller John Sharp recently delivered a total of \$236 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,092 Texas cities and 118

counties, a nine percent increase over the \$216.5 million allocated in May 1997. But local rebates did not follow the state trend.

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in March and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in April and

those businesses filing quarterly returns for January, February, and March.

"The robust growth of the Texas economy still shows no signs of slowing, with higher employment numbers going hand-in-hand with higher consumer spending," Sharp said. "Year-to-date, rebates to cities and counties are up 10.3 percent over last year."

Sharp delivered monthly sales tax rebates totaling \$217.6 million to

Texas cities, 9.2 percent higher than last May's payments of \$199.3 million.

Locally, the City of Clarendon received \$24,637.35, which reflects a 1.66 percent drop from this time last year. Howardwick saw its payment plummet 77.07 percent to a total of \$206.77. Hedley was the only local city to post an increase. The May payment was \$1,159.86, an increase of 21.72 percent.

offer teacher/coach contracts to Roger Hoeltzel, Michael Ray, Jeremy Gage, and Gregory Mouser for the 1998-99 school year.

Administration reports were given by Larry Jeffers, Donnie Carroll, Mike Word, John Taylor, Mark Howard, and Phil Barefield.

Mr. Baker, Band Director, expressed a desire to purchase a trailer for transporting band equipment,

citing that it would be more efficient and there would be less equipment damage as benefits. The board took no action on this.

In other school business, the board asked Mr. Barefield to set a date after July 4 at WTAMU for a Board Training session, approved changes in the junior high cheerleader selection process, and amended the budget.

Everyday is Poppy Day for hospitalized veterans

For hundreds of long-term disabled veterans in Veterans Administration Hospitals and Domiciliaries and in State Veterans Homes, every day is VFW Buddy Poppy Day.

These are the men who assemble the Poppies, tie them in bunches of ten and pack them in boxes of 500, 1,000, or 2,000 for shipment to the over 10,600 Veterans of Foreign Wars Posts and Auxiliaries throughout the nation.

Poppy assembly is a year-round project in some 10 veterans facilities and a part-time program in others. Some are under the direction of the VFW organization in the state in which they are located, and others are supervised and directed by the National VFW Buddy Poppy Department.

The assembly procedure varies from facility to facility, depending upon the emphasis given to the various aspects of the program by the project director.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars pays the disabled veteran for his work. In most cases, the money provides extra income for the disabled veteran to pay for the little luxuries which make hospital life tolerable.

Sometimes the Poppy assembly is used as a therapy program, under direct supervision of hospital personnel, to provide exercise for fingers and hands crippled by wounds, disease, and the effects of old age.

One of the most successful adaptations of the Buddy Poppy assembly program is its use as a step toward the rehabilitation of psychiatric patients. The experience and training in concentration and supervised work in assembling Poppies has led to more complicated duties and eventual discharge.

From the time it leaves the hospital until it graces the coat lapel or dress front of the individual citizen, the Poppy provides care for the widow and orphans of deceased veterans at the VFW National Home in Eaton Rapids, Michigan; provides funds for veterans rehabilitation services on the State and National level; pays for direct relief to the families of needy and deceased veterans; and serves as a memorial to the dead of all wars of the U.S.

More than 18 million Buddy Poppies will be assembled this year and will be sold by VFW Posts and Auxiliaries throughout the nation. Each of them will have traveled a long way and each will have helped to make someone happier.

The annual sale of Buddy Poppies is the only public solicitation conducted by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The sale in this area will be during the week of Memorial Day.

Issue Update with Mac Thornberry

From what's taken out of our paycheck to what we pay for a gallon of gas when we fill up our tank each week, it's almost always hard to figure out just how much money is staying in our pocket, and how much is being sent off to the government.

Well, here's another sad fact to throw at you. This year, the average American worked 129 days

to pay off their total tax burden. In other words, from January 1, 1998, up until this past Sunday, May 10, people have been working to pay the government. As of May 11, we're beginning to work for ourselves.

According to the Tax Foundation, this is the longest Americans have ever had to work to pay off their total tax burden. It's another way of saying that taxes are the highest they've ever been and need to be reduced. It's also another way of showing why we need to scrap the current tax system and replace it with something else.

I've signed onto legislation that would take us in that direction. Called the Tax Code Termination Act, the bill would eliminate the tax code by the

year 2002. At the same time, it would also require that a new tax system be flatter, fairer and easier to understand.

We've reached a point in America where if you work hard, play by the rules, and do all the right things for yourself and your family — then the government punishes you with higher taxes. We've also reached a point where we've got to try something new.

Congress is looking at a flat tax, national sales tax and some other ideas as well. I don't know what the end result will be. But I do know that four months is too long to work for the government, and that the tax system as we know it has got to come to an end.

Local veterans help with Buddy Poppies

"All of the net proceeds received from the sale of Buddy Poppies remain here in our own community to meet the calls from needy veterans," Commander James Owens of the Clarendon VFW Post stated today in announcing plans for the annual sale of Buddy Poppies on the streets of Clarendon.

"The Post maintains a relief fund into which is placed all net profits received from the sale of Buddy Poppies," Commander Owens said. "This fund is available to meet any calls for relief from our local veterans."

As in previous years these symbolic flowers in Flanders Field will be sold on the streets by a group of volunteer members of the VFW Post and members of its Ladies Auxiliary. They will be assisted by volunteer

workers from youth groups in the community.

"Most of the money that we collect in this sale will remain right here in our own community, to help finance the relief and welfare work which we have undertaken in behalf of our own veterans in need, and their dependents," explains Commander Owens.

"The balance of the proceeds of the annual Buddy Poppy sale is used to help maintain the nationwide rehabilitation service of our organization," Commander Owens added. "For example, we contribute one penny for each Buddy Poppy sold to the operation of the VFW National Home of widows and orphans at Eaton Rapids, Michigan. This is the only home of its kind in the world. It was founded in 1925."

Coalition demands USPS reverse mail hike

WASHINGTON - Calling it "hugely unnecessary" the nation's largest coalition of first class mail consumers called on Americans to pressure the Postal Service to not implement a billion-dollar increase in first class mail rates.

Citing four straight years of record Postal Service profits, a member of the Coalition to Make Our First Class Mail FIRST CLASS criticized the increase in stamp prices and called the rate case process a sham.

"This hugely unnecessary rate case at least has provided one public service," said Earl Heath, chairman of the board of the Association of Retired Americans which is a member of the coalition.

"It lays bare how our current regulation of this country's largest monopoly hamstring honest efforts to review Postal Service finances, allows Postal Service executives to provide wildly inaccurate revenue forecasts with impunity and leaves

first class mail consumers a billion dollar bill in the process."

After three straight years of profits, the Postal Service demanded a billion dollar increase in monopoly mail rates with predictions of a loss of \$1.1 billion during the current fiscal year.

When it became evident the agency would earn a fourth straight record profit, PRC officials expressed concern that postal executives were providing them with incomplete information.

The Postal Service refused to provide updated information in a "response reflecting a preference for form over substance," charged commission chairman Edward J. Gleiman while announcing today's opinion at PRC headquarters.

The first class mail coalition is hoping Americans won't stand for any increase at all.

"It is our sincere hope that the American public made aware of what a sham this process has

been will demand that their congressional representatives pressure the Postal Service Board of Governors to not implement this increase," said Heath.

"Even fee governors should see that four years of billion dollar profits make a mockery of their Chicken Little predictions of financial ruin. Greed is the only logical explanation for holding up first class mail consumers for another rate increase in this situation and we urge the governors to reject that as agency policy."

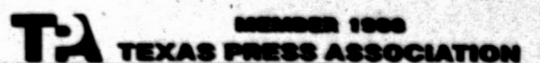

Korean War Study to be hosted by Clarendon College Library

CC Librarian Jo Shaller will present the four-week study. The first week will focus on causes of the war, week two on conflicts of the war, week three on consequences of the war, and week four will feature personal experiences from Korean War veterans.

According to Shaller, anyone interested in military, American,

world, and local history is encouraged to attend this free seminar. Korean War veterans are especially encouraged to attend and share their first-hand experiences.

The Clarendon College Korean War Study will be held every Monday at 6 p.m. in the college library. The study will begin on June 8, and end on June 29.

the most valuable defensive player. Gaines lettered in football and track and was an all-district basketball selection.

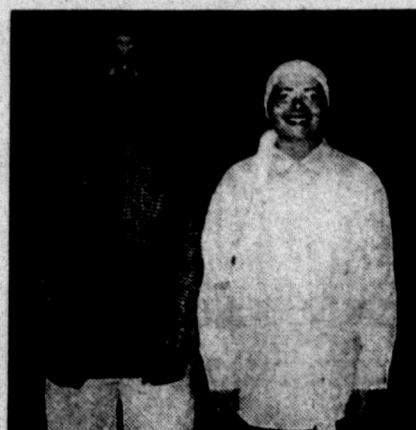

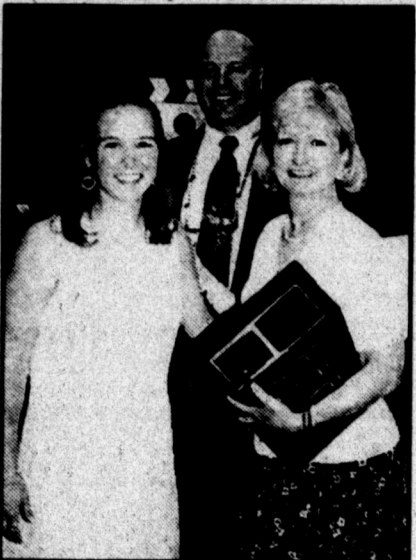

Students can receive extra help on TAAS skills

Additional help is now available to students who do not pass one or more parts of the statewide assessment, the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS). The Texas Education Agency has developed TAAS Study Guides to help students strengthen their reading, mathematics, writing, science, and social studies skills measured by TAAS.

The study guides have been created for third grade through exit level (high school). The exit level guide, "Working Through TAAS," was delivered to public schools in May so that student who did not pass the exit Level TAAS, a requirement for graduation from all Texas public high schools, are the first to benefit from these materials. Study guides for third

through eighth grades will be available later this spring or summer.

Mike Moses, Commissioner of Education, said, "The activities in the study guides cover the same skills that are taught in school and are tested on TAAS. The guides help students and their parents understand each skill, realize why it is important, and see how it relates to everyday life."

The guides may be used to help reinforce the skills of all students, including those who have performed successfully on TAAS. Moses said, "We believe that the best foundation for successful performance on TAAS is a curriculum that provides students many opportunities to read for meaning, solve mathematical problems in a variety of real life

contexts, and write for a variety of purposes and audiences. The TAAS Study Guides, based on this same foundation, provide material that can be easily used inside or outside the classroom."

All high school students who do not pass one or more parts of TAAS will receive a free study guide from their school after the Spring 1998 testing. Other high school students or their parents may obtain copies for the study guides for \$5.00 per guide by calling 1-888-35-STUDY. The guides for Grades 3 through 8 will be available summer 1998. Local information about the Study Guides can be obtained by calling the Clarendon CISD Counselor's Office at 874-3241.

ORDINANCE NO. 72
AN ORDINANCE REORGANIZING AND RENAMING THE CITY OF HOWARDWICK VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT
WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Howardwick has determined that it is in the best interests of the City of Howardwick and its residents to reorganize its Volunteer Fire Department and rename same so as to have an adequately equipped, manned, and trained Volunteer Fire Department;
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOWARDWICK, TEXAS:
SECTION 1: That there is hereby

established in this City a Volunteer Fire Department, consisting of a Chief, an Assistant Chief, and a number of Firemen as may be determined appropriate by the City Council.

SECTION 2: That the Chief of the Volunteer Fire Department and the Assistant Chief shall be elected annually by the members of the Department, subject to confirmation by the City Council. Each elected official shall hold office for one (1) year and until his or her successor has been duly elected, except that he or she may be removed by a public hearing. Firemen and probationary firemen shall be appointed by the members of the Department, subject to confirmation by the City Council. Firemen shall continue as members of the Department during good behavior and may be removed by the City Council only for cause after a public hearing.

SECTION 3: That the Chief shall have control of all the fire-fighting apparatus and shall be solely responsible for its care and condition. He or she shall make a monthly report to the City Council as to the condition of the equipment and needs of the Fire Department. He or she may submit additional reports and recommendations at any meeting of the City Council, and he or she shall report each suspension by him or her of a member of the Fire Department at the first meeting of the City Council following such suspension. He or she shall be responsible for the proper training and discipline of the members of the Fire Department and may suspend any member for refusal or neglect to obey orders pending final action by the City Council or his or her discharge or retention.

SECTION 4: That the Chief shall keep, in convenient form, a complete record of all fires. Such record shall include the time of the alarm, location of fire, cause of fire (if known), type of building, name of owner and tenant, purpose for which occupied, value of building and contents, members of the Department responding to the alarm, and such other information as the Chief may deem advisable or as may be required from time to time by the City Council or State Insurance Department.

SECTION 5: That shall be the duty of the Chief to hold practice

drills totaling two per month (1) hour duration each month for the Fire Department and to give the firemen instruction in approved methods of fire fighting and fire prevention.

SECTION 6: That in the absence or disability of the Chief, the Assistant Chief shall perform all the functions and exercise all of the authority of the Chief.

SECTION 7: That the Assistant Chief and firemen shall be able-bodied men and women and not less than eighteen (18) nor more than seventy-five (75) years of age. They shall become members of the Fire Department only after a six (6) month probationary period. The City Council may require that each candidate, before he or she may become a probationary fireman, must satisfy certain minimum requirements and qualifications, including but not limited to passing a satisfactory mental and physical examination and submitting to a criminal background check.

SECTION 8: That Firemen absent from three (3) consecutive drills or calls, unless excused by the Chief, shall forfeit membership in the Department.

SECTION 9: That the members and officers of the Fire Department shall receive nominal compensation of \$2.00 for each meeting/training session attended and \$3.00 for each call responded to. In addition, the City will provide to the Firemen general liability and workers compensation insurance and such facilities and equipment as are reasonably necessary to perform the duties of volunteer firemen.

SECTION 10: That is shall be unlawful for any person to give or make, or cause to be given or made, an alarm of fire without probable cause, or to neglect or refuse to obey any reasonable order of the Chief at a fire, or to interfere with the Fire Department in the discharge of its duties; and any person convicted of violating this subsection shall be punished as per the provisions of Ordinance No. 30. PASSED, APPROVED, AND ADOPTED in regular meeting by the City Council of the City of Howardwick, Texas, on this 5th day of May, 1998, but effective retroactively to July 16, 1996, except for Section 10, which is effective from and after date of passage.

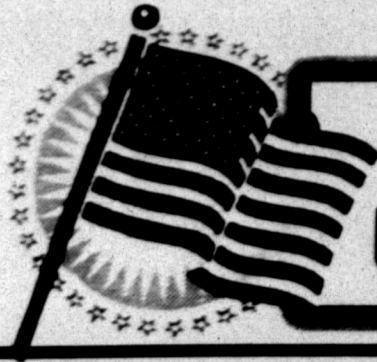

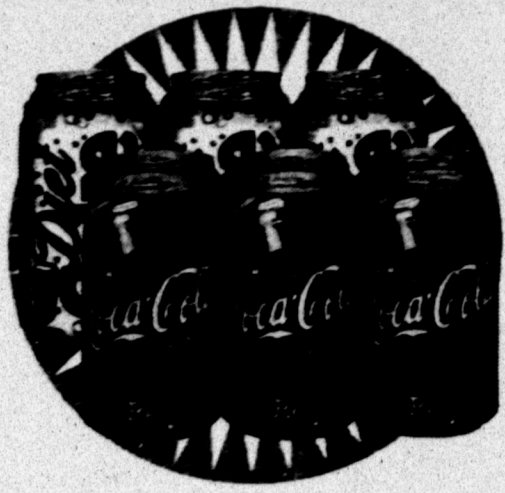

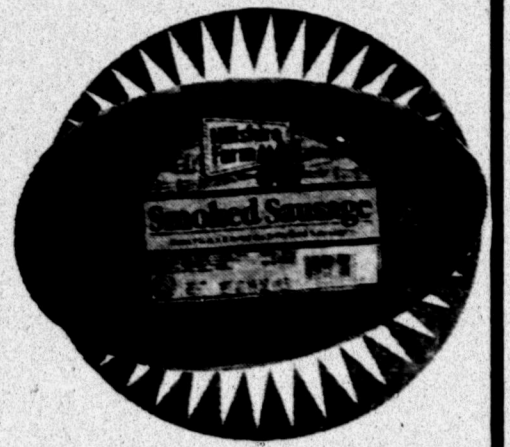
