Potatoes are divided into three classifications - No. 1's, No. 2's and Unclassifieds. Classification depends on size, weight, shape and defects.

We have to get the children back in school and also have to get set for the committee work of the food served. that has to be done this fall preparatory to the next session of Congress. One of the committees on which I serve is the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, which has jurisdiction over transportation in this country. The President has appointed a committee of Cabinet level to make a report on the transportation situation. The committee on which I serve will work in cooperation with that Cabinet committee in trying to work out the many difficulties that will pleague the transportation industry in our country. This will require extensive hearings for which there is not sufficient time during a session of Congress.
