

Annual Buddy Poppy sale benefits needy veterans

Members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 7782 and its Ladies Auxiliary will be selling Buddy Poppies at several stores in town from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. from May 25-31.

"VFW by-laws require that the proceeds from our sale of Buddy Poppies must be used to benefit disabled and needy veterans and the widow and orphans of deceased veterans right here in the community," according to Post Commander, James Owens.

In 1923, the VFW was the first veterans organization to promote a nationally organized campaign for the annual distribution of poppies assembled by disabled or hospitalized veterans. That tradition continues today, with more than 18 million poppies assembled by paid, disabled, and hospitalized veterans each year. The members of the VFW and its Ladies Auxiliary raise more than \$15 million annually from the sale of Buddy Poppies.

The VFW, founded in 1899, is the nation's oldest major veterans organization. Its more than 2.1 million members include 1.1 million of WWII, 526,000 Vietnam veterans, and some 426,000 Korean War veterans. The remaining members come from American military actions in Haiti, Somalia, the Persian Gulf, Grenada, Panama, and Lebanon, as well as expeditionary and occupation forces.

TxDOT noticing more traffic signs vandalized

With the arrival of spring, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has noted an increase in traffic sign theft and vandalism.

Although the signs are quickly replaced, and no one has been injured due to missing or damaged signs, the costs associated with the crime are high. Damaged signs pose a danger to the traveling public, and the funds spent to replace them could be spent elsewhere.

Statewide, taxpayers spend more than \$8 million annually replacing signs damaged by natural disasters, accidents, and vandals.

Wood and metal signs cost approximately \$10 per square foot to produce. The costs to install replacement signs vary depending on the amount of time and equipment







WTU parent company receives state's Environmental Award

TNRCC presents the award annually in a variety of categories to honor individuals, organizations, schools, and businesses that have created successful programs to protect and conserve the Texas environment. CSW's award was in the large business non-technical category for the corporation's renewable energy project in the Davis Mountains in

The CSW Renewable Energy Project, begun in 1993, is studying and developing the use of renewable energy ax a power generation resource. The project includes: 12 550-kilowatt wind turbines at a 75-acre site near Fort Davis, Texas; three large gridconnected solar arrays totaling 205 kilowatts; and five 2-kilowatt rooftop photovoltaic systems on commercial buildings and residences in the area.

"CSW's Renewable Energy Project in the Davis Mountains serves as the foundation for the corporation's commitment to a long-term renewable energy program," said Gary Gibbs, CSW senior environmental consult-Project provided considerable insight Gov. Bush's voluntary program.



Increase Postal 'Service' Not Rates

The Postal Service (now there's an oxymoron) is raising rates... again. An independent commission approved on Monday the increase in rates which will see the price of a first class stamp go up a penny and the price of mailing a newspaper go up by 4.6 percent.

I have about had it, but then what can I do? Nothing.

In theory, I support the idea of the Post Office being run by the federal government since it is a function clearly outlined by the Constitution. However, if they can't deliver the mail, then we owe it to the taxpayers as well as the postal consumers to provide them with a service that can get the job done.

This issue is one I have held off commenting on due to the fact that we depend on the Post Office to deliver the Enterprise to our subscribers. UPS, FedEx, and other independent carriers are not really an option for our subscribers since the Post Office has a monopoly on deliveries to Post Office boxes. Unfortunately, Periodical Class mail (newspapers) isn't a very big priority to the Post Office, and as a result delivery times can be

It takes a week or more for our paper to get from Clarendon to College Station or San Antonio, and deliveries from Texas to California or Arizona are sometimes three or four weeks or more.

Time is a critical factor in delivering the news. When subscribers call our office to complain, it looks as though we are just making excuses when we point a finger at the Post Office. I can assure you the fault sits in the lap of the Post Office. I'm not blaming the individual employees of the Clarendon office. We have a good working relationship with them. But once the mail leaves their hands, it's anybody's guess what will hap-

The Enterprise is on the cutting edge of Postal requirements for labeling and sorting. In other words, the bundles we deliver to the Post Office each week are sacked into eighteen separate delivery sections, each newspaper is labeled with a barcoded address, and all papers are sorted into a "walk sequence" order so that postal workers don't even have to think about what they're doing — just put it in PO Box 12, PO Box 13, PO Box 14, etc. Sorting our own mail in this way is a labor intensive task, and the software required to certify the addresses and to generate the barcodes is expensive. Heck, it seems like we do everything for the Post Office except physically deliver our papers for them.

What really bites about this rate increase is the Postal Service has reportedly made billion-dollar profits for the last three years according to the Associated Press. They seem to be flush with cash what with the primetime television commercials they're running and the fancy new office on Western Street in Amarillo.

Former North Dakota publisher and past president of the National Newspaper Association John Andrist recent wrote: "The USPS needed seven to 14 days to deliver my newspaper to Arizona when I went into business in the early 1950s. It still takes seven to 14 days today. Do you know anybody else in the transportation and delivery business that can't do a better job today than they could 45 years ago?"

I can drive to see my brother in College Station in less than a day; the Post Office should be able to take a newspaper to him in two days at the most. Surely in this modern age, the mail can be delivered on time. And certainly the Post Office should be accountable to the taxpayers and to postal customers. But most importantly, postal rates should be based solely one criterion — expeditious delivery of the mail.

Meanwhile in Austin...

Mad Dog Danny Morales is back at it.

It was only a matter of time, of course. After the state's bullying of the big tobacco companies, the Texas Attorney General has now declared open season on other legal businesses, putting Microsoft squarely in his

Morales' office is reportedly expecting to file an antitrust suit against the computer software giant owned by Bill Gates. This move could potentially delay Microsoft's release of their new computer operating system,

Who really stands to lose the most from this lawsuit? It's not Bill Gates, it's the taxpayers and the consumers of Texas. Mad Dog's frivolous lawsuits waste the state's time, resources, and money in the pursuit of political interests. It will stop (or at least delay) consumers from buying the goods they want and demand.

It is interesting to note that Microsoft isn't even based in Texas, but several large computer manufacturers are. The maker of the nation's top performing PCs, Dell Computers, is headquartered in Austin as are other computer manufacturers. Compaq calls this state its home as do computer retailers CompUSA and Computer City. These companies depend on software from Microsoft to sell their hardware. If the state sues Microsoft, Texas' own companies will feel the sting as a delay in Windows 98 could lead to a delay in the purchase of new computers.

We are fortunate that Mad Dog isn't running for re-election this year. Texas deserves an Attorney General who will go after real criminals rather than pursuing one political agenda after another

retary of Transportation with a federal plan to crack down on people who run red lights across the coun-

His plan essentially would form a public-private partnership between Washington, businesses, and local communities to educate people about the

dangers of running red lights. The program will include such measures as increased police enforcement and putting cameras up at stoplights to take pictures of those who break the law.

Now, people who run red lights are a problem. And having Washington work with local communities is a lot better than having them come in and tell people what to do — as has happened so often in the past. But somehow I question whether the Founding Fathers would have envisioned traffic enforcement as a federal responsibility when they drafted the Constitution in 1789. And while you can argue that the world has changed a great deal since then, you can also make the case that

the need for limited government is as great now as it was 200 years ago.

The federal government is bigger than it's ever been in our history. In 1996 alone, the bureaucracy issued nearly 5,000 new rules and regulations the highest ever. Federal regulations cost the typical family nearly \$7,000 each year.

There's been a lot of talk about making the federal government smaller and smarter. But smart government doesn't just mean trying to do everything better. It also means not trying to do everything. When it comes to putting cameras in traffic lights, I'm afraid that's what the Secretary of Trans-


James Potts awarded prestigious award at **HHS Awards Banquet**

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may

follow these procedures if you have a concern about:
 *the market or special appraised value placed on your property:
 *the unequal appraisal of your property;

*the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll:

*exemptions that may apply to you; *qualification for an agricultural appraisal;

*the taxable status of your property; *which local governments should be taxing your property; *the ownership of property;

*the change of use of land receiving special appraisal;

you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

Your Appraisal District staff urges you to review the value records of your property at any time prior to the day of the Appraisal Review Board Hearings tentatively set for July 17, 1998, in the Donley County Courthouse Annex. Some protests result from errors or misconceptions which we are pleased to correct.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice a protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at the Donley County Courthouse Annex, P O Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment: If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

More information: You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at the Donley County Courthouse Annex, P O Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P O Box 13528, Austin, TX 78711-3528.

DEADLINE FOR FILING PROTESTS WITH THE ARB*

Usual Deadline: On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause. Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines: For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

All high school students who do not pass one or more parts of TAAS will receive a free study guide from their school after the Spring 1998 testing. Other high school students or their parents may obtain copies for the study guides for \$5.00 per guide by calling 1-888-35-STUDY.
