



WYH THEY CALLED HIM "HAPPY"—Throughout his life General of the Air Force Henry H. Arnold radiated gladness and good humor. From the earliest days of aviation and through two World Wars he was hailed by soldiers of all ranks as "Hap Arnold," and delighted to refer to the time when the U. S. Air Force consisted of two other flyers and himself. He was the idol of children through his writings for young aviators. In the picture he is greeted by boy and girl aviation enthusiasts upon his arrival from overseas in 1945.

Born in Gladwyn, Pennsylvania, June 25, 1886, he was graduated from West Point in 1907 and was assigned as a second lieutenant of infantry. In 1911 he was detailed to the Signal Corps and at Dayton received instruction in pilot biplane. From that time his advancement to the highest rank was synonymous with the development of American military aviation. He died at his home in California, January 15 and was laid to rest beside the graves of thousands of his comrades in Arlington National Cemetery January 19.



It is the expectation of the Northwestern wheat farmers to come out with a two price system, with bushel control. Parity price on a certain percent of your wheat raised, and allowing you to do what ever you wish with the rest. Put it on the open market or hold it over yourself at your own risk for whatever the future price might be.

Let's have a good discussion on this situation; maybe we can arrive at a better plan.

Officials of the Donley County Wheat Producers Association urge the wheat farmers to be present at this meeting.
