

County Agent H. M. Breedlove and Mr. H. Wood attended a meeting at Memphis, Texas on Tuesday, April 11th on a 7-step cotton program being put into effect by the Extension Service over the state of Texas. A committee will be formed to work with the county agent in putting this proram into effect which will deal with rotation of cotton 'acreage, insect control, legumes, better coton seed, fertilization, soil conservation and marketing.

The acreage in Texas for cotton for 1950 is much less than in previous years and the acreage in cotton allotted to farms must be made to produce to the maximum for him in order for the farmer to get the most money out of his cotton acreage

Breedlove says this will result in cotton being on the best land on the farm; it must be rotated to get the best results and legumes and fertilizers will have to be used for the farmer to get the most production from his acreage. 



## J. Blake Timmons Advocates Repeal of Taft-Hartley Act ENDORSES FULL PARITY FARM PRICE SUPPORTS

J. Blake Timmons, candidate for Congress from the 18th Texas District, last week advocated repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act, took medicine and endorsed full parity Communists, but does not require farm price supports.
