Car-Track Crash Claims Five Lives Near Amarillo Early Sunday Morning

terrible shock early Sunday morning when it was learned here that four people had died instantly, and three had been hospitalized due to a car-cattle truck crash 7 miles east of Amarillo on highway 287 about 1:20 Sunday morning.

Those killed instantly were W. S. Carlile, Jr., 21 years old, and Doris Marie McKee, 19 years old of Clarendon; Madeline Osteen, 23 years old of Claude and Cooter T. Young, 31 years old of Amarillo.

Seriously injured was Jack Simmons, 27 years old of Hedley and Lamar Aten, 23 years old of Lelia Lake, and less seriously injured was Forrest W. Lodsdon, 20 years old, Hollis, Okla.





Donley County Farm News

We have here a bulletin from College Station and it states that the present price of grain sorghums is from seventy to fifty cents cheaper on the market than the government loan rate on grain this time. There have been a good many producers in the office the last few days asking about storage on the farm and the requirements on the granaries. There are that are to be used for storing grains that are to be put in the loan, they are: 1. the granary must hold the wheat or grain without loss of quantity; 2. protect the grain against weather conditions which may cause deterioration in quality; 3. afford reasonable protection against thieves, rodents, birds, poultry and insects; 4. permit effective fumigation for destruction of insects; 5. provide reasonable safety from fire and wind; 6. require forcible breaking in order to be entered after sealing. We hope this will answer some of your questions concerning storage of your grain this year as it is estimated that one out of every five bushels of grain produced will not have proper storage available.

Park Chamberlain has used six tons of 20% superphosphate to his pasture grass and says he is going to use that much more. It would be a good idea to keep an eye on this grass; it should be one of the best. I had the opportunity to attend the field trip sponsored by the Soil Conservation Service Tuesday of last week and we visited several farms where we could see the results of the money that we have been spending for you producers. Another interesting sight was a demonstration of dusting crops with an airplane. Rainbow Dusting Company of Las Animas, Colorado did the dusting, with a local man Mr. Matt Taylor, who has been working with them this summer, doing the flying. Mr. Taylor was flying a Stearman plane with a 300 horse power engine. The chemical mixture was 5% pyrocide, dusted from an altitude of five to six feet. The purpose of this was to kill worms and bugs on feed. Claud Moore was the man whose feed was dusted and Mr. Moore is well pleased with the results obtained. The crowd watching were all impressed with the speed that insects can be eliminated in case they were to strike this county suddenly.

With AAA assistance Guy Sibley plans to plow forty acres of his land about sixteen inches deep and then seed twenty acres of it in rye, and the other twenty acres in wheat. That is a plot of land that I want to see next spring. This practice, or maybe it is a combination of practices, should prevent any kind of erosion that might occur in this

One more thing is an article I noticed last week which stated that years ago the soil on American farms was nine inches deep on the average, and now the average is only six inches deep. We know what caused that and we know what to do about it, but what are we going to do? There are six inches between us and poverty.
