## School Lighting Project Underway

A project toward improving lighting in the Elizabeth Stevens grade school is underway. ## Super Motor Bus Displayed Here

A sixty-foot motor bus, "jointed" in the middle, stopped in Clarendon Wednesday for public display. The bus, owned by the Continental Bus System, was enroute to California from Dallas, where it was shown at the State Fair.

C. C. Hailey, district passenger agent, said that at the present time, there could be no such scheduled bus on Texas Highways, as the length of the machine exceeds state law standards for motor coaches of its type. The law will have to be amended before it could operate in this state, he said. At the present time, the Luxury Liner, as it is called, runs on schedule between Los Angeles and Bakersfield, Calif. Only five states permit the vehicle to travel their highways.

A not too plentiful crop of birds has been reported and after yesterday the prize sporting birds are probably much thinner than ever.

There's one thing we can say: the majority of homefolks at least go to the trouble of asking the land owner for the privilege of hunting on his land, and it would be better for all concerned if the land owner was asked by everyone before entering upon his land. Someone may have to pay a heavy fine.

The quail season lasts through January 16th and the bag limit is 12 birds per day.

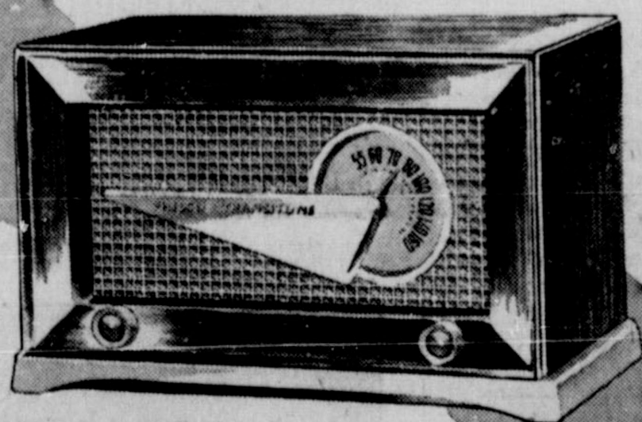

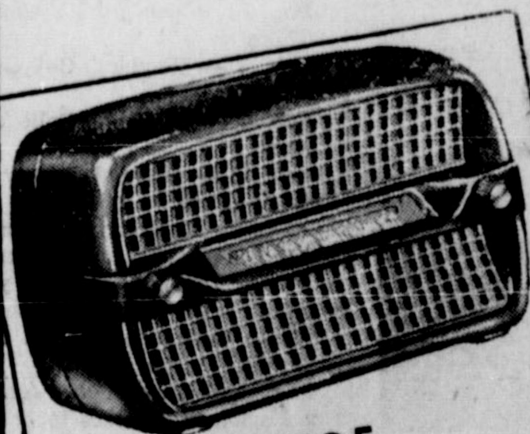

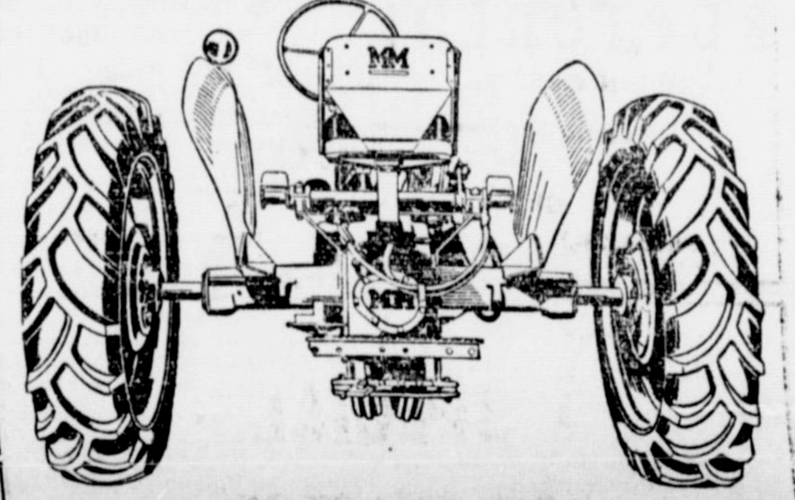

**Appeal On Christmas Mailing Made**

Postmaster J. C. Estlack is appealing to local residents to plan to mail all Christmas greeting cards and gift packages "just as early in December as possible." "If you postpone to the last minute this year", the postmaster warned, "you greatly risk disappointing your loved ones and friends. Your Holiday messages and gifts may be caught in the early rush now in evidence, and may not be delivered until after Christmas."

All packages and out-of-state Christmas cards should be mailed by December 10th. Those mailed to Texas points should be mailed by December 15th. "Early mailing is extremely vital because of the increased volume of incoming mail which will include hundreds of packages daily," the postmaster stated.

"We would appreciate patrons of the Clarendon post office purchasing stamps for their Christmas mailing right now. Don't wait until the last minute. Often there is a shortage of the 1 1/2-cent stamps here and at the supply base in Dallas, as was the case last Christmas. Besides, it avoids a wait in line at the windows when you get your stamps early."

Postal regulations require that all packages be stoutly wrapped and shoppers are advised to lay in supplies of heavy cardboard, sturdy outer paper, heavy cord and labels printed Fourth Class.

Packages are limited to 70 pounds in weight and must not measure more than 100 inches in length and girth combined. Always place your address on a slip of paper and place inside the outer wrapping, sticking it securely to the package. If the package is burst in transit, the mail clerk will re-tie your package and send it on to the proper destination.

Stamp and direct your Christmas cards NOW. Mail them not later than December 10th. This is the safe way. It will save you loss, others of disappointment and make Christmas much happier all-round.

## Wiring Specialists Give Outlet Tips for Xmas Lighting, Year-Round Living

You can go "all out" on lighted Christmas decorations, wiring specialists advise, if your home has enough electrical outlets in handy spots. Properly located outlets not only make it easy to place Yuletide decorations in appropriate places, the experts claim, but also provide greater convenience and flexibility in lighting and appliance use throughout the year.

Three unusual arrangements are recommended for lighted holiday ornaments as well as general year-round use:

### Floor Outlet

A sunken floor outlet under the dining table that can be connected by a cord to a multiple plug-in receptacle attached to the table itself. It provides convenient use of small cooking appliances and special centerpieces. It also eliminates the unsafe practice of trailing extension cords over or under the rug. A tri-angular tree may be made of heavy red flameproof paper. The light cord is fastened in place on the inside with gummed tape. The lights are set into holes cut in the "tree." Fire-resistant green crepe paper, fringed to look like pine needles, hides the base of the bulbs and gives a finishing decorative touch.

### Outlets Every 12 Ft.

When convenience outlets are spaced every twelve feet along the wall, distinctive decorations can be set up without limiting the use of lamps and appliances in other parts of the room. Out-

lets spaced according to the twelve-foot rule eliminate the need for unsightly extension cords and make it possible to arrange furniture where desired.

### Outdoor Outlet

Outdoor outlets may be installed near the front entrance and other appropriate spots for outdoor decorative lighting, garden or cooking appliances. Weather-proof cord sets should be used for exterior decorations.

## Nearly \$100,000 In Premiums Being Offered

FORT WORTH—A record total of nearly \$100,000 in premiums is being offered exhibitors in the 1949 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show here Jan. 28 through Feb. 6.

The deadline for livestock entries, announced by W. A. (Bill) King, general livestock superintendent, is Dec. 13, while horse show exhibitors have until Jan. 5 to enter. Livestock premiums total about \$67,000. Over \$22,000 in premiums will be offered horse show exhibitors, Douglas B. Mitchell, horse show superintendent, stated.

In line with the trend of other major shows, open class fat steers will be judged by age rather than weight, King pointed out.

For the first time in the Exposition's history, Brahman cattle will be shown. Another "first" will be the Grass Judging contest for 4-H Club and FFA members. After a lapse since 1942, poultry, turkeys and rabbits will again be exhibited, with some \$2,500 in premiums offered.

General Manager Edgar Deen pointed out that more than \$75,000 has been spent paving walks, roads and parking areas and putting covers on the carlot stock sheds. The show plant at the Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum grounds now represents an investment of over \$3,000,000, Deen said.

## NEW EDITION ANNOUNCED OF "TEXAS FLOWERS IN NATURAL COLORS"

DALLAS — Publication of a new edition of "Texas Flowers in Natural Colors" by Dr. Eula Whitehouse of the Southern Methodist University Herbarium was announced November 28.

The new edition was brought out in response to demands for copies from public schools, libraries and general readers from all parts of Texas and the Southwest.

The book contains illustrations and descriptions of 257 common plants and wild flowers of Texas. The illustrations were drawn and colored by Miss Whitehouse.

Miss Whitehouse received her Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts, and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from the University of Texas.

Now a technical assistant in the SMU Herbarium, she has made plant collections for most of the large herbaria of this country.

Also widely known as an artist, she has done what is perhaps her most noted work for the Texas Memorial Museum in Austin, where her flower transparencies are now on exhibit. She prepared for the museum the background for two large dioramas showing aspects of the state's natural history.

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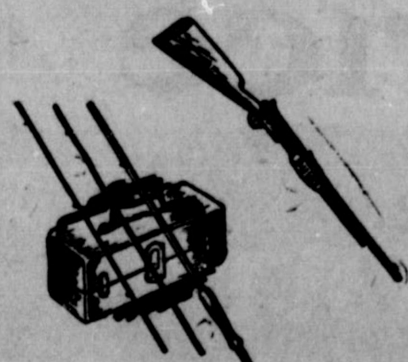

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### Health Notes

**AUSTIN**—Tularemia, or "rabbit fever", is transmitted to human beings through the careless handling of wild rabbits, and according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, every wild rabbit should be handled with extreme care from the time he is bagged, until he is placed on the table.

"If a rabbit is diseased, careless handling can cause tularemia. This serious disease is transmitted from rabbits to human beings, usually through direct contact with the infected animal or with

objects contaminated by the meat or fur." Dr. Cox said, "Each year many persons contract tularemia because they fail to use proper precautions in the handling of the rabbits which are killed for food."

Dr. Cox said that one of the first precautions recommended is to shoot only the healthy rabbits with enough energy to run away from the hunter as he approaches. A listless rabbit that fails to run is probably sick, and should not be taken by the hunter.

A second important safeguard is for the hunter or the housewife

to use rubber gloves in cleaning and preparing the rabbit for cooking. The gloves should be sterilized after using, and the refuse and paper that has touched the rabbit should be burned. Hands should be washed thoroughly after the meat has been set to cook.

Adequate cooking is a final safeguard that should be observed at all times. To destroy any germs that may be present, the meat should be cooked at boiling temperature for at least twenty minutes, regardless of whether it is to be fried or baked later.

By observing these safety rules, Texans may enjoy their rabbit hunts and rabbit dinners without fear of tularemia.

### Who Elected Harry Truman?

Ever since the election, some of the more prominent labor leaders have been claiming that the unions elected Mr. Truman. According to them, the biggest single issue was the Taft-Hartley Act.

Mr. Truman does not owe his remarkable success to any group or any class. He wasn't elected by labor or capital or agriculture or any other segment of the nation. He was elected by the American people, and he is the President of all the people. He doesn't even owe allegiance to the Democratic leaders—most of them deserted him when they thought his cause was lost, and he won in spite of these unadmirable defections.

Harry S. Truman has a chance to go down in history as one of the great Presidents—as a man who, when the world was torn between slavery and freedom, stood staunchly for the liberties of mankind, and was too big to admit allegiance to special interests of any kind. The whole civilized world hopes that he may measure up to the enormous responsibilities that have fallen upon him. He has a chance now to rise above group prejudice or group selfishness.

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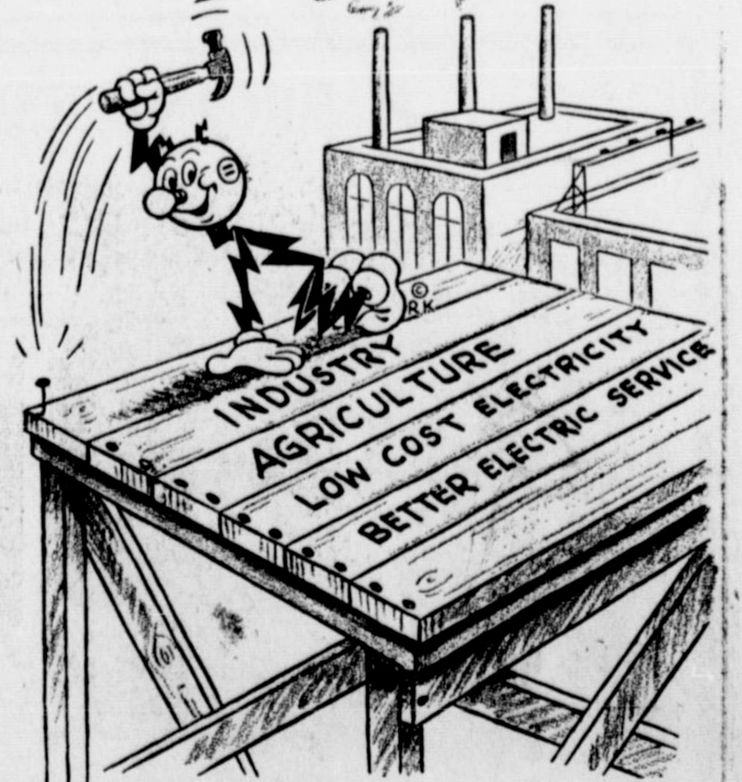

**CROP Christmas Trains Being Assembled**

ATLANTA — North Carolina tops the six Southern states participating in the national effort to assemble CROP Christmas trains with a goal of 60 carloads of farm commodities, it was announced here today by E. D. Shivers, Southern regional director of CROP.

Georgia is second with a goal of 44 cars. Other Southern states sponsoring campaigns to assemble trains are Alabama, Louisiana, South Carolina, and Texas. Georgia leads in the number of counties in which local organizations are now soliciting farm produce with a total of 37, Shivers said.

An intensive campaign is now underway in 24 states of the union to assemble CROP Christmas trains during the week of December 19. On Christmas Day, dedications will be held at shipside as the 24 trains arrive simultaneously at 10 different ports.

Southern ports from which farm commodities will be shipped are: Galveston, Mobile, New Orleans, Norfolk, and Savannah.

It is anticipated that more goods will leave through the port of New Orleans than through any other port, since a large number of midwest states will ship to this port.

Highest goals in the nation have been set in Iowa and Illinois, each state expecting to assemble trains of 300 cars. Wheat and corn will make up the bulk of the shipments, with Southern states contributing quantities of cotton, nuts, and syrup.

All CROP Christmas trains are sponsored by the Christian Rural Overseas program, which is sup-

ported by Catholic and Protestant church groups.

**Beware The Cockroach!**

AUSTIN — Beware the cockroach, homemakers! Cockroaches, University of Texas bacteriologists report, carry intestinal diseases, and everything possible should be done to exterminate them.

In research studies, Dr. O. B. Williams, chairman of the bacteriology department, and Miss Ruth Bitter, recent graduate, discovered that cockroaches have been known to carry paratyphoid fever, a form of dysentery, and food poisoning.

"It is possible that cockroaches live in close association with rats and mice in the wild state," Dr. Williams said. "In view of their feeding habits, the possibility of their becoming infected or acting as carriers of a variety of microorganisms is clearly evident."

Miss Bitter studied the large winged American cockroach found in the Central Texas area.

"Heretofore, because of lack of conclusive evidence that roaches can transmit disease, these insects have been regarded with tolerance by a large proportion of the population, especially in areas where roach control is difficult," the bacteriologists said. "Results of our investigation show that they do carry disease and that every precaution should be taken to see that kitchen utensils and dishes are protected."
