Belgian Government To Participate In State Fair of Texas

Participation by the Belgian Government in the 1949 State Fair of Texas has been assured by cable from Brussels, authorizing contract for 1600 square feet of space in the General Exhibits Building, David A. McMinn, State Fair manager of sales and promotions, has announced.

Strong possibility of additional foreign exhibits from Britain, France and Holland indicate that the 1949 Fair will be the first truly international fair in Texas since the Pan-American in 1937, McMinn said. Representatives of

all these governments have been in Dallas recently, conferring with McMinn and Ray L. Miller of the U.S. Department of Commerce, regarding the opportunities offered to foreign exhibitors in Texas.

The formal request for exhibit space for the Belgians came from Luc Van Bellinghen, representative of the Belgian Ministry of Economic Affairs, who visited the State Fair late in April.

Accompanying Van Bellinghen on his Dallas visit was Charles Leonard, Consul General of Belgium, New Orleans.

"Our participation in the State Fair of Texas shows that we recognize the importance of Dallas as a trading center; the value of the State Fair as an instrument of penetration into the Southwestern market; the wonderful opportunities which the State Fair offers the Belgian exhibit, as well as the beautiful, impressive surroundings in which our exhibit will unfold itself," Leon-

If you have not seeded wheat in the years 1947, 1948, or 1949 but wish to seed wheat in 1950 you must request in writing a 1950 wheat acreage allotment. This request must be submitted to the County Committee before Sep-

The first producers to make application for a farm storage wheat loan were David W. Clampitt and Charlie Hearn.

There is a large crop of wheat this year and combines are cutting in this section, with more ready as the grain ripens. Some are taking advantage of the Government Loan Program, After all. the price they obtain is about 37 cents per bushel above the prevailing local market. If the market exceeds the loan figure at any time between now and April 30, 1950, the producer may sell his grain and pay off the loan. After April 30, 1950 the grain becomes the property of the Government. Either way the producer is the one who gets the most benefit.

Be sure your grain is dry when placed in storage.



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
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
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
