County Agent H. M. Breedlove says that all plans for the County Fair to be held in Clarendon Sept. 17th and 18th are going off on schedule. The fair will be held in the McMurtry building.

Advertising is being sold now for the fair catalogue and the proceeds will be used to pay off the premium money for the fair. The departments of the fair will be community agriculture exhibits, home economics dept., flower show, merchants dept., rabbit show, poultry show, swine show, horse show, races, home-made cake department and sheep show.

The catalogue will go to press about August 20th and be ready around Sept. 1st. The heads of the different departments of the fair will be appointed at a meeting of the show board as soon as all the advertising is sold and before the catalogue goes to press.

Some communities have already started working on their exhibits and the same committees will be used this year as in the past for the community agriculture exhibits.

 LIBRARY NOTES**

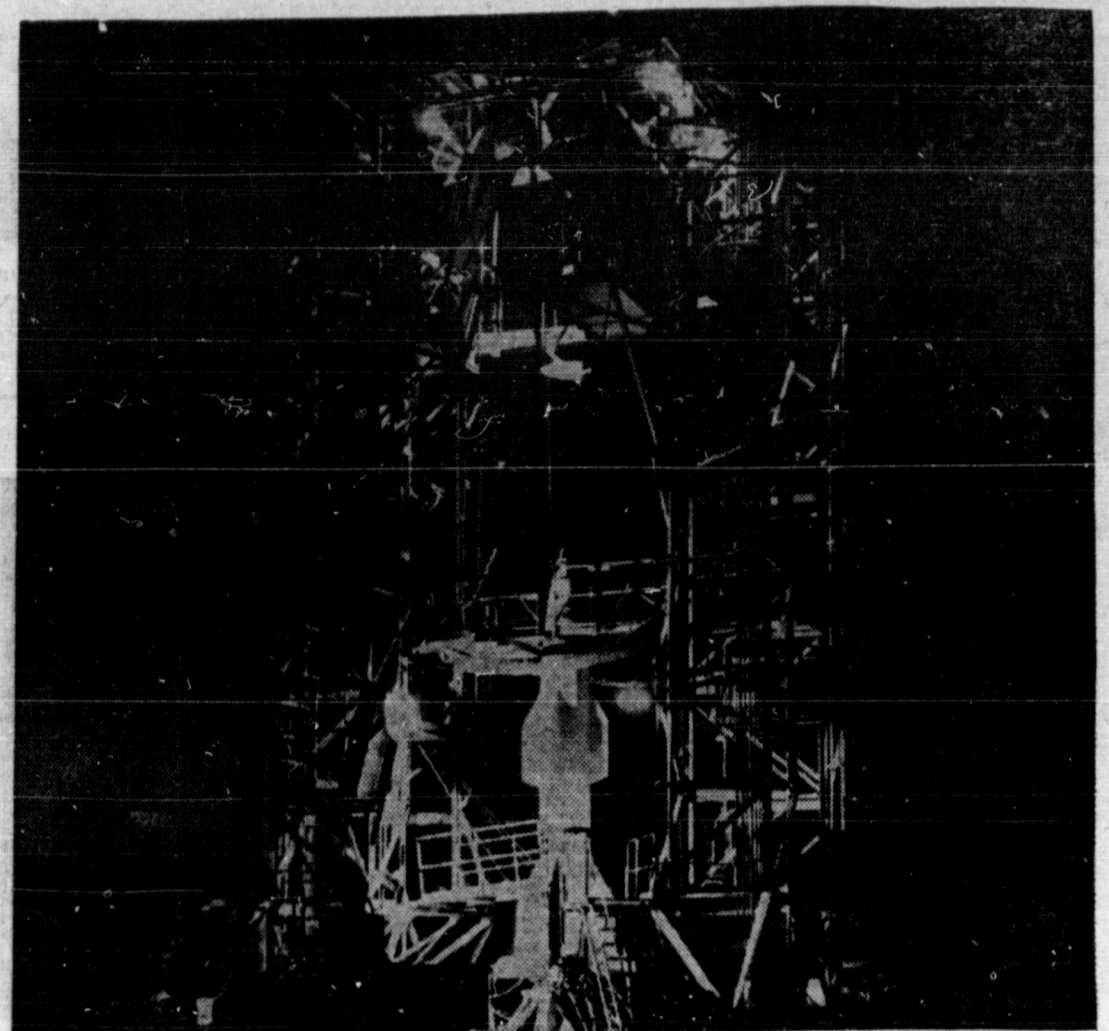

**Twisted Facts Cloud Increase In Old Age Pensions Says Gov. Allan Shivers**

AUSTIN — Governor Allan Shivers said this week that twisted facts and misrepresentations were hampering prospects for an increase in old age pensions.

He said the facts were being clouded in such a way by his opponent that the voters did not have a clear understanding that they have the right to cast ballots in November on increasing pensions.

He pointed out that the people will vote in the November election on a constitutional amendment to raise the ceiling on old age assistance.

"Many people do not realize that this question is not for a decision by Allan Shivers or Ralph Yarborough, but by the people themselves in the November election," the Governor said.

The Governor said misleading statements by Yarborough have confused the people to the point where it is crippling prospects of a fair vote on the amendment.

Shivers said that his opponent, a former district judge, has "never lifted a finger to help increase old age pensions. Instead, he has worked diligently to increase pensions for retired judges."

"If he were really interested in old age pensions, he would have done the same thing for the old people of Texas that he has done for the retired judges. He has appeared before the Legislature urging \$400 a month pensions for judges, but he never has walked the six blocks from his office to the State Capitol, where the Legislature meets, to recommend even so much as one dollar more for the old folks."

"I do not believe he really wants to do anything about old age pensions, or other problems of Texas people, except to use them as a vehicle for meaningless campaign-promises."

Senator George Parkhouse of Dallas, who has just won another four year term without opposition, supported Shivers on his old age assistance record. Parkhouse noted that Shivers wrote the first old age assistance law ever put on the statute books in Texas.

"Allan Shivers told the old people two years ago that he would lend his support to obtain legislative approval of a constitutional amendment to increase old age pensions. The people of Texas will vote on that amendment in November — proof that Allan Shivers carries out his promises."

Parkhouse said while others were making promises to lure the vote of the old people, that the Shivers administration affected a program to absorb all old age assistance administrative costs in the State's general fund, leaving the entire \$35,000,000 yearly limit on welfare spending wholly for that purpose.



news about Shamrock, Texas and is written by our good friend of boyhood days Clark Bumpers. Just a few years back the doctors informed Clark that he wasn't long for these parts. Most of us would be right down and worry ourselves out of part of that precious time. Not so with Clark; "If I only have a few years to go, I'll just see how much happiness that I can bring into the lives of others during that time." It has worked like a miracle; both for the folks of Shamrock and within the life of Clark himself. The clock may stop ticking one of

these days for Clark Bumpers, but the kind deeds of these last few years will go on and on as a living torch for this good man. He is one of the most inspiring stories that we have known—Anyway, he always closes his little column of news with a clever thought—This one we especially liked.

"Blessed is the man that is too busy to worry in daytime and too sleepy to worry at night."

Back to our trip to Colorado and New Mexico. Even though we seem to almost need another

vacation after a few days of trying to catch up on the work that piled up during the trip—we still argue that it was fun; especially the fish we caught. We will be looking and hoping that we can again go to the mountains.

Too, there is a feeling of being ever so close to God and Heaven when we are two miles high up in the mountains. There among the peaks, the rivers of cold mountain water we stand in wonder at the creations of God. Even the flowers have the most beautiful colors and Mama backs me up in this last statement as she is my authority on such things. In the only about four months that can in any way be called the growing season many wonders take place. Then most of the people, most of the cattle go to lower ground and Old Man Winter takes over, so they say.

Our good friend Uncle Bob Robertson helped survey out this country years ago. When he came back to Washburn and began to tell the stories of beauty and good fishing folks from these parts went to see and they have kept on going. From the little town of White Deer someone recently counted some fifteen folks visiting at one time in the town of Lake City.

Typical of many of the folks that we met in Colorado were the owners of the place where we stayed; John Dabney and his wife Mary. While their cattle graze contentedly on the lush grass they spend their summers looking after some dozen cabins and playing host to their regular summer visitors; many who have been coming back for ten to twenty years. Thirty miles up the slopes from Creede these two hard

working and friendly folks spend little time worrying that the mail comes only three times per week and at that the mail box is several miles down the road. Says John: "Every summer it's sort of like a reunion having all the folks either come back to stay or drop by to say hello. We can't quit because they expect us to be here."

Anyway, we had one of the experts put a fly, artificial at that, on our line and ever so bravely we drove and walked to the stream in question. We swung our arms just like the professionals, or so we thought. We aimed for a likely spot in the stream just like the regular fellows. But, something went wrong. The fish scooted out of mossy rocks and went scampering down the creek. We unhooked the poor unsuspecting fly, artificial as he was, from the bushes and tried again. This time the wind blew our line aft and the pole went out to sea. We tried again but it was no use. We carefully folded up the fly, without hurting him one bit, and placed him ever so gently in the tackle box of our neighbor.

Then began a new era in mountain fishing. We hunted out a hook some four sizes larger than those considered good taste to most fishermen, but we were thinking about what the fish might taste. We began stringing Colorado red worms on the hook.

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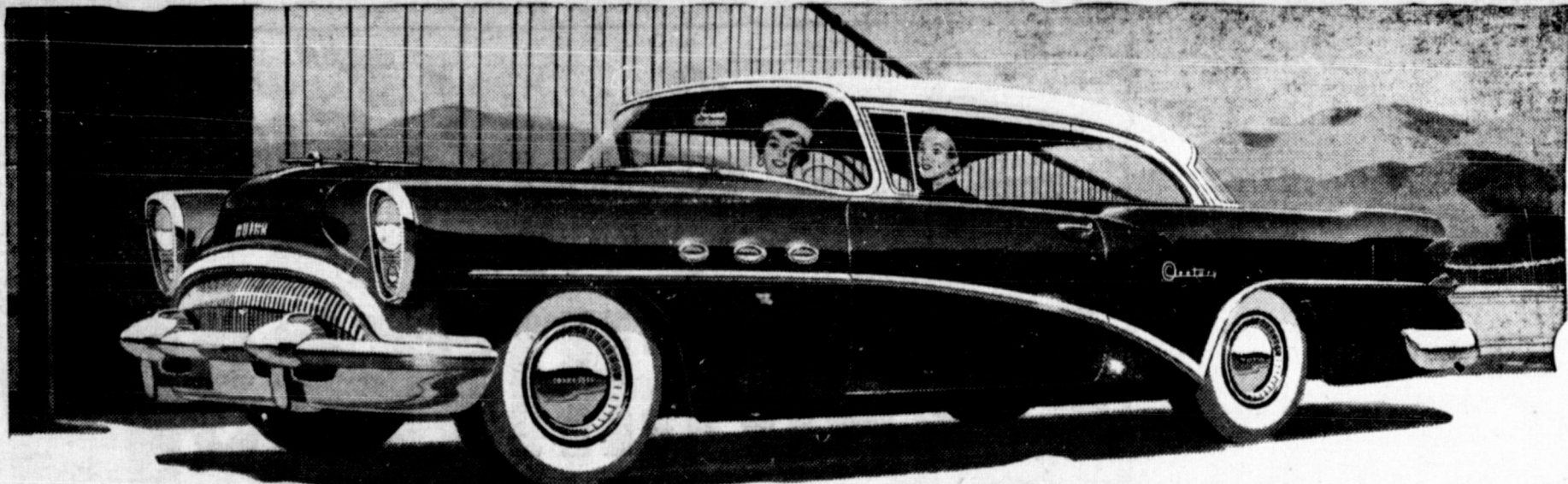

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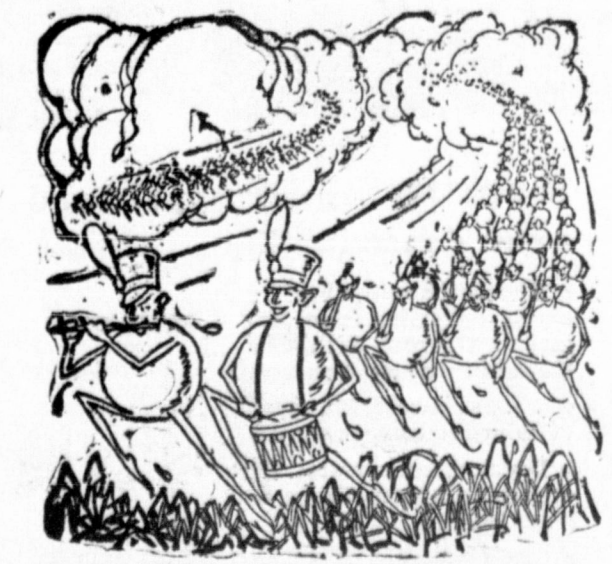
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# Shivers and Sidelights State CAPITOL

AUSTIN—Both candidates in the Texas gubernatorial second primary campaign are off and running.

Only 6,267 votes short of success in the first race, Governor Allan Shivers was encouraged by apparent control, gained at the county conventions, of the September 14 State Democratic Convention at Mineral Wells.

Shivers promised an "around-

the-clock" fight for votes and spurred on his campaign forces over the state in a series of regional pep-talks.

Opening the second primary race with a talk on drought and water problems, Shivers asked Texans to write him of their needs, their water problems, and their suggested solutions.

He also campaigned in some cities by shaking hands on street corners.

Yarborough Is Busy

Shivers' opponent, Ralph W. Yarborough of Austin, also planned to spend much time visiting various parts of the state in a search for votes.

Yarborough said in one speech that "this is the first time in five years that we're going to elect a Democratic governor."

He said he was receiving pledges every day from voters who either opposed him in the first primary or thought his cause was hopeless.

Yarborough scored what he called the "Republican press" for supporting Shivers and accused his opponent of a long list of misdeeds, including the circulation of false charges.

**Wants Water Board**  
Yarborough has called for the creation of a Texas Water Board, patterned after the Railroad Commission, with members elected by the people.

He said that if elected Governor, he would recommend to the

Legislature in January that such a board be established.

Continuing on the water and drought theme, Yarborough proposed the construction of 25 dams over the state, "comparable to those built by the Lower Colorado River Authority."

These dams, he said, should be planned and constructed under the supervision of the water board, and be financed like those built by the LCRA — by bonds which "in 30 to 40 years would pay themselves out by the sale of water alone."

It is Yarborough's contention that "industries are refusing to build in Texas, and some already here are pulling out because of the water shortage."

**What's the Cost?**  
Shivers' supporters got out their scratch pads and tried to figure out what it would cost to carry out the campaign pledges made by Yarborough, including a veteran's bonus, an elaborate tracery of dams on Texas rivers, vastly expanded highways and

huge increases in expenditures for public welfare.

Shivers' calculators contended that the cost amounted to something like \$3.5 billion per year in state taxes.

They pointed out that the present total cost of state government is \$0.5 billion per year, or one-seventh of the other figure.

Yarborough said he wanted the money to come from a tax on gas pipelines.

Shivers' backers point out that such a tax already has been declared unconstitutional.

**Warning System Coming**  
Texas soon will have a modern storm warning system to spot danger miles away by radar, Governor Shivers announced.

Shivers said that completion of the system, called the most up-to-date in the world, will come in the next six weeks.

Already functioning as part of the radar chain are units in 11 cities. The radar net ties into the Department of Public Safety system, giving it Weather Bureau radar reports within two minutes after a warning is issued.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 4, by providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in certain counties if approved by the qualified property-taxpaying voters at an election held for that purpose within such District, prescribing the powers of such District, providing for the submission of the proposition to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of 1954; prescribing the form of ballot, and providing for the necessary proclamation by the Governor and publication of notice.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 4, which shall read as follows: "Section 4. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in counties having a population in excess of 100,000 and in Galveston County, with power to issue bonds for the purchase, acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of any hospital, or where the hospital system is jointly operated by a county and city within the county, and to provide for the transfer to the county-wide Hospital District of the title to any land, building or equipment, jointly or separately owned, and for the assumption by the district of any outstanding bonded indebtedness therefor issued by any county or city for the establishment of hospitals or hospital facilities; to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five (75) cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of all taxable property within such district, provided, however, that such district shall be approved at an election held for that purpose, and that only qualified, property-taxpaying voters in such county shall vote therein; provided further, that such Hospital District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care to needy inhabitants of the county, and thereafter such county and cities therein shall not levy any other tax for hospital purposes; and provided further, that should such Hospital District construct, maintain and support a hospital or hospital system, that the same shall never become a charge against the State of Texas, nor shall any direct appropriation ever be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of the said hospital or hospitals. Should the Legislature enact laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified property-taxpaying voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to pass laws authorizing the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in any county having a population in excess of 100,000 and in Galveston County, and to levy a hospital tax;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in any county having a population in excess of 100,000 and in Galveston County, and to levy a hospital tax."

§ 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

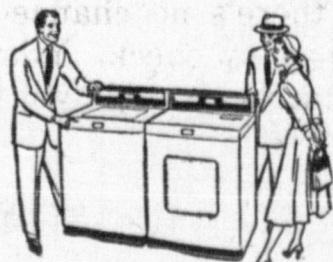

August 5, 1954 WATER-A NUMBER ONE NATIONAL PROBLEM

A new Special Sub-committee of the Interior Committee has been appointed to study the na-

tion's water resources. I was honored to be included as one of the members of this Special Committee. I have long argued that too little attention was being paid to our water problems. In other words, it became the custom in this country to take water for granted, simply because we thought we had plentiful supplies. There was always quite a bit of talk about creating water reserves, but very little was done about it on a national scale. Great

reservoirs were created in the seventeen western reclamation states, and it seemed to be the opinion of everyone that that would settle the problem. The people in the Middle West and the eastern section of the United States apparently did not feel that there was any need for them to be disturbed about possible water shortages. However, the water inventories in recent years have disclosed some very disturbing situations in all the 48 states. This, no doubt, had much to do with the appointment by President Eisenhower of a Cabinet-level group to work with the Hoover Commission and the Committee on Government Op-

ERATIONS CONCERNING THE PROBLEMS. However, until the appointment of the new Special Committee by Chairman Miller, of the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, of the House of Representatives, there was no legislative committee in the position to act legislatively on any recommendations made by the other groups. This new committee will work in close cooperation and coordination with the other groups in putting into legislative form the recommendations of the other groups and thereby formulating a national water policy, in keeping with President Eisenhower's program: Chairman Miller, of the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, called our attention to the old saying, which is quite appropriate at this time, to wit, "No one misses the water until the well runs dry." This reminds me of a story that was told to me when I was a little boy about the Indian who was asked what he considered the greatest benefit that had been

developed by the white man's civilization. The Indian chief, without hesitancy, pointed to the water hydrant and said, "Running water."

It would astound some of the city folk to know just what a meager reserve they have in their water supplies. The problem is certainly a number one defense problem, because saboteurs would have little difficulty in creating absolute chaos in many of our large cities by contamination of the water facilities.

Today we have been considering a bill relating to labeling of packages containing foreign-produced trout sold in the United States, and requiring certain information to appear on the menus of public eating places serving such trout. It seems that a fish war has developed between the domestic trout producers and foreign trout. The battle seems to be taking place in the restaurants. The domestic trout producers

complain that foreign trout is imported into this country and listed on menus as Rocky Mountain trout, eastern brook trout, Rocky Mountain rainbow trout, and various other descriptive names. They claim that this practice is unfair to the domestic producer and the consumer, and that the bill should be passed, requiring foreign trout to be labeled as such on the menus in the eating places throughout this country. They claim that, unless this act is passed, it will mean the bankruptcy of many of the trout farms in this country and the resulting loss of a source of supply for the streams and lakes of this country and trout-fishing will soon be a thing of the past.

is a matter that should be handled primarily by the several states. Federal legislation of this type is a continuing trend toward centralized government. The present administration has repeatedly stated that it opposes centralized government and desires that the trend be toward a preservation of the rights, privileges, powers and immunities in the several states. I find some difficulty in understanding what appears to be good talk and bad practice. Talk is not going to return any rights to the states so long as legislation is daily brought before the Congress that tends to continue to centralize this government.

The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to: (1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month.

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character. The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection. Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 2nd day of November, 1954, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance;" and "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 16a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended and the same is hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 16a. There shall be a Clerk for the District Court of each county, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. The County Commissioners shall perform all the duties which may be prescribed by the Legislature. Sec. 2. That Section 15 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 15. There shall be established in each county in this State a County Court, which shall be a court of record, and there shall be elected in each county by the qualified voters, a County Judge, who shall be well informed in the law of the State; shall be a conservator of the peace and shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. He shall receive as compensation for his services such fees and perquisites as may be prescribed by law. Sec. 3. That Section 18 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 18. Each organized county in the State now or hereafter existing, shall be divided from time to time, for the convenience of the people, into precincts, not less than four and not more than eight. Divisions shall be made by the Commissioners Court provided for by this Constitution. In each such precinct there shall be elected one Justice of the Peace and one Constable, each of whom shall hold his office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified; provided that in any precinct in which there may be a city of 9,000 or more inhabitants, there shall be elected two Justices of the Peace. Each county shall in like manner be divided into precincts, and there shall be elected one Justice of the Peace and one Constable, each of whom shall hold his office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. The County Commissioners so chosen, with the County Justices and Constables, shall compose the County Commissioners Court, which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction as may be conferred by this Constitution and the laws of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed."

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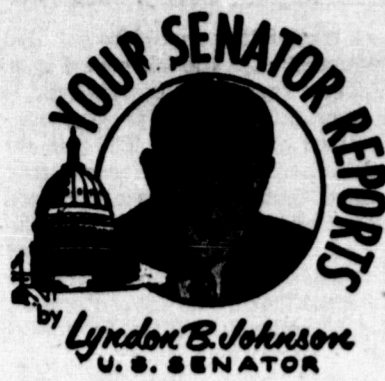

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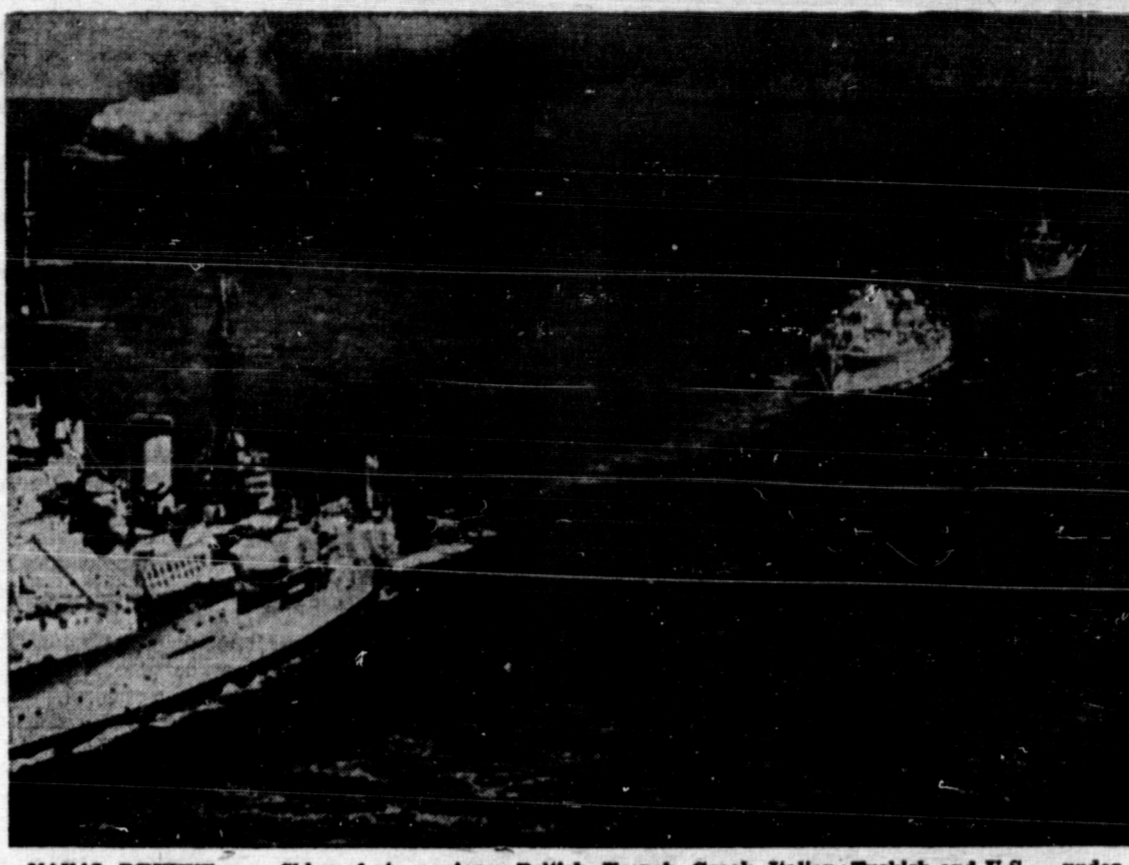
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**RED CHINA AND THE UN:**  
The Senate spoke with one voice against the entrance of Red China into the United Nations. We voted unanimously to write into the foreign aid bill the opposition of Congress to the seating in the United Nations of the Communist China regime as the representative of China. The amendment we adopted also requests President Eisenhower, in the event of Red Chinese admission to the United Nations, to inform Congress "of the implications of this action upon the foreign policy of the United States—together with any recommendations which he may have with respect to the matter." I know, from the many letters I have received on the subject, that this will meet with the ap-

proval of the people of Texas.  
**"CATCH-ALL" MONEY BILL:**  
One of the final actions of the Senate Appropriations Committee during this session was to send to the floor of the Senate a \$2,015,771,000 supplemental appropriation bill. The bill is a sort of "catch-all" for funds which must be made available before Congress adjourns. The measure provides extra money requested by President Eisenhower to carry out the programs of scores of agencies in the current fiscal year. It was \$162,000,000 less than the total requested.  
**MILITARY CONSTRUCTION:**  
The supplemental appropriations bill, as reported by the committee, included substantial sums for military construction. Among specific recommendations were the following:  
The committee voted \$796,000,000 in new funds for Air Force construction at home and abroad. It authorized a total of \$907,000,000. The difference between the two figures will come from money carried over from past years.  
For naval base construction, the

committee approved \$114,000,000 in new funds and a total authorization of \$209,000,000. For Army construction, the sum of \$205,000,000 in new money was approved. Also included was \$175,000,000 for 11,000 military housing units.

The gas industry is a Texas asset of tremendous value. The Supreme Court decision in the Phillips case has caused consternation throughout the industry. An appropriation at this time to enforce it would merely add to

the confusion. Nothing will be lost by postponing a decision on the appropriation until the next session of Congress. Naturally, I was happy that the Senate committee agreed with me and refused the request of

the FPC for the supplemental appropriation.  
**TEXAS ARMY MANEUVERS:**  
It has been announced that the 47th Infantry Division and the First Armored Division will hold special maneuvers in Texas this fall. The ultimate aim is to develop an atomic age army. The maneuvers will be conducted with a view of shaping practically the entire Army into a radically different structure.

There will be smaller divisions but more of them, each independent of the other. A new mobility will be achieved through the use of helicopters and convertiplanes. The convertiplane is a plane which rises like a helicopter but flies close to the speed of ordinary aircraft. So Texas once again will be in the position of making extraordinary contributions to the national security.

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**IMPORTANT TO TEXAS:**  
So far as Texas is concerned, the supplemental appropriations bill also was important for one item it did NOT contain. I refer to the requests of the Federal Power Commission for a supplemental appropriation of \$300,000,000 to handle work expected to arise if the Supreme Court decision in the Phillips Petroleum case stands. This is the natural gas decision of such great concern to Texas. I expressed to Senator Bridges, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, my vigorous opposition to the FPC request for the additional \$300,000,000, making three points: (1) Texas has a motion before the Supreme Court for reconsideration of the decision; (2) I have requested the President to establish a commission to consider the matter and report back with legislative recommendations; (3) Action should not be taken until the FPC has consulted the gas industry and determined the steps it will take once the issue has reached a conclusion.
