It's a job that must be done a year ahead."

The immediate value of recent rains and snow, Merrill explained, is that farmers are able to list and chisel their lands to offer a cloddy or furrowed surface a gainst possible soil movement. The moisture means in most areas that farmers can prepare their land for spring planting with the assurance that they will be able to get a crop up.

The rain and snow of course will give new impetus to young stands of small grain and in some areas already have assured good soil cover, Merrill said.

Grasslands have suffered greatly from drouth and the new moisture will mean good early growth where the more desirable plants
