With the present incidence of chickenpox almost twice as high as records indicate for a seven year median, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, issued a statement today declaring, "It is a great mistake to treat even light cases of childhood diseases such as chickenpox, measles, mumps, scarlet fever or whooping cough as though they did not amount to much. That sort of treatment makes it possible for these diseases to spread and cause serious outbreaks among children and the resulting lowered resistance makes them easy victims to other

Move To Conserve Our Natural Gas

The Legislature should give all-out consideration to the resolution by Rep. W. R. Chambers of Brown County relating to the conservation of Texas natural gas. The resolution very sensibly recognizes both current emergency and long-time aspects of the situation.

The Federal Power Commission has been granting practically all applications for pipelines to export Texas natural gas to other states. And the applications are coming in endless succession. To meet this immediate situation the resolution directs the Railroad Commission of Texas to appear at hearings in opposition to the granting of further applications. Members of the Railroad Commission have been divided in their attitude. Legislative admonition would have a healthful effect..

The deeper problem is the lack of definite information as to the exhaustibility of Texas reserves, the relative powers of national and state regulatory bodies, avoidable waste of gas reserves through "flaring" gas in oil-gas fields and the legal angles on restriction of interest commerce. To meet this situation, the Chambers resolution demands of the Railroad Commission a complete report on the situation involving gas reserves, production and waste. Without such information a wise and consistent state policy is not possible.

Through the haze produced by conflicting testimony, the following is evident: Texas' greatest industrial asset — natural gas—is being piped out of the state at such an increasing rate that supplies will be exhausted in the not distant future. In the much nearer future the supply will be reduced to a point where the market price will be pushed above the level of use as an industrial

Exports to states without a substitute fuel is justifiable. But much of the present export is to the great coal fields of the North and Middle West. Some of the authorities of these states console us Texans by telling us that, when they have exhausted our cheap natural gas supplies, they will manufacture gas from their coal and use the same pipes to ship it to us—at ten times the price they are now paying for our gas. — The Dallas Morning News, (Wed., February 9, 1949.)





Three Major Bills Backed By V.F.W.

AUSTIN — Three major bills backed by the Veterans of Foreign Wars have been introduced in the 81st Congress, according to S. A. Childress, Waco, Texas commander of the VFW.

Congressman James E. Van Zandt, three times commander in chief of the VFW, has introduced a bill for a uniform pension plan to cover veterans of all wars. His bill asks for \$43.20 monthly for a World War I veteran when he reaches age 62, and upon reaching age 65 he would be presumed to be permanently and totally disabled and would receive \$90 monthly. This is the pension now received by Spanish-American War veterans who have attained the age of 65.

For partially disabled World War I veterans who have not reached age 62 the following schedule of pensions would be set up: 25 percent disability, \$32; 50 percent disability, \$72, and 100 percent disability, \$90. Veterans who are totally disabled and who require regular aid and attendance would be paid \$120 monthly under provisions of the bill.

Rep. Edith Nourse Rogers, Mass, has introduced a bill calling for a reduction in income limitations in order to make allowance for the increased spiral in living costs. At present a veteran or his dependent who is receiving a pension cannot earn more than \$1,000 annually if single, or \$2,500 if he has a family. Mrs. Rogers' bill would raise these amounts to \$2,000 income for single and \$3,000 for married veterans or their dependents.

Rep. John Rankin, Miss., has introduced a bill calling for a 25 percent increase in pensions and compensations, which are held to be inadequate under present living conditions.

All three of these bills are based on mandates of the 49th annual convention of the VFW, held in St. Louis last September, and recently approved by the VFW's national legislative committee.

NEW BUILDINGS FOR BAYLOR

Construction of new office space for the accounting office was completed recently at Baylor University, Waco, Texas. Work continues on new buildings for the geology and psychology departments.

What was previously storage space in the basement of Pat Neff Hall has been converted since Christmas into modern offices for the accounting office.

The new buildings being constructed on the corner of Fifth and Dutton streets will house the geology and psychology departments. These four previous barracks obtained from the government are being joined together to form a single building with 10,000 feet of floor space.

KINZINGER ART EXHIBIT DISCUSSED BY PUPIL

Dr. Edmund Kinzinger, chairman of Baylor University's art department, was honored by an art exhibit in the University Union Building recently. The exhibit was the first of a series, and presented 26 paintings by Dr. Kinzinger. Mrs. Watson Arnold, pupil of Dr. Kinzinger, discussed the artist's work.

Included in the exhibit were "Peasant Girl on Steps," which won first award at an exhibit in Austin in 1943, and "Return from the Market," which won first award at a Ft. Worth exhibit in 1941.

In her discussion of Dr. Kinzinger's work, Mrs. Arnold presented the artist as a pioneer of modern art in Texas. She mentioned three phases of Kinzinger's art — abstract, study of round forms, and finally an interest in portraying the Mexican people. She stated further that Kinzinger has "an excellent background," and that he is technically and intuitively a capable painter.

Veterans Taking On-Farm Training Must Submit Reports

West Texas veterans taking institutional on-farm training under the GI Bill must submit reports of their 1948 earnings to the Veterans Administration Regional Office at Lubbock by March 1, 1949, in order to continue receiving subsistence allowances, Robert W. Sisson, VA Regional Manager, said today.

Failure to submit the reports before the deadline may result in suspension of subsistence payments until such time as the reports reach VA.

The reports-covering income from productive labor only, for the calendar year 1948-will be used by VA as the basis for adjusting each veteran'se subsisttence for the current year, 1949.

Under the law, subsistence allowance will be reduced if a veteran's monthly income from productive labor plus his subsistence allowance exceeds \$210 a month if he has no dependents, \$270 if he has one dependent, or \$290 if he has more than one dependent.






