Donley Pioneer Passes Away

Mrs. Louisa Alice Johnson, 78, pioneer Donley county woman and widow of Charles Y. Johnson, died at 5 a. m. Wednesday in Northwest Texas hospital in Amarillo.

Mrs. Johnson suffered a stroke June 17 and had been in the hospital for two weeks. She was an early-day school teacher in Mississippi, and was the daughter of a Confederate soldier.

Funeral services for Mrs. Johnson were held today (Thursday) at 10:30 a. m. from the Church of Christ at Hedley, conducted by Church of Christ Minister E. R. Carver of Amarillo, a long-time friend of the family.

Interment was made in the family plot at Hedley cemetery.

Mrs. Johnson was born Dec. 6, 1870, at Marietta, Miss., the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas J. Nicholson.

As a young woman, she taught school at Cooper, in Delta county, Texas, where she met her husband. She married Charles Y. Johnson on Sept. 24, 1894.

The couple lived in East Texas and in Mississippi until 1910, when they moved to Ballinger. They came to Donley county in 1912.

The Johnsons first made their home in the Giles community. After Mr. Johnson's death on June 1, 1927, the widow lived in Hedley.

Three years ago she moved to Memphis, where she lived until taken to Amarillo for medical care.

Mrs. Johnson's chief interests throughout her life were church work and school affairs.

She is survived by three daughters and four sons.

The daughters are Mrs. Irene Frisbie, Memphis; Mrs. Ruth Schenk, Midland, and Mrs. Zelma Latimer, 207-A West 35th, Amarillo.

The sons are L. H. Johnson of Ft. Worth; Chas. Y. Johnson, 3603 Polk, Amarillo, a Randall county commissioner; Theo Johnson, of 410 East 24th, Amarillo; and T. E. Johnson, 1702 Hughes, Amarillo, editor of The Amarillo Times.

Pallbearers were grandsons, David, Paul Royce and Buck Frisbie; J. M. Dickson and J. D. Woodrell.

The first case of Polio to be reported here this year was Don Thornberry, young son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Thornberry whose ranch home is located about 4 miles southwest of Clarendon.

Dr. J. G. Stewart, county health officer, stated that all symptoms pointed to a sure case of polio and young Don was taken to the West

A late report this morning from Plainview confirmed Dr. Stewart's diagnosis and stated that Don's case was of the Spinal non-paralytic type.

Texas Polio Center at Plainview Wednesday night for treatment. His condition is not considered critical at the present time.

Wilmer Sims, Northwest Texas Representative for the Infantile Paralysis Foundation, stated in a telephone conversation last night that even though a case of polio had been reported there was no need for citizens of this community to become overly alarmed as there was very little possibility of an epidemic if the necessary precautions were observed. He added further that the foundation was standing ready to assist in any manner should there be any other cases reported.

Mrs. Johnny Blocker Jr. is the Donley County chapter chairman and should be contacted if any assistance is needed in regard to polio cases.

The necessary precautions as mentioned above may be defined as follows: Avoid excess in whatever you do whether it is work, play, eating, etc. Practice cleanliness of the body and around your own premises.

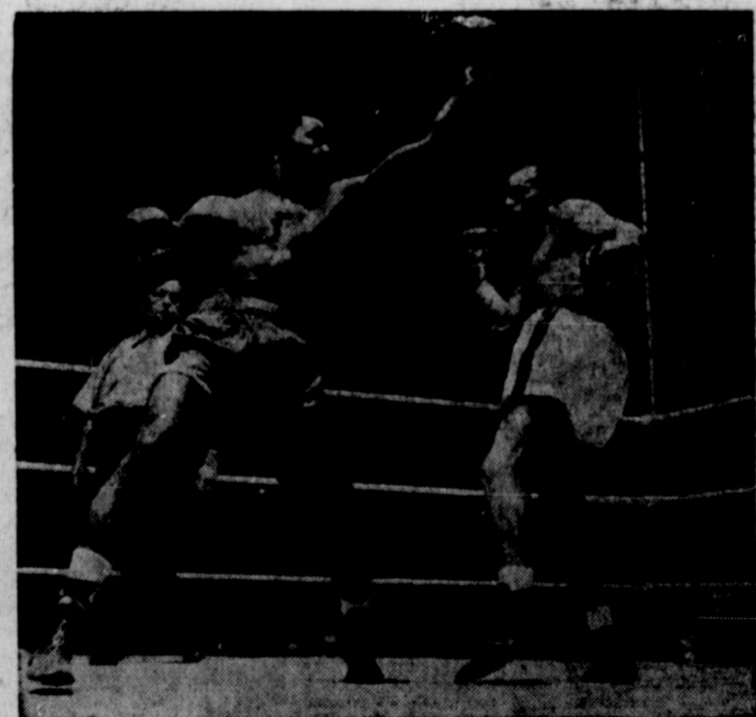
Dr. Stewart reported that according to statistics in regard to polio cases, approximately 80 percent recover without any ill effects whatever; 10 per cent recover with slight after effects, 2 per cent recover but are crippled in some manner and 8 percent die from the disease. Many cases in the 80 percent bracket are never diagnosed.

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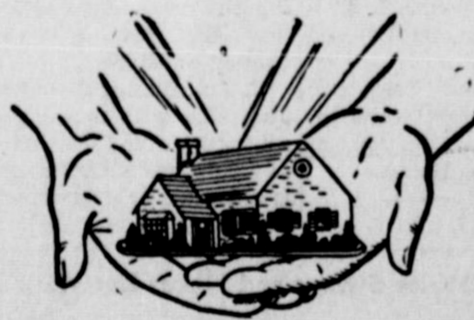

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

Section 2. Every person subject to some of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector...

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election...

Section 8. The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

Section 9. The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Section 10. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on September 24, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereto and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Section 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

Section 2. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, reading as follows:

Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide for a tax not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of county-city health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof"; and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of county-city health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system, authorized by Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State under such plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system, authorized by Section 51f of Article III.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32 proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to read as follows:

Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and the necessary proclamation shall be printed thereon.

Section 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, A. D. 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases"; and "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Section 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

Section 48-d. The Legislature shall have power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts"; and "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts."

The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, returns shall be sent to the Governor canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, he shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Section 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

Section 6. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

LUBBOCK HEADS LIST FOR LIQUOR FINES PAID

During the month of May, 1949 fines and costs accruing from the Texas Liquor Control Board was \$53,641.75. Lubbock headed the list with \$15,316.25 paid in fines and costs. Austin was lowest with \$26.40.

In dry areas, 375 cases were filed with 215 tried and convicted for May. The fines and costs in dry areas alone amounted to \$43,639.65.

In wet areas, 96 cases were filed and 80 convictions resulted in fines and costs of \$10,002.10.

A number of cases were passed to June for want of time for the courts to handle those charged with the various offenses, however, 215 convictions were had in dry areas to 80 for the wet areas.

Revenue derives from the liquor business in Texas for May, 1949 was \$903,853.11. Liquor stamp sales accounted for \$407,069.26; malt liquor 6,095.26; beer stamps for 362,659.70; wine stamps for 58,551.34; permits and licenses for 63,912; confiscated sales for 4,248.50 and miscellaneous for 1,317.05.

Collections at the bridges that cross the Rio Grande brought in 19,776.21 during the month of May.

Eleven illicit stills were captured during the same month. Four in Titus, 2 in Grimes, and

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one each in Henderson, Dallas, Harrison, Marion and Harris counties.

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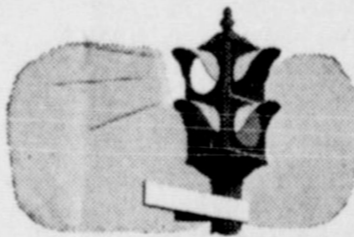

Free Cotton Classing And Market News Service For Farmers

Plans for handling the 1949 cotton classing and market news services available to farmers without cost under the Smith-Doxey Act were announced today by J. A. Albritton, in charge of the Altus, Oklahoma office of the cotton branch, Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

"Farmers should apply for these services just as they did last year," Mr. Albritton said.

To be eligible for the free cotton classing and market news services, he pointed out that farmers must meet these requirements:

1. Belong to a group of farmers organized to promote the improvement of cotton.

2. Plant part of his acreage in the variety of cotton adopted by the group.

3. File an application as soon as the cotton is planted.

Groups in this area should mail their application to P. O. Box 249, Altus, Oklahoma.

"To make sure farmers secure all the benefits due them under this program, their group application should reach our office by July 1," Mr. Albritton said. However, applications will be accepted until August 15th.

Burlington Lines Awarded Citation By Safety Council

A special award of honor for exceptional service to safety has been conferred on the Burlington Lines by the National Safety Council in connection with its centennial anniversary celebration.

The citation to the railroad states:

"The prevention of accidents to its passengers and employees has been the steadfast goal of Burlington Lines since its founding 100 years ago. The success of its resolute efforts over the century is proved by its outstanding record and the consistent improvement in that record, year after year.

"In every year since 1930, the employee casualty rate of Burlington Lines has been substantially below the average rate of all Class I railroads. And in 1948 its rate not only was 20 per cent better than in 1947, but was 35 per cent better than the average—a conspicuous achievement in a safety-conscious industry."

In connection with the award announcement, Ned H. Dearborn, president of the Council, said: "On its centennial anniversary, the railroad should be honored not just for the passage of years, but for what it has achieved during the past century. In accident prevention, its achievement has been noteworthy, and the Council's award is richly deserved."

Health Notes

As long as cases of diphtheria occur, a child is in danger unless protected by immunization. The germs throw off a powerful poison which goes all through the body. It is particularly harmful to the heart, blood vessels, nerves and kidneys, and serious complications often accompany the disease. Some of the more dangerous complications are broncho-pneumonia, to which the patient is particularly susceptible; paralysis, which may last for days or for as long as 3 or 4 months; or permanent injury to heart, nerves or kidneys.

"There is a widespread belief that once immunity is established, it lasts forever," the State Health Officer said. "This is not always true. In some cases it diminishes and finally dies out, and reinoculation is necessary in order to protect the child.

"Every child who will enter school next term should be inoculated or Schick tested now, because it takes from three to nine months for immunity to be completely established after the injection is administered."

"The best thing to do with diphtheria, is to stop it before it starts," Dr. Cox said. "When toxoid is injected under the skin, the system manufactures a disease-fighting antitoxin which can successfully resist the disease. Children of school age should be inoculated or Schick tested now, so that immunity will be established or nearly so, before the opening of the next school term."

This office is sure a busy place these days. Our most important customers are the fellows who come to the office to get Wheat Loans. When the harvest began, we did not think that we would have many Warehouse Storage Loans because of the shortage of storage. However, at the present

time, we have more Warehouse Loans than we do Farm Storage Loans. Those who have Warehouse Loans are: Pink M. Marshall, W. F. Warden, Raymond Farr, Elred James, E. L. Littlefield, F. L. Goldston, Billy Jones, A. E. Littlefield, George Gillham, Bobby Jones, T. E. Jones, and L. T. Shelton. Those having Farm Storage Loans are: C. C. Hearn, H. A. Graham, G. E. Kinslow, Joe McMurtry, E. P. Hahn, Nolie G. Simmons, Leo Smith, H. C. Tho-

mas, T. L. Speir, and H. Swinney. If you are interested in a Wheat Loan, please come to the office and let us help you.

We received notice this week from the State Office that potatoes for livestock feed are available once more. The price for these potatoes will be 35c per hundred pounds, and there will be 300 sacks to a car. The potatoes will be sold in car load lots only. It is permissible for several producers to go together and order one car. If you want some of these potatoes please come to the office and we will be glad to order them for you.

We sent out notices to all producers having approvals for seeding grass the first of the month asking them to please make a report on this practice. If you have not done this, please do so at once or your approval will be cancelled and you will receive no payment on this practice.

Since the harvest is nearing completion, the terracing business is picking up. There are quite a few producers who have made application to terrace their wheat land. They are: Sam Lowe, Roy Roberson, M. G. Helton, Gerald T. Knight, William H. Read, Alton DeBord, A. E. Ranson, and H. K. Leathers. Approvals have been issued to Claude Moore, Les Duerson, and John Ward. They expect to get the work started on their terraces this week. Our budget is not as large as we would like for it to be, but we spent so much money on terraces and other practices the first of the year, that our money was gone before we knew it. We will do our best to help everyone we can to get terraces. If you do want to terrace your wheat land, please come to the office and make an application for your ap-

proval. Walter O. Simmons has his application in for an Earthen Dam. Lonnie and LeRoy Widener have an approval to Eliminate some Mesquite from their Pasture Land.

Jim Lumpkin, who has been the Administrative Officer in Kent County, is working with us, in this office, until the first of the month when he will go to some county in District 1 or 2. We are always glad to have any of our old clerks back with us for awhile.

You are welcome to come to see us at any time. Your questions and problems are our responsibilities.

'Hopper Menace Met With Poison Spray

Spraying with Toxaphene and Chlorodane for control of grasshoppers in Donley county is giving good results. County agent H. M. Breedlove stated that reports from farmers using the chemical are very good and some reports are as high as 95 percent kills on the areas sprayed. Breedlove advises that due to the high vegetation that four pints of 43.5 percent Toxaphene be used per acre, added to enough water to cover one acre. The amount of water added to the four pints of Toxaphene would be determined by the amount of water to cover one acre.

Breedlove has poison bran on hand at this time but due to the heavy vegetation no bran has been issued up to this time because the Toxaphene spray is giving so much better results. The bran will be used later on in the summer when the vegetation dries up due to hot dry weather.

Every one having trouble with grasshoppers is advised to call by the office of the county agent. Breedlove warns that a good control program on grasshoppers this summer could mean that the infestation next year would be much less because the more hoppers we can kill this year, then the less hoppers there will be to lay eggs for next year. Chemicals are available for the hopper control and the results are "alarming" as to how many can be killed if it is applied as recommended.
