Light Vote Cast In Tues. Election

Only about one-third of the voters of Donley County went to the polls Tuesday to cast their ballot according to the vote that was cast in the first primary With three small boxes still unreported Wednesday afternoon, a total of 752 ballots were cast. Of the eleven constitutional amendments to be voted on, five of them carried in Donley County. These are No. 1, 3, 4, 10 and 11. From the latest state-wide report, all eleven amendments were carrying.

In the congressional race Walter Rogers was re-elected by - a large majority with LaMaster carrying only two counties out of the 28 county district. Here in Donley County, Walter Rogers received 514 and Pete LaMaster received 181. These figures were incomplete but will be affected very little by the three small boxes still out.

The National picture revealed a landslide victory for the Democrats in the House of Representatives but the Senate majority looked like it would stay in the hands of the Republicans.


