The Clarendon volunteer Fire Department started a drive this week to raise \$616 dollars to buy a Resuscitator, a life saving machine which will be located at the local Fire Department at all times and will be available to anyone needing the machine in the county free of charge. This machine will administer artificial respiration in all cases where this method of treatment is required. The Resuscitator is something that has been needed here for a long long time. No one knows when it will be needed next and in the past the only method available here was artificial respiration by hand or physical means.

Members of the fire department didn't want to go around and ask for outright donations unless it was absolutely necessary, so they are offering those who enjoy dancing an opportunity to buy tickets for their Fireman's Ball which will be held the evening of St. Patrick's Day, March 17th at the Clarendon Opera House. The tickets will sell for \$1.50 each. If you do not like to dance or do not approve of dancing, you are asked to hand or mail your donation to Carl Bennett, B. C. Antrobus, George Green or any other member of the fire department as every penny will be needed to pay for this machine which will be available for your use as well as anyone else.

The resuscitator will be kept at the Fire station where there is someone to answer the phone any hour, day or night and rush the machine to the person in need with no obligation or cost to anyone.

Mr. Carl Bennett pointed out a number of the features of the machine and instances where it could save a life which we will reprint here. It eliminates bodily pressure on injured patients who have been severely burned or injured in an auto accident. Due to the principle of fixed pressure the Resuscitator automatically adjusts itself to the volume of the patient's lung whether it be a tiny premature infant or a large adult. It automatically inhales and exhales for a non-breathing patient at a near normal rate and supplies oxygen at the same time. It will breathe at the rapid rate of a newborn baby or the slower rates of a child or adult patient. It has a double connection whereby two different persons may be taken care of at the same time. It can handle a severe polio case until the patient is delivered to a polio hospital where iron lungs are available.

It eliminates the possibility of administering artificial respiration to a patient in whose lungs an exchange of air is not possible because of an obstruction in the upper air passages. It immediately signals to the operator if such an obstruction is present. Sufficient suction is developed by the aspirator to remove the ordinary obstructions such as mucus, water, froth, etc. It is also a handy machine to have available in cases of severe heart attacks, drownings, strangulations, asphyxia and many other cases. Don't forget the dance date, March 17th at 8 p. m. and also to buy your tickets or give your money. The machine is due to arrive here within the next few days and will be displayed in some store window on main street.

I would not hesitate to say, that all; in our more serious times of meditation become amazed, with our own conclusions. Thousands of people know, this is no imaginary theory of the past, but with them it is a reality. Their former association, with so called religion, has left one answer in their mind. Their answer can be summed up in one word "Bosh."

congregation, there are some, more or less imbued with Infidelity, who do not avow it. They are not confirmed skeptics; but satan's grand effort to prevent their commencing repentance, or seeking the pardon of sin, is made by suggesting unbelieving doubts. The minister who has been long hoping for their conversion to God, never was thus harrassed himself, and does not dream of their real condition. Again there are countless thousands of the youthful and uninformed, who are thus kept inactive. Temptations of unbelief cripple and prevent their turning to God.

The adversary of souls would not have people, of religious intent, to grow in grace. To prevent it, he injects into their minds, cold, unbelieving doubts, which will retard their march to Eternity. From the street corner, to the pulpit, these doubts are injected into the hearts of the young and unlearned, leaving a trail, of wickedness and heart

break. Infidelity is now growing and spreading to an extent the blindness of the Church does not suspect: pocket volumes of false statements; infidel manuals; printed perversions of history, etc. are spreading profusely; while opposite publications are growing more rare.

There are many thousands more in our land, now growing up in the darkest unbelief, than is known or suspected by any, except those, who once themselves fought in that division of Satan's army.

Those who read on this subject in the Church, are few; and christians are to a great extent, but poorly qualified to instruct, or to answer the objections of skeptics against their holy religion.

It has a bad influence on the youthful spectator who notices a leader in society, "a gray headed professor," unable to answer the cavil on an uninformed mocker. It has a bad influence on our youthful inquirer, who applies for assistance against some sophism of Infidelity, to one of God's people, and does not receive it. Is not the age of Infidelity approaching, along with the time of terrible judgments? In a great part of Europe, are not large masses of the population almost total atheist? **Health Notes**

In a vigorous campaign to elevate the State health level by preventing the spread of communicable diseases which might be transmitted by foods, the State Department of Health is conducting training schools for food handlers in all sections of Texas, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Food handlers are being instructed in sanitary methods of preparing, handling, and serving food for public consumption," Dr. Cox said. "Actual experience has shown that an insanitary eating establishment is one of the surest sources of spreading infection. The lack of proper sanitation in food handling is a definite menace to public health and our goal

is the education of cooks, waiters, butchers, bakers, fountain men, and all other food handlers to such a level as will insure an elimination of this health hazard."

The training schools consist of elementary courses in bacteriology, communicable diseases, medical zoology, foods, disinfection, sterilization, personal hygiene, and sanitation.

Since the program was instituted about 8 years ago, more than 400 schools have been conducted, with a total of over 25,000 food handlers receiving their certificates of completion in the courses.

Arrangements for such a food school can be made through any county health unit, by requesting the service from the Division of Health Education, State Department of Health, Austin, Texas.



**Public Hearing On Road Bill No. 59 Mon., March 7**

AUSTIN—Delegations of farmers, ranchers, county officials, dairymen, school officials, rural letter carriers and business men are expected to converge on Austin, Monday, March 7th, to attend a public hearing before the House Revenue and Taxation Committee on Representative C. S. McLellan's bill No. 59.

This bill proposes an occupation tax on the production of natural gas for the purpose of building a system of local county rural roads of a type not now included

in the State Farm-to-Market road program.

"The future of the small town business man is as vitally affected by this measure as that of the farmers themselves," according to Jim Cantrell, Princeton banker and president of the Texas Rural Roads Association, sponsors of a plan calling for a 10-year program to build 10,000 miles of rural farm roads each year, to be paid for, in part, by using a portion of the tax proceeds from natural gas.

"Our natural resources are a capital asset and it is only prudent that the State adopt a policy of placing some of this tax yield into permanent improvements

which will remain long after the natural resources that have meant so much to us, no longer remain to be taxed. It is highly important that every citizen in Texas interested in rural roads attend this meeting," Mr. Cantrell said.

"It is of vital importance to the future of Texas that our school systems be served by busses traveling over all-weather roads and that the farmers have the benefits derived from such uninterrupted transportation. I urge each public official in this State to bring a delegation to this hearing," said Judge John S. Simmang, Giddings, president of the State Association of County Judges and Commissioners.

According to C. H. Davis, Austin, Rural Letter Carriers of Texas Road Chairman, the rural people of Texas are not interested in super-duper highways, all they want is a road over which the mail carrier can travel every day in the year.

Mr. Davis estimated that less than 30 per cent of the 82,000 miles of rural mail routes in Texas are of all-weather roads.

"As Texas' basic economy is agriculture, the farmers who are interested in a program that will build the type and miles necessary to bring them out of the

mud, should appear before this committee hearing in support of H. B. 59," urged Loyd D. Barbour, Wichita county farmer and chairman of the Texas Farm Bureau Rural Roads Committee.

It is Mr. Barbour's opinion that the bill is designed to place the administration on a local basis, in the hands of local authorities, who know best the type of road and location necessary. "Such a plan," he said, "is practical, as there is nothing wrong with local administration that an election every two years can not cure."

The Texas Farm Bureau has for many years been very active in their support of a system of all-weather roads to serve the rural people of Texas.

"Statements are frequently made," Rep. C. S. McLellan, Eagle Lake, author of House Bill 59, said, "that when the present so-called Farm-to-Market road program is completed, 90 per cent of our farmers will be within one mile of a highway. It is this last mile we seek to improve and make all-weather."

The Texas Rural Roads Association was formed last year as a non-profit group, pledged to devote their highest cooperative efforts toward establishing a low-cost system of permanent all-weather rural farm roads.

"We are 100 per cent in accord with Governor Jester's plan to appropriate twenty million dollars from the General Fund surplus to carry on the State Highway Department's Farm-to-Market program," said Co. J. I. McGregor, central Texas automobile distributor of Temple, a Vice President of the Texas Rural Roads Association, "but our program is separate and distinct from this State program. We want to build those low-cost county roads that will link the farm and ranch to the State farm-to-market paved roads."

**Farm Cash Income For 1948 Shows Slight Decrease**

AUSTIN — Farm cash income in Texas amounted to \$1,658,952,000 in 1948, a 12-percent drop from the all-time high in 1947, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Representing principally the drop in crop prices, income from all farm products except grain sorghum, wool, hogs, poultry, milk products, peanuts, and flaxseed was below the 1947 level.

Dollar income for 1948 was above a year earlier in the East Texas Timbered Plains (up 2 per cent), Edwards Plateau (up 6 per cent), Trans-Pecos (up 11 per cent) and South Texas Plains (up 17 per cent), while other crop-reporting districts showed less income in 1948.

Farm income fell 36 per cent from the 1947 level in Northern High Plains, 24 per cent in Southern High Plains, and 16 per cent in Red Bed Plains.

Totaling \$1,658,952 in December 1948, farm cash income dropped 51 per cent from November.

All farm districts except the Lower Rio Grande Valley (up 4 per cent) turned in decreases ranging from 5 per cent in the South Texas Plains to 68 per cent in the Red Bed Plains.

After adjustment for seasonal variation, the Bureau's index of farm cash income dropped from 395 per cent of the prewar base (1935-39) period in November to 337 in December 1948. A year earlier, the index stood at 547.

In comparison with December 1947, farm income in December 1948 was off 38 per cent. Income lagged in all crop-reporting districts except Coastal Prairies, where income rose 21 per cent. Sizable decreases from December 1947 were registered by Southern High Plains, 63 per cent; Black and Grand Prairies, 56 per cent; Lower Rio Grande Valley, 43 per cent; Northern High Plains, 41 per cent; and Red Bed Plains, 38 per cent.




