Such a scheme is suggested to anyone planning an occasional picnic, party or other out-of-doors activity. Or apply the insecticides to areas where the family sits or plays in the yard.

One pound of five percent dust of either of the insecticides applied to 1,000 square feet of lawn area is recommended by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The dusts are available from most feed, drug and grocery



Clyde Slavin reports that his cattle prefer Sand Lovegrass to Johnson grass. This observation was made recently by Slavin, owner and operator of a 1600 acre ranch 5 miles northwest of Hed-

A few weeks ago Siavin turned his cattle into a field of young and succulent Johnson grass; however, the cattle watered in an adjoining field of seeded Sand Lovegrass. The cattle grazed the Sand Lovegrass almost excelusively and finally he had to remove them from the field to prevent overgrazing the Lovegrass.

A cooperator with the Donley Soil Conservation District for a number of years, Slavin has seeded about 500 acres of cropland back to grass, most of which has been Sand Lovegrass. He planted about 200 acres of this grass this





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
