



PRICE SUPPORT PROVISIONS BROADENED TO INCLUDE LOWER TEST WEIGHT RYE

The U.S. Department of Agriculture August 23rd announced that because of adverse weather conditions in the rye-producing area 1954-Crop rye price support provisions have been broadened to include light weight rye that otherwise would not be eligible for support.

The lighter weight rye included under the broadened provisions will be Grade No. 4 or Sample grade on test weight only, but rye testing less than 40 pounds per bushel will not be eligible for support. The light weight rye will be discounted 4 cents for each pound below the minimum test weight (52 pounds a bushel) for Grade No. 3 rye.

seasons in Texas. These fields are the first to suffer damage when dry winds start to blow. Yet, time after time, cover crops have proven to be an important factor in preventing this waste. We should take advantage of this knowledge.

Government authorities recognize this fact. As a result, a recent change in the Agricultural Conservation Program makes any farmer or rancher eligible to apply for cost-sharing of planting cover or green manure crops on crop-land which will be shifted from production next year. The ACP authorizes payment of up to 50 percent of the cost of seedbed preparation, fertilizer, lime and seed for establishing cover crops on such land.

The main purpose of this aid is to provide adequate protective cover. But such crops can also provide emergency winter pasture for livestock. In many cases, this will be the only home-grown roughage available this winter and therefore could be extreme

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

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
