STATE COLLEGE, Miss. - A new production for Texas junior vegetable gardeners, with \$6,000 in awards, has been announced by Chesley Hines, extension horticultural specialist, Mississippi State College, southern regional chairman of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Associa-

In announcing the NJVGA's ninth annual production-marketing contest, Hines pointed out that all Lone Star State boys and girls between ages of 14 and 21 are eligible to compete for A&P Food Stores' \$6,000 in agricultural scholarships. 



Veterans training under the GI Bill-as well as their schools and training establishments - will have less paper work to do under a simplified reporting system which goes into effect April 1, Veterans Administration Regionsaid last week.

After that date, VA no longer will require monthly progress re-

Instead, reports of conduct and progress will be incorporated in a report of earnings, which veterans now file and which they will continue to submit to VA every four months.

As a result of the new procedure. VA Regional Offices will process at least 5,000,000 fewer forms a year, with an appreciable savings in clerical work.

Schools below college level after April 1 also will report veterans progress and conduct on the VA report of earnings.

The one pag report is simple The veteran merely provides necessary information, signs his name and turns the form over to the official of the school or trainthe official of the school or training establishments, who reports Army-Navy Store on conduct and progress and, when appropriate, earnings over the past four months.

As in the past, colleges and universities will not submit reports of conduct and progress, except to notify VA in case of those students for whom conduct or progress has been unsatisfactory.

VA emphasized that schools and training establishments must continue to report promptly the discontinuance of any veteran from training.

VA urges veterans to make certain the required reports of earnings reach the VA Regional Office at Lubbock before the tenth of the month following the date the reports are due.

Failures to submit reports in time might result in delays in subsistence checks, the VA Regional Manager said.
