## Donley Requests To Be Added to Drought Relief Counties

H. M. Breedlove, county agent for Donley County, announced this morning that a request had gone from Donley County to the Governor of Texas. The Commissioner of Agriculture and the chairman of the state drought relief committee for Donley County to be added to the drought relief counties for Texas. Farmers, ranchers and dairymen at a meeting in the conference room of the agent's office requested the drought aid for this county. The drought feed program this year, if approved for Donley County, will be handled by the local Farmers Home Administration; they will take applications and the FHA committee will approve or disapprove them. Applications that are approved for drought aid will be sent to the local PMA office where a purchase order will be issued for the feed desired.

Mr. James Gouddy, local supervisor for the FHA in Donley County said that the types of feed that could be bought under the drought program were corn, barley, oats, sweet feed, grain sorghum and hay. Mr. Gouddy stated that one dollar per hundred was taken off the price for the grains above and one half the freight rate on baled hay shipped into the county. Mr. Gouddy further stated that the program was for basic herds of breeding cattle and basic herds of dairy cattle. The drought committee that functioned last year is no longer in existence as the entire drought feed program has been shifted to the Farmers Home Administration.

The local FHA office will be notified when the request that Donley County be placed on the drought list is approved.

## New Shop Building For Lelia Lake Vocational Ag Dept.

A new block construction shop building has recently been completed at Lelia Lake for the new vocational agriculture department at that school. The new agriculture shop building is the first in the county to be built by a school district for their agriculture department. Hedley and Clarendon both have shop buildings which were turned to them by the Donley County Vocational School at the completion of that institutions' term of instruction last fall.

The building is located in the northwest portion of the Lelia Lake school-ground and has a large space surrounding the building for parking space for materials being worked on at the shop. The Lelia Lake F.F.A. boys are busy putting the final touches on the building and building work benches and cabinets. Shop equipment will be moved into the building within the next two weeks, and will include arc and acetylene welding, pipe sets, tap and die sets, and other necessary equipment for a well equipped school farm shop.

S. foreign policy and military power in the hydrogen age. Few people are as well qualified to speak or write on this subject as is Mr. Finletter. His background, his brilliance of mind, and his expressive ability have created a very tasty bit of literature for those who have

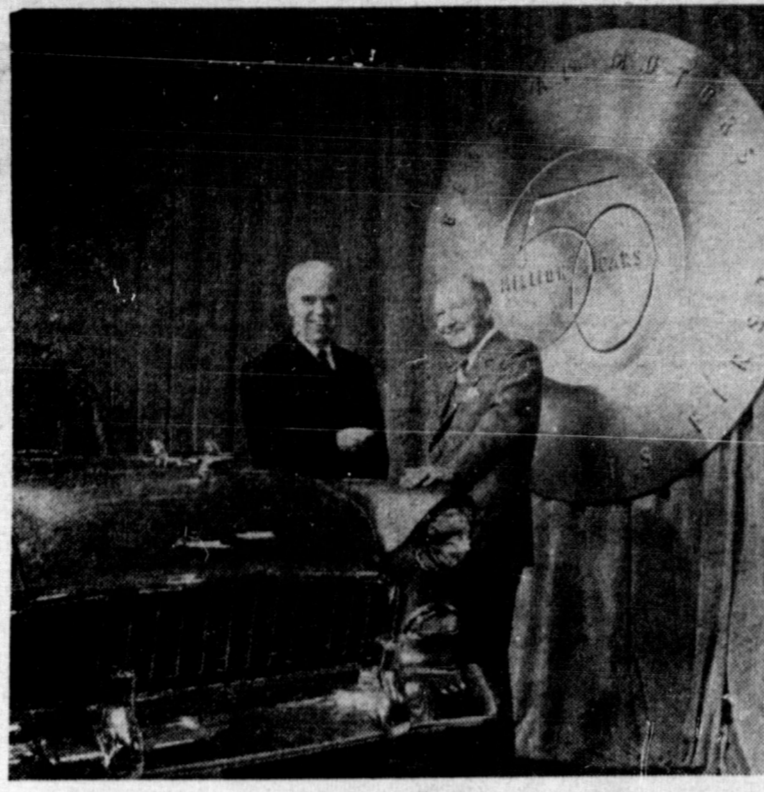
great interest in what can or may happen. It points up with crystal clearness matters that need effective attention immediately. Whether one agrees with him or not, the gravity of the problem and the urgent need for an early solution could not have been brought to a better focus than by this book.

Mr. Finletter has been favorably mentioned on numerous occasions as a possible choice for National Democratic Chairman. I can think of none who would be better qualified nor more able to render this country the great service that can find its source in this office. My conclusions in this respect are based upon my experiences in working with Mr. Finletter during his service as Secretary of The Air Force and

**Russian Shell Game**

The Reds are now playing the old well known shell game in their international relations. Their game is to keep the rest of the world guessing on where the next crisis will occur. In playing this game, they keep a continual pressure at all times on all fronts without relaxation. The crisis in Korea quickly shifted to Indo-China, with small crises cropping up in Berlin, Guatemala, Egypt, The Near East, Algeria, Formosa, Quemoy, and the plane incidents which seem to have been strategically timed and placed by the Reds. Many of the writers and commentators at the present time are guessing that the real hidden crisis lies in Quemoy, an island which lies just off the Red China coast. You will recall the pressure that has been exerted in this particular area by the Reds. This has been considered by many as the forerunner of the attempted invasion of Formosa. This situation is receiving much consideration at the present time by the State Department here and the governments of our allies. The questions concerning Formosa and the surrounding islands are very explosive, both from a domestic standpoint and an international standpoint. There is a distinct division in the Senate thinking as to what part Formosa should play if a third world war is to be avoided. Watch for much news on this subject and this area in the near future.

**PROBLEMS IN THE U. S. (Unstatutory FEPC)**

Many people think that if a law is not passed by the Congress, it is not a law and cannot be enforced. This conclusion is basically sound and, according to the Constitution, is exactly correct. However, much as I regret it, that theory seems to have become outmoded. It has apparently been supplanted by what is known as a "Presidential Directive." For example, the Congress has never passed a law dictating to a man who he can or cannot hire in his business. However, under a Presidential directive, a business man cannot get a contract with the Government unless he is willing to comply with certain Fair Employment Practice requirements that do not leave him free to act independently. Several other directives of the same nature concerning other segments of the economy are now in the making. It will be nothing less than the use of economic pressure to force compliance with rules and regulations that have not been enacted into law in conformity with the procedure outlined in the Constitution. This is dangerous business.

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**Mail Xmas Presents For Distant Places Immediately**

In purpose, if not appearance, Postmaster J. C. Estlack recalls the officers on those dramatic World War II recruiting posters that reminded passers-by, "Uncle Sam Needs You!"

The battle, in this case, is a-

gainst time. Christmas cards and gift packages are arriving at Post Office headquarters far too slowly. As a result, immediate cooperation from the public must be enlisted.

"The big danger is that commercial shipments and incoming Christmas mail may slow-up the outgoing operation. Poorly-wrapped packages have also complicated our work a great deal," the

Postmaster said today. Cancellation machines now register about 5,000 pieces of mail per day. At the peak of the Christmas season, they will average 10,000 daily clicks. To avoid unnecessary delays, and speed-up delivery by Christmas Eve, Postmaster Estlack advises every one to:

"Mail your Christmas presents for distant states immediately, and all others before December 10. Christmas cards for out-of-town delivery should be posted before December 15, and those with local addresses at least a week before Christmas.

"But first be sure that each gift is carefully wrapped and tied. Print the complete address, and return address, if your handwrit-

ing is at all shaky. We have already been forced to return many Christmas gifts as 'undeliverable' for these two reasons."

At present, parcel post is considerably behind schedule. Only Christmas cards are being mailed with some consistency. Gratifying as this is, the Postmaster anticipates still another rush when unexpected greetings breeze in from forgotten friends. He laughed, "Better pick up a few air mail and special delivery stamps today. It always happens!"

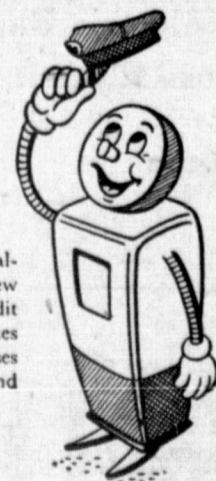

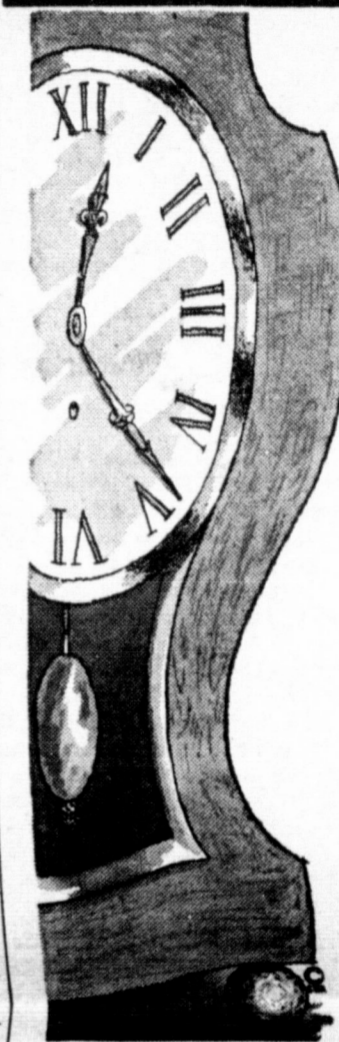

AUSTIN — Attorney General John Ben Shepperd's office is engaged in another investigation.

This time it's a multi-pronged one in which the state auditor, the department of public safety and DeWitt County Attorney Wiley Cheatham are also interested.

It has to do with the one hundred million dollar veteran's land program.

Managing Editor R. K. Towery of the Cuero Record unearthed the story.

He discovered that some Texas veterans in and around Cuero had signed up for what they thought was a free bonus of land, only to learn that they had purchased land with down payments they had never made.

Towery said promoters sold large tracts of land to groups of veterans, that the veterans had never seen the land, had never made a payment on it, and had no means of paying for it.

They are also checking appraisals.

State Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, whose office administers the program, said that he would "stand behind the appraisals in their entirety."

According to Cheatham, the county attorney's investigation revealed "a rotten, stinking mess that ought to be aired out before the people."

**Identical Bids**

Another investigation being undertaken by the Attorney General has to do with identical bids for electrical supplies for the capitol city.

Under scrutiny are identical bids for \$32,122.80 which four firms gave the Austin City Council on underground cable.

**Dope Traffic Eyed**

Texas' new law providing imprisonment or hospitalization for dope addicts will get its test in Austin soon.

Charges were filed here against six men and women, following 17 arrests by city and county officers and Texas Rangers last week, in a raid on a small Congress avenue hotel.

Narcotic agents said recently that Austin is rapidly being drawn into "an alarming and expanding black market drugs problem."

**Radar Roundup**

Highway patrolmen, armed with radar, have already nabbed 11 central Texas speeders.

Warned were 63 others.

These automatic eyes are being placed on principal highways throughout the state.

**Financing Freeways**

Bond financing to provide needed state highway construction has been advocated.

Executive Director James E. Taylor of the Texas Motor Transportation Association asked for dedication of one per cent of the

present four-cent gas tax for highways.

He says the plan would provide immediate construction of 1,000 miles of four-lane freeways.

**Amendments Effective Now**

Proclamations declaring the recently voted amendments part of the constitution have been issued by Governor Allan Shivers and Secretary of State C. E. Fulgham.

Amendments provide for women jurors, higher pay for members of the Legislature, longer terms for some public officials, and increased pensions for the aged.

There is talk here of a suit by some members of the Legislature to test the attorney general's ruling made prior to the election, that the public officials amendment did not extend Legislator's terms to four years.

**DWI Penalties**

Three days in jail is the mini-

mum penalty for drunk driving and the judge may not reduce the sentence.

That was the decision of the Court of Criminal Appeals in the case of an El Paso man.

Held unconstitutional by the decision was that part of the Texas law which authorized the judge to commute the jail sentence in drunk driving cases.

**Desegregation Procedure**

Desegregation in Texas' public schools must be a gradual undertaking, the U. S. Supreme Court has been told.

A written brief, handed the court by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, warned that violence would be the price of rapid transition.

Shepperd also asked that programs for carrying out the desegregation order be left to local school districts.

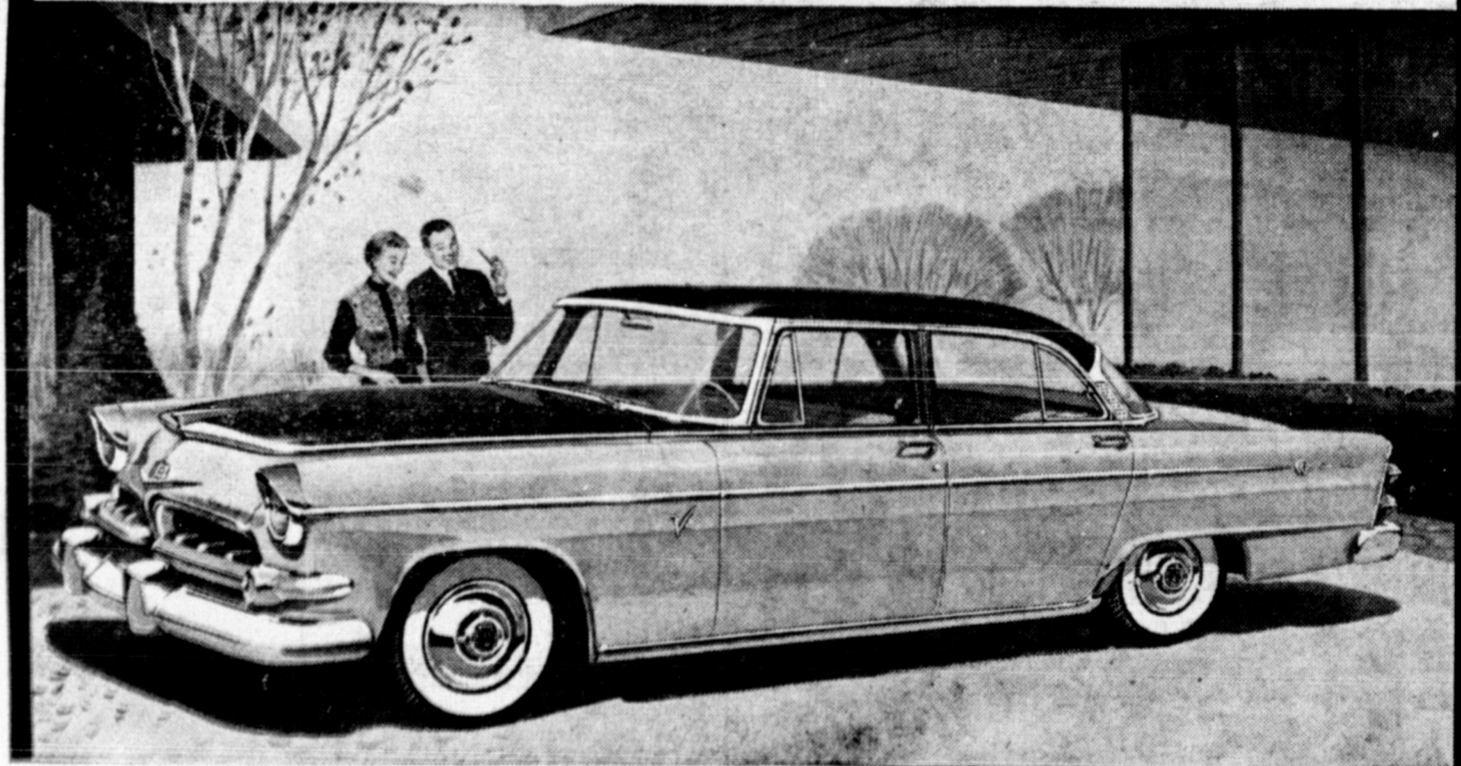

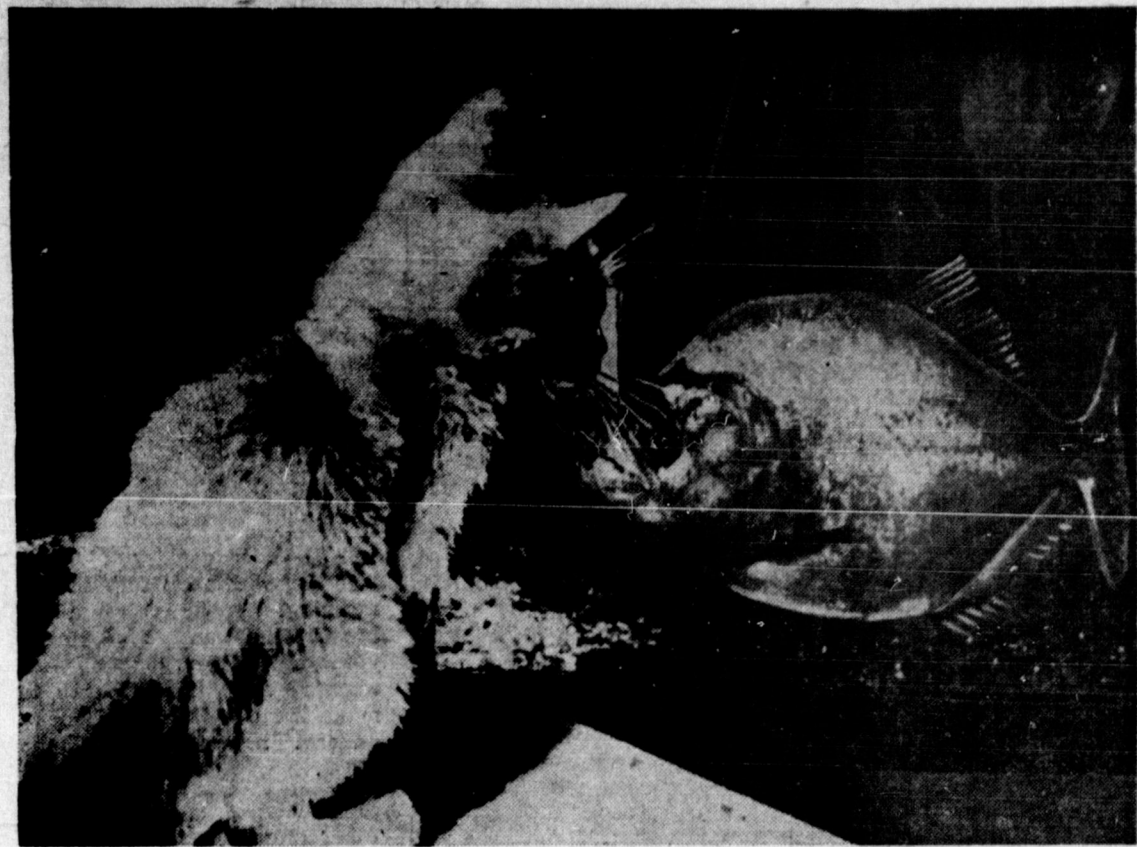

### Quail Season Is Uncertain

AUSTIN—The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said the quail season under the General State Law apparently will be an improvement over last fall but will be "somewhat spotted."

The statewide season, running from December 1st through January 16, is expected to be particularly good in parts of north Texas and in south central Texas as well as in parts of the coastal plains.

"The quail population seems to have hit bottom during last year's extreme dry weather," said the Executive Secretary. "The state still is dry generally but in some parts timely rains came last spring and summer and this should produce improved conditions."

The bobwhite prospects improved so much in the Panhandle that the Game and Fish Commission some time ago raised the daily and possession limit from six and twelve bird bags last year to ten per day and twenty in possession this fall. The Commission has regulatory authority over a twenty-eight county Panhandle bracket and thus is able to adjust seasons according to conditions.

The general state season is determined by Legislative Act. Recent emphasis on the plight of the quail has stimulated greater general interest in aiding propagation of the fleet game birds according to Wildlife Biologist Dan Lay of Buna who specializes in quail research. He said inquiries about means of restoring habitat indicate widespread determination to help the quail come back.

"If we can get the folks interested and the drought breaks, it

won't take long to restore bobwhite quail," said Lay, "because quail are absolutely amazing in their reproductive capacity when given a chance."

The Executive Secretary said containers are being distributed to several thousand hunters to collect quail wings for scientific study. Hunters who will either obtain the containers direct or through game wardens or wildlife biologists are asked to place one wing in the bags from each quail shot. The wings from cocks and hens should be separated. Location of the hunt and date also are needed.

Limits under the General State Law are twelve quail per day and not more than thirty-six in possession. But limits as well as season dates vary in many localities. Details are contained in the Game Law Digests available through game wardens or license dealers.

Daily shooting hours under the General State Law are from one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset.

### COTTON ALLOTMENTS FOR 1955

For 1955, Donley County has a cotton allotment of 30,564 acres. This is a larger allotment than we had in the beginning of 1954, but the County Committee had to hold more in reserve, thus making the individual farm allotment about the same as the first allotment was for 1954. The individual farm allotments for 1955 have been completed, and they will reach the cotton farmers between the 1st of December and the 3rd, so watch your mail for that important letter. Don't forget the cotton Marketing Quota Referendum will be held on December 14th. The places for voting will be announced later in News Letters, Local Papers, and Posters. 1954 ACP

The 1954 year is coming to a close in a short while, so if any

producer who has an approval for any practice, be sure to complete this practice before December 31, 1954. If you know now that you cannot, be sure to let us know.

There are few of the producers who have not reported on the Austrian Winter Pea and Hairy Vetch Practice. We need those reports now, so if you are one that has not reported to the county office be sure to come by the office. We need those reports finished as soon as possible. 1955 ACP

We are now working on the County Handbook for ACP and as soon as it is completed and approved we will be ready to take application for the first sign-up period. 1955 sign-up is a little different than in 1954. Application will be taken only on a month to month basis, so if you are not sure that you will carry out the practice within a month after you sign, there will not be any need for you to make application until you are ready to do the work. There will be a certain amount of money reserved for each month

in the year.
