#### **Deadline Near For** New Car Tags

Thursday, March 31st is the deadline for purchasing new handle team which placed first in license plates as new tags must

be on all vehicles April 1st if such is operated on a public road of any kind. This means that there will certainly be a mad rush at the tax office in the court house as only about one-third of the usual registrations have been made to date. It also takes more time to fill out necessary papers than it did several years ago.

Tax office officials are reminding everyone to bring their car title and old license receipt along with them. This will eliminate delay and speed up registration operations. They pointed out also that only expiring title transfers will be handled during the last few days unless title papers can be left at the office and worked out during any possible lull periods. If you don't want to be caught in a long line, it will be best to go by the next day or so and purchase your new tags and not wait until next week.

Through Tuesday of this week only 717 car tags had been purchased, 300 farm tags and less than 100 commercial.



Earlier, Giles and L. V. Ruffin and C. B. Sheffield were indicted by the Travis County grand jury on conspiracy to defraud the state of \$82,500. Giles made bond of \$60,000 in the Travis cases. In San Antonio, Giles was reported as saying that when he comes to trial he will have plenty to say.


