E. G. Pe, a member of the U. S. Fish | Wildlife Service of Lubbock, Texas, was in Monday and made a report on the Coyote Control program now in effect in this area.

Mr. Pope reported that the Coyote Control program covered practically all of the Palo Duro canyon extending into Hall County, and the following ranches in this area: S. J., Jack Roach, Rowe, Sitter, Hess and Cooke.

He pointed out that special government poison, which is the most effective eradicator, has been placed at bait points throughout the above mentioned areas and that all dog owners should take every precaution to and premium keep their dogs away from these bait areas. The government bait used is the least hazardous to other animals other than coyotes, bobcats and domestic dogs.

He said that bait stations had been placed on an average of one station to each 20 sections of land and that signs had been placed at all strategic points to warn of the baited areas. All poisonous bait will be picked up by the last of April and the area will be



SECURITY **NEWS**

"As of January 1, 1955, a significant change will take place in the present social security law. On that date all covered workers will start to pay social security taxes on up to \$4200 per year instead of the present maximum of \$3600 per year," John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, said today

Actually this change will not be immediately apparent in an employee's pay check, since there will be no increase in the amount withheld. However, when a worker reaches \$3600 in any one year his social security deductions will not stop at that point. Both he and his employer will continue to contribute until his earnings reach \$4200. The same increase is also to be applied to self-employed individuals.

This broadening of the earnings base may mean increased contributions of up to \$12 per year for each worker and an ger and children of Plaska spent equal amount for his employer. 



Motor Vehicle Tax

A bill to abolish the ad valorem property tax on motor vehicles will be presented to the Legislature by State Rep. Douglas E. Bergman of Dallas.

His bill also would propose a one-third increase in the registration (license tag) fee.

Another Bergman bill would allow banks to close Saturdays. A third bill would permit judges to deny bail on second felony indictments when the accused is out on bond for a previous felony charge.

The USDA office in Austin reports that the value of Texas crops for the year reached \$1,-036,000,000 despite the drought. That's \$67 million higher than the preceding year.

Gin Trash Research

Texas Dept. of Agriculture Texas is seeking a solution to a knotty problem—how to keep We Service All Makes & Models an insect from robbing farmers of HOME - AUTO & TELEVISIONS a valuable component of our an-

nual cotton crop. Gin "trash"-the burrs or hulls of the cotton bole - could ordinarily be very useful as a soil conditioner, fertilizer or livestock feed. Yet, this trash also harbors one of the greatest threats to our cotton industry, the pink bollworm. The problem is how to kill the insect larvae within the trash and allow the material to be returned to the farm for beneficial

Modern gins with elaborate drying and cleaning equipment kill a high percentage of the worms during the ginning process. Tests are now being conducted in Texas to find what process or machine is responsible for the greater part of the kill. Modifications and improvements may be made eventually which will assure 100 percent destruc-

Today, most gin trash is burned to control and prevent the spread beyond quarantine barriers of the pink bollworm. However, some methods are being used and studied which may prevent this waste. Composting, sterilization, umigation, hammer milling, roller milling and the use of special fans or two conventional fans in the pneumatic system of ginning are all possible procedures that have a degree of effectiveness.

Investigations of different types of fans and fan combinations, rollers, beaters, grinders, and heating devices are being carried out by engineers and entomologists at commercial gins in the lower Rio Grande Valley this season. Later work will be done farther north, including the Panhandle where harvesting conditions are quite different.



POLIO VACCINE ANSWER SCHEDULED THIS SPRING

The annual March of Dimes opened this week with a sober note of caution from Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Pointing out that "we still do not know if the trial polio vaccine has prevented one case of paralytic polio," Mr. O'Connor stated that "this factor, plus the large number of patients still needing help, means that fighting polio is a bigger job now."

"I know that parents are anxiously waiting for the answer," Mr. O'Connor said.
"The scientific evaluation of the vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas E. Salk is a time-

consuming and precise job involving detailed records on 1,830,000 children who either were vaccinated or are act-

ing as controls."

The Poliomyelitis Vaccine
Evaluation Center at the University of Michigan is now
studying data on children in
14,000 schools in the 217 study

27 Laboratories at Work Twenty-seven laboratories are processing and testing some 40,000 blood samples taken from participating children to determine the amount of protective antibodies against polio present in their bloodstrams

in their bloodstreams.

Before the Evaluation Center can put the jigsaw pieces of information together and arrive at an answer, all data must be entered on the children's coded record cards, then analyzed.

This process cannot be hurried,

The National Foundation already has taken a calculated financial risk by obligating \$9,000,000 in 1955 March of Dimes funds for the manufacture, this winter, of additional vaccine.

This was done so that enough of it to vaccinate 9,000,000 persons will be ready in the spring without charge for the product. The purpose was to make some vaccine available immediately, if licensed, and to keep manufacturing facilities tooled up for continued production. continued production.

If the vaccine evaluation report is negative or inconclusive, March of Dimes-financed vaccine research will be intensi-fied. The National Foundation research program has not been halted during the evaluation.
