Proposed Cotton Reductions

Texas Dept. of Agriculture

Cotton farmers will decide Dec. 14th whether they want to accept the acreage controls proposed for the 1955 crop.

In previous years, when farmers were asked to choose between lowered parity and unrestricted production or a high parity level and crop quotas, they have voted to accept the controls. They seem to feel that less cotton and a reasonable assurance of a fair price is the better deal. If they follow the same pattern this December, then next year's crop quota is scheduled for a drastic reduction.

The Secretary of Agriculture has ruled that the cotton acreage will be cut back 15 percent in 1955. This means only 18,113,208 acres can be planted as compared with the 21.4 million acres allowed this past season. The new quota is the very bottom figure allowed by farm law.

A minimum quota next year may work a great hardship in areas where cotton is the main cash crop. In some sections of

Texas, cotton is the primary agricultural commodity. No other crop offers comparable income. As a result, the gross profits from cotton can drop 15 percent in those areas.

Some government planners will work hard to make the 15 percent reductions "stick" in cotton planting despite any opposition which may arise to the program. Economists claim that the 1954 crop was fair larger than expected when the first production estimate was released in late summer. Any more cotton will be a drag on the market, they claim.

It is true that original 1954 estimates were very low. Subsequent increase in estimates proved this—and incidentally made it extremely difficult to plan any sort of orderly marketing system. Critics point out, and with some justification, that if estimates are to be made at all, they should be reasonably accurate if the industry is to benefit from them.

At this point, acreage controls appear to be the most logical choice in the December election. With the recent shift in power in Washington, then it is fairly certain that cotton acreages will be somewhat increased. Many areas of Texas will welcome such an increase.

Probable Presidential Recommendations to Congress

Many people in the political atmosphere of Washington are wondering what the President will recommend to Congress. This same question is no doubt causing the Presidential advisers much concern. It will be remembered that there was much complaint that the Congress would not cooperate with the President to put over his alleged dynamic program. However, no one seemed to take the trouble to find out just what the dynamic part of the program was. Many of the measures recommended by the President were passed by the last Congress because they were considered in the best interests of this country. Some fell by the wayside because the Congress did not so consider them. It is interesting to note that some of the measures passed because they received votes from Members who had previously consistently voted against them. Some that failed were measures that had been voted on in previous sessions of Congress and failed by a much larger vote than they failed in this last session. This was because there was much vote switching in the last session of Congress. This was due to the fact that Eisenhower was putting his stamp of approval on legislation that had been vigorously contested and condemned in previous years by the very Members of Congress who found themselves with the responsibility of carrying out Eisenhower's wishes. If the President can retain the support of his party on his proposals, he may see legislation passed that he has advocated and recommended, but which many top members of his own party never expected to be passed and didn't want to be

passed, such as the so-called health re-insurance program, a stepped up public housing program, a much relaxed reciprocal trade authority, and so forth.

It is presently expected that the so-called health re-insurance plan will meet with the same opposition from the medical profession and others who consider this proposed measure a step in the direction of socialized medicine. The request for additional public housing will of course be protested by all of the building organizations and associated trades. The record on public housing is not good. The loosening of the trade barriers will of course be opposed by all advocates of high tariffs, as well as many of the labor organizations. The world trade problem is one of the toughest that we will have in our lifetime. Its proper solution could mean the prevention of further hostilities between many nations.

Other recommendations that are expected from the White House will be a renewal of the request to admit Hawaii as a state, a probable request for pushing the debt ceiling higher, additional appropriations for the Air Force (The Air Force took the brunt of the defense cutback last year), further expansion of social security, and additional and expanded departmental re-organization powers.

It is contemplated that the White House will try to prevent any increase in individual income tax exemptions. It is expected that Congress will start the machinery to get these exemptions increased either during this session or the early part of 1956. It is also anticipated that the White House will contest any attempt to revive the resolution on the Bricker amendment.

WHAT COULD BE AN EXPLOSIVE ISSUE: It presently appears that early efforts will be made by some of the senators to sever relations with Russia. If this is done, you can expect the fireworks to start and the "co-

existence" debate will be on the front pages for many days. The split on this issue inside the Republican Party is much more pronounced than is generally suspected.

3-Cent Stamp Best Yuletide Insurance For Quick Delivery

Postmaster J. C. Estlack believes that with a three-cent stamp your Christmas cards will win more friends and influence more people than if they are mailed with a two-cent stamp. "First-class postage," he explained today, "is the best Yuletide insurance you can get. With it your greetings will be processed and delivered quicker. And they'll be forwarded, or returned, if it becomes necessary."

"This eliminates any worry about whether or not your season's greetings were received. Your own return address on the envelope will help others keep their address books up to date. Then, too, Christmas cards sent with three-cent stamps may carry written messages, a custom everyone enjoys."

None of these postal privileges are authorized at the third-class rates. Moreover, Christmas card envelopes smaller than 2 1/4 x 4" or larger than 9" x 12" require cancellation by hand, and must carry first-class postage. Postmaster Estlack urges every one to tie their Christmas cards in two separate bundles, with each address facing the same way. Then attach the postal labels marked "ALL FOR LOCAL DELIVERY" and "ALL FOR OUT-OF-TOWN DELIV-

ERY." These helpful tags are available at the Post Office, without cost, and will shorten delivery time greatly. Parcel post, of course, should be mailed even earlier. The Postmaster recommends December 5 for out-of-state gifts, and December 10 for those with local addresses. But the sooner the better. Size and weight limitations for parcel post vary according to place of mailing and destination. In some cases, packages cannot exceed 72 inches in length and girth combined, nor 20 pounds in weight. In others, the limits are up to 100 inches combined length and girth, and 70 pounds in weight.

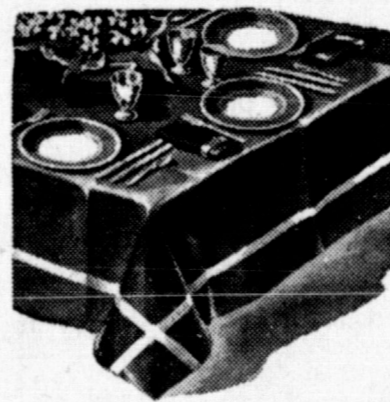

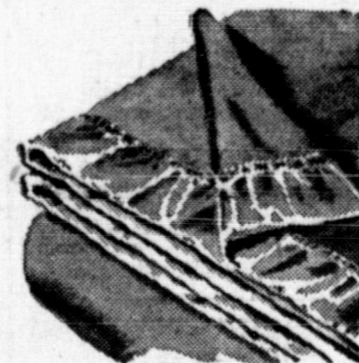

COTTON GROWERS VOTE FOR NINTH TIME

The national referendum on upland cotton marketing quotas, to be held December 14, will be the ninth vote of its kind.

The first vote on cotton marketing quotas was held in March 1938, and the last previous cotton referendum was in December 1953. In the last vote, 94 percent of the farmers voting expressed approval of using the quotas for the 1954 cotton crop. At least two-thirds of the farmers voting must favor quotas before they can continue in effect.

Under legislative provisions, the Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim—not later than October 15—a national marketing quota and a national acreage allotment for upland cotton whenever he finds that the total supply exceeds the normal supply.

The November Crop Report increased the total supply by 716,000 bales. The total supply is so large that the Secretary of Agriculture was required by law to establish the national marketing quota at the minimum of 10 million bales.

The Agricultural Act of 1955 provided for a "set aside" of from 3 to 4 million bales of cotton. This set-aside is included in the total supply in determining acreage allotments and marketing quotas. When the level of price support is determined, however, the set-aside is not considered in the total supply.

Marketing quotas operate thru acreage allotments. A grower who exceeds the cotton acreage allotment for his farm, under a

cotton marketing quota program, will be subject to marketing quota penalty of 50 percent of parity on the farm's excess production. Growers who do not exceed their cotton allotments may market free of penalties all the 1955 cotton production from their farms.


The polling places listed below will be open from 8 A. M. to 6 P. M.: Clarendon, Ashtola, Lelia Lake, Hedley, Alanreed, and McLean. The above mentioned towns will have a place for voting which will be designated as soon as a place is decided upon for each town.

Each cotton farmer who is eligible to vote will be mailed a letter this week with reference to the referendum and definite places to vote.

All eligible cotton farmers are urged to vote in the COTTON MARKETING QUOTA REFERENDUM, DECEMBER 14, 1954.

The patient sleeps and wakes feeling well; eats a hearty breakfast, but about church time the attack comes on and continues until services are over in the morning. Then the patient feels easy and eats a hearty dinner.

In the afternoon he feels much better, and is able to go for a ride in the car and read the Sunday paper, but about church time that night he has another attack and stays home. He wakes up Monday morning refreshed and able to go to work, and does not have any symptoms of the disease until the following Sabbath.

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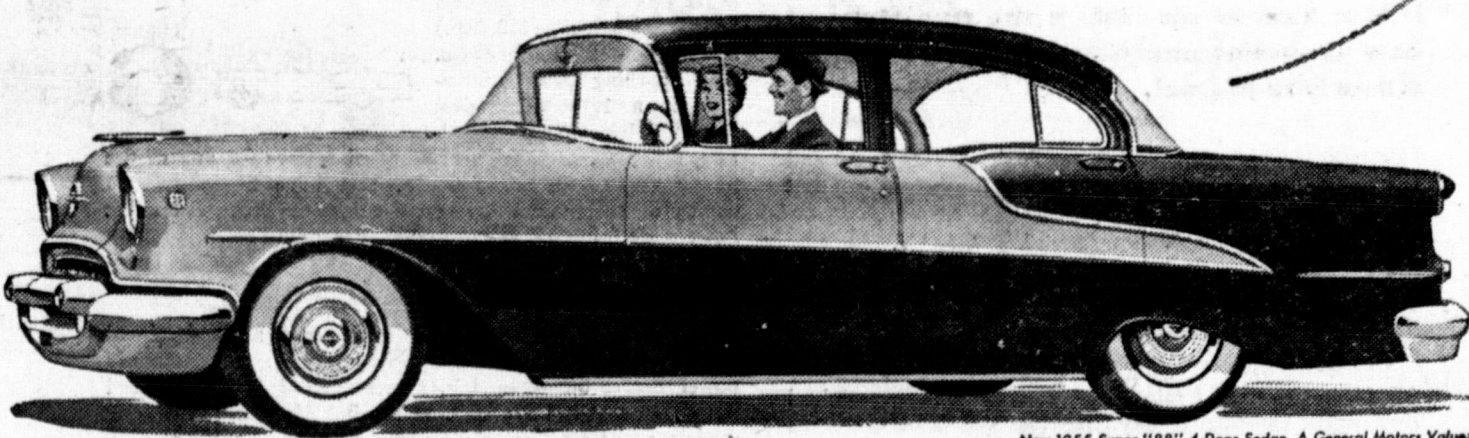

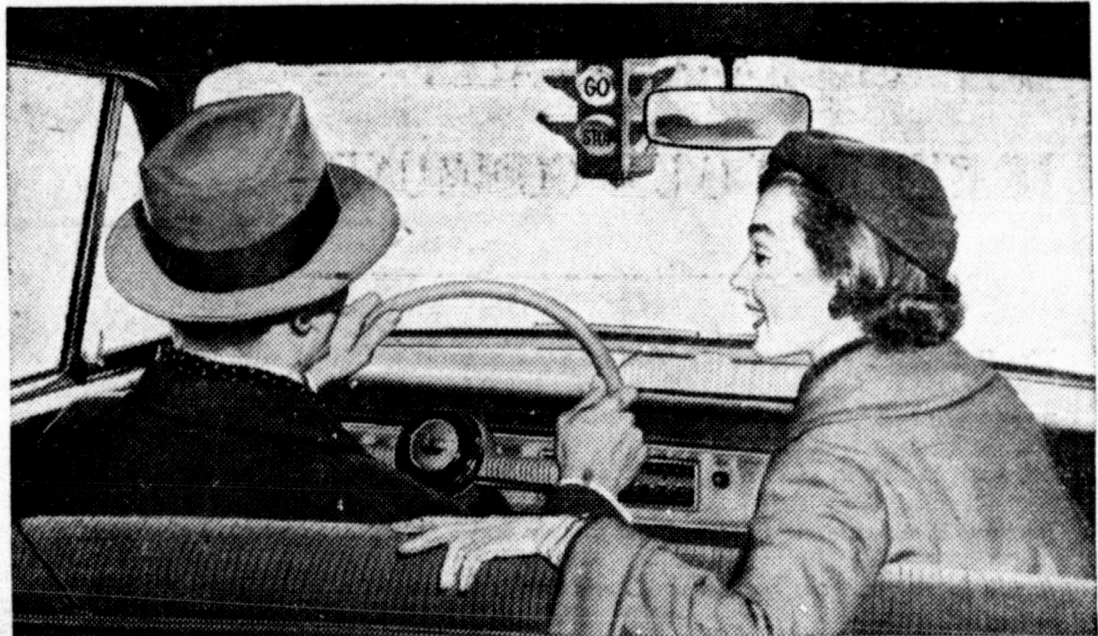
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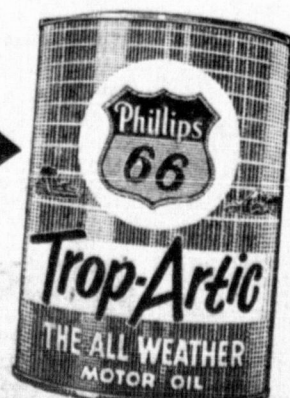

8 Part Plan to Educate Taxpayers To Correctly Prepare Own Tax Returns

District Director of Internal Revenue Service, Ellis Campbell, Jr., announced today an extensive 8 part plan to educate taxpayers to correctly prepare their own tax returns.

This program is as follows:

1. Provide through newspaper explanations and pictures information on how to prepare tax returns.

2. Provide, in cooperation with TV stations, television demonstrations and instructions on how to file a tax return while watching the TV program.

3. Provide technical assistance to newspapers to answer taxpayers' questions through tax question and answer columns.

4. Provide technical assistance and speakers to radio and TV stations to answer questions on radio and TV programs.

5. Hold 3-day Internal Revenue Service schools for key employees from large companies, army camps, and government agencies

on how to prepare returns and answer employees' tax questions. These key employees will answer questions and assist plant employees in preparing their returns or in solving their income tax problems.

6. Contact civic, professional and other organizations in North Texas and make available to them one of the technical tax men that have been specifically trained to speak before such groups on preparing income tax returns.

7. Establish taxpayer assistance days at local offices. Taxpayers' questions will be answered. Taxpayers having simple returns will be given group education and assistance in how to prepare their own returns. The taxpayer will actually prepare his own return, following the Internal Revenue instructor's directions.

8. Taxpayers who cannot read or write, or who are physically unable to assist themselves, will be given individual assistance.

Mr. Campbell emphasized that our tax system is a voluntary compliance system. We depend on the individual to prepare his own tax return and determine how much tax he owes. Last year we

owe as we are in collecting all that is due the government. A large part of our publicity will be directed at getting all taxpayers who are due a refund to file their returns January 1 or as soon as possible afterward. We want to get the taxpayers' money back to him. We naturally can do this at least 3 1/2 months earlier if he files his return on January 1 instead of April 15. Actually the taxpayer who files early will receive his refund more than 3 1/2 months faster because last minute filing always causes a big jam.

Mr. Campbell concluded by emphasizing: "We have 900 Internal Revenue Service employees. They can't collect the taxes in this District unless most of the 1,200,000 taxpayers pay voluntarily. The more the public helps, the better job the Internal Revenue Service employees can do. We need a lot of public help to keep some of our taxpayers from passing their tax burden on to other honest taxpayers."

Only technical tax men are able to assist taxpayers. These Internal Revenue Agents during the past year averaged \$80 per hour in additional tax that the government would not have collected. This \$80 per hour in addition to the employee's salary is lost for the government every hour these technical people are assisting taxpayers in preparing their returns. We want to keep this cost to a minimum and keep our technical men on their job checking tax returns.

Our District office has always received every possible assistance from North Texas newspapers, radio and TV stations in informing the public on tax matters. We know that we can count on thousands of dollars of free space or free air time. We need all the help we can get from every possible source to put over this educational program. We know that public accountants and accounting societies will help the educational program by addressing civic organizations and by arranging, through their accounting

societies, for their members to appear on radio and TV panels to explain the new law.

We are going to do everything possible to get correct returns. We don't want more money than the taxpayer owes, but we have to ask him for additional tax when he takes deductions or credit not allowed. We know we can collect taxes a lot cheaper if everybody knows what they are supposed to pay and how to prepare their tax return.

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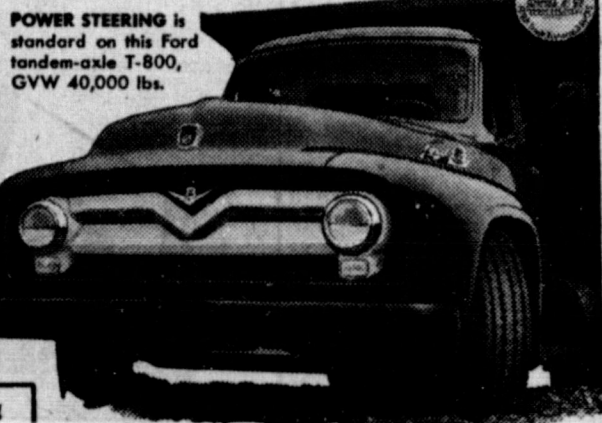

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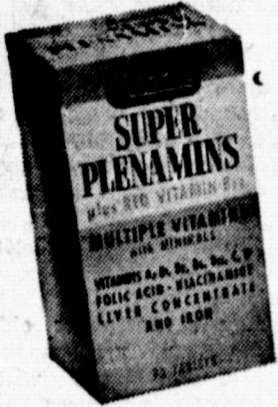

He had been mentioned as a possible successor to Governor Allan Shivers by Texas Democrats wishing to continue the conservative brand of government. Daniel stated that he knew nothing about any organized movement on his behalf towards the governorship.

However, he set the wheels of speculation rolling by adding: "There could be some circumstances under which I would consider the matter—if a majority of those who helped elect me feel I can do the state more service by running for governor."

Daniel also said that he had rather live in Texas and send his children to Texas schools. However, he stressed that he was enjoying his work and was not seeking a change. If he resigns to enter the 1956 race, his Senate successor would be appointed by the governor.

Land Fraud Charges
State investigators arrested three men as probing continued into Veterans Land Program sales in South Texas.

Two Cuero notaries were charged with notarizing land titles without seeing sales participants sign their names. A third man was released under bond but details of the charge were not made public.

Meanwhile the Senate Investigating Committee prepared for a December look into complaints that veterans found themselves owners of land without knowing of the sale or where the land was located.

Presently handling the investigation is the Attorney General's office, the state auditor's office, and the Department of Public Safety.

Oil Permit
W. J. Murray Sr. has withdrawn a special drilling application because his son, W. J. Murray Jr., is a member of the Railroad Commission.

Application was made to the Commission by the senior Murray to allow him a spacing rule exception in drilling a new well in the North Glen Cove Field in Coleman County.

He said he withdrew the application after protests claimed the application would harm oil conservation in the field.

Industry In Texas
Why do industries come to Texas? Texas' Economic Advisory Commission asked the question of 280 manufacturers in a bid to find why industry was pouring into the state at a rapid pace.

Answers included: A better chance to serve customers of this area, less competition, special markets, adequate labor and transportation, and abundant resources and raw materials.

Liquor Board Rule
Investigation powers of the State Liquor Board include that of inspecting pertinent "records", state Attorney General John Ben Shepperd ruled.

Shepperd said the board could command production of personal records and accounts of officers and stockholders of corporations holding a state liquor license or permit.

Hospitals Need Help
There is no immediate hope of adequate professional help for state mental institutions, the Texas Research League has warned.

In a report prepared for the Board of State Hospitals and Special Schools, the league said that 278 physicians are required for the state's six mental hospitals.

Only 102 have been certified by the Hospital Board, the report said.

League research also pointed out shortcomings in numbers of psychologists, registered nurses, and psychiatric specialists available for state mental work.
