### Rain Total For Year Still Growing

Add another 1.54 inches of rain to the total up until last Thursday and we now have a grand total for the year at 16.63 inches according to the weather station at the airport. Residents of Donley have been very fortunate in that the rain fell very nicely, doing very little damage to crops. The beautiful sunshine experienced the past few days should get the wheat harvesting well underway and also make the row crops and weeds grow plenty fast. It looks like a number of busy days ahead -- if the rain holds off for awhile.

### Cabinet Making Class Will Start July 1st

The new part time Cabinet Making Class will start July 1, 1949, provided sufficient number of Veterans are interested in enrolling in this course. The class will meet on Monday, Tuesday and Saturday nights from 6 to 10 P. M. Mr. Homer Taylor will serve as instructor for the course which will be held in the Vocational School Building, west of the College.

Any Veteran of World War II who served a minimum of 90 days in the Armed forces is eligible to attend the class. Single men will receive \$37.50 per month subsistence, a man with one dependent will receive \$52.50 and two or more dependents will receive \$60.00 per month subsistence. The course is a part time course and will be for a period of four years.

Anyone interested in attending this class should contact the Vocational School Office immediately as it takes approximately three weeks to get a certificate of eligibility and this must be obtained before enrolling.

The Cabinet Making class is the only one that will probably be offered by the Vocational School during the remainder of the G. I. program for men who have employment other than farming due to the fact that no money for equipment is allowed the Vocational School under the new contract.

### SERVICES HELD SUNDAY FOR SGT. M. C. SKINNER

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Lelia Lake Baptist Church for S/Sgt. Melvin Cecil Skinner with Rev. V. W. Allen officiating, assisted by Rev. E. M. Weathers. The local V.F.W. and American Legion were in charge of the military rites.

S/Sgt. Melvin Skinner was born March 11, 1920 near Sherman. He moved with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Skinner, to the Windy Valley Community when just a small child, where he grew to young manhood. He attended school there and in Lelia Lake. He graduated from the Perryton High School in 1940 and accepted a civil service position at San Antonio where he was employed until he volunteered for service in April, 1942. He was assigned to the 507th Parachute Infantry and was trained at Camp Roberts, Calif. and Alliance, Neb. He received his boots and wings at Ft. Benning, Ga., Oct., 1942. He went overseas to Ireland in Dec., 1943 and then to England. On June 6, 1944, while his Airborne Division was invading Southern France, he was killed.

Melvin united with the First Baptist Church of Lelia Lake in March of 1938.

He is survived by three brothers; Roy Skinner of San Bernardino, Calif., Leslie of Pampa and Clyde of San Antonio. Five sisters, Mrs. Dora Dunlap of Dallas, Mrs. Virgie Carver of Pasadena, Calif., Mrs. Ethel Heppie of Oceanside, New York, Mrs. Louise Clement of Amarillo and Miss Inez Skinner of Clarendon. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with the Clarendon Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

### WEATHER CLEARS FOR WHEAT HARVESTING

Well, the weather finally cleared and the sun came out good and hot Wednesday which should get wheat harvesting well underway in Donley County with a number of farmers cutting today.

The Clarendon Grain Company reported a few loads of first wheat but part of it tested 16 and 20 and it has to test 13 before it can be accepted.

The main item needed at the present for both the wheat and row crops is more sunshine and less moisture.

### MCCULLY ASKS FOR REGISTRATION OF BLOOD TYPES

M. M. McCully, service officer for Donley county and school tax official, stated this week that during the past several months there have been numerous urgent requests for blood donors and that only a few persons around Clarendon to date have been furnishing blood to persons needing this service. If you know your type of blood and would be willing to help someone in time of need, Mr. McCully stated that he would keep this information at his office so that unnecessary delay can be avoided. The local hospital will type your blood for a very small fee and it is worth a lot sometimes to know this information, he added. This is a free service of the individual and also Mr. McCully, but some person's life may be saved by your blood.

### Notes from -- CITY HALL

We are publishing in this issue of the Leader an ordinance passed this week. If anyone is interested we will be glad for you to come by the City Hall and read the full ordinance for further information.

July 1st we are starting a truck to pick up all trash and garbage in the business and residential sections of Clarendon. The business section will be covered once a day and the residential section will be covered once a week.

The City is not going into the trash and garbage business blind. We have communicated with scores of other Texas towns as to the way they are handling their trash situation and we have taken the good points of their experience and tried to incorporate them to our usage.

We, of course, will make some mistakes, and we will be glad to have any constructive criticism anyone will give us. The trash and garbage collection is one of the most needed things here in Clarendon from two stand points. One for health and sanitary reasons; the other to make our city a more desirable place to live.

The above will have to have the full cooperation of the citizens of Clarendon if we expect to go ahead and grow as our surrounding cities are doing.

We wish to publicly thank the Lions Club for their effort in the coming cleanup.

In regard to our City dump grounds, we have Jose Moore hired to take care of the dump grounds, so won't everyone who hauls trash to the dump grounds, please don't dump in the drive, but dump where you are directed to.

#### GROUP LEAVES MONDAY FOR SUMMER CAMP

The first group to take advantage of the church summer camp facilities at Ceta Canyon from here left Monday morning. Making up this group were Mr. and Mrs. R. Y. King and their daughters Ruth Ann and Rebecca, Mrs. Homer Estlack and her son Homer, Mrs. Louise Payne and her son John. The elders in the party returned to Clarendon Monday.

Miss Mantie Graves accompanied the party to supervise the children for the week. The outing is sponsored by the Methodist church. Other groups from various sections will be present giving the children the advantages of association that is of inestimable value.

Ceta Canyon camp group has long been known as a favorite recreation spot for children. The outings are sponsored by various churches each season, each group being sponsored by responsible elders. During the years that this camp has been available, no serious accident is said to have happened to any child.

Everything's all set. The City Clean-up Drive, sponsored by the local Lions Club, will get under way next Monday morning at 8 a. m. when volunteer workers and trucks gather at the court house to receive last minute instructions for the systematic drive which will rid Clarendon of tons of rubbish and trash. It is the intentions of the committees in charge, to finish the job in one day if at all possible but should they not finish the job completely in the one day, then a part of Tuesday will be used to finish the job.

A clean city will aid in the fight to keep Clarendon's slate clean as far as Infantile Paralysis is concerned, and it will aid considerably in holding other diseases to a minimum.

At the present time there are numerous containers all over town that are holding water which has increased the crop of mosquitoes; thus a thorough clean-up should help eliminate a large number of these pests that will not allow you to enjoy your porch or yard in the late afternoon.

The Lions Club committee, headed by J. W. Murphy, is not asking business firms to close as they did last year, but are asking for volunteers from every firm to help in the clean-up. Everyone who has a truck, pick-up or other vehicle available for hauling is asked to be at the courthouse and if possible to notify Gene Baxter or Chester Vaughn that you will be there as these two men will be in charge of this part of the program. R. E. Drennan is in charge of the publicity.

Other committeemen are: Mike McCully and Geo. Schollenbarger who will contact all firms for volunteers; Cap Morris and Pete Kunz will be in charge of the dump ground; A. R. Henson and Bill Todd will be in charge of the men to work; L. L. Wallace and Howard Stewart will place trucks and men in proper divisions of the town as it has been divided in five sections this year. The divisions will be as follows with the person or persons in charge listed: West Side—1st to 7th street, Carl Allmond; 7th to City limits—Alfred Estlack and George Thompson; East of Main Street—1st to 7th, Olin Bain; 7th to city limits, Lee Bell; North Side—J. R. Bulls, Frank Lyle and Manuel Walker.

The committee is asking that all helpers report with shovels, forks, etc.

If you want to get the jump on the drive, go ahead and clean up and haul your trash on out to the dump ground before the drive starts, one committeemen stated. Everyone who does not have their premises cleaned up and all rubbish piled out to where the trucks can get to it easily are asked to get busy and have everything ready by early Monday morning, and please burn everything that is burnable so that bulky loads will be eliminated as much as possible. You are also asked to cut up tree limbs to where they will fit in a pick-up as many of the large trucks will probably be in harvest.

### Singing School To Start July 3 at Hedley Church of Christ

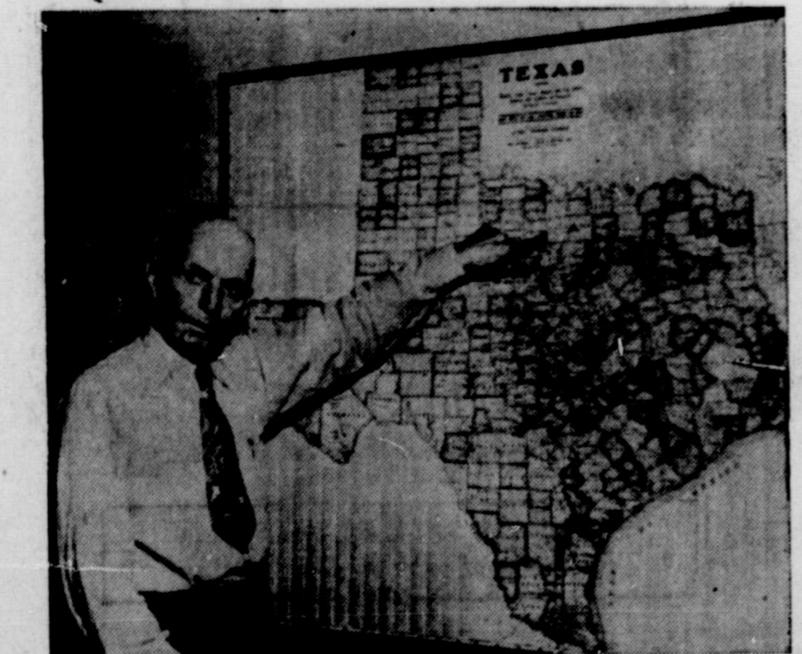

### Local Roping Club Sponsoring Dance Friday Night

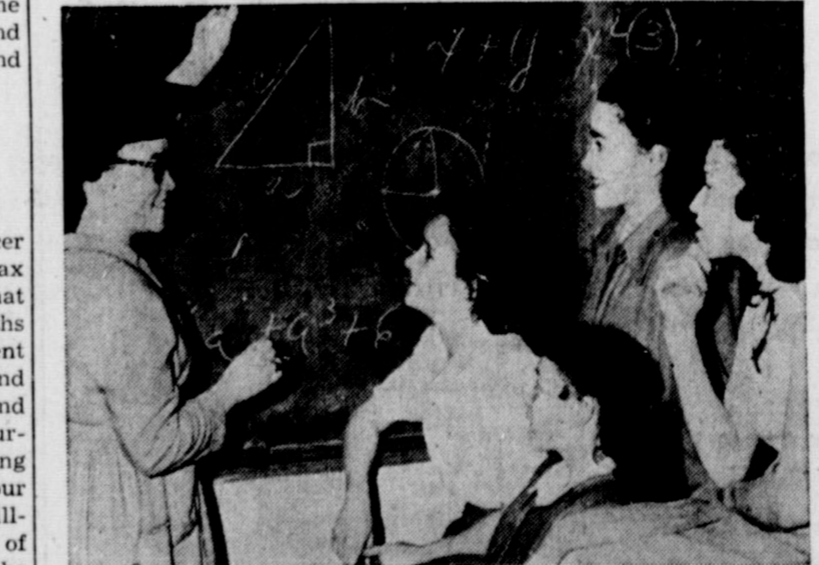
The Clarendon Roping Club has announced that they are sponsoring a western style dance this Friday night at the Clarendon Opera House.

**A CITY ORDINANCE**

**AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR PERMIT TO ENGAGE IN THE PRACTICE OF PHOTOGRAPHY AND PROVIDING FOR A DEPOSIT TO BE MADE TO GUARANTEE PROPER AND LEGAL WORK AND THE PAYMENT OF A CHARGE FOR ESTIMATING COST OF INVESTIGATION AND PROVIDING FOR THE RECOMMENDATIONS TO BE FILED BY THOSE ENGAGED IN THE PRACTICE OF PHOTOGRAPHY FOR MORE THAN ONE YEAR IN THE CITY OF CLARENDON AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON:**

SECTION 1.

No person, firm, or corporation, except as in this ordinance provided, shall canvass, solicit for or make photographs or photographic reproductions, nor operate a studio nor call from house to house for the purpose of exposing negatives or positives without first having reported to and received a written permit from the City Secretary it being hereby understood that any person, firm, or corporation who, which is unknown in this city shall deposit with the said City Secretary the sum of Fifty (50) Dollars as bond to guarantee his or its good, honorable and lawful possession, and proper and legal distribution, of negatives or positives and/or photographic repro-

ductions from the same, exposed or reproduced by order of individuals and others, and in addition thereto shall pay to the said City Secretary the sum of Ten (10) Dollars, being the estimated cost of investigating the reputation, reliability and dependability of the applicant.

SECTION 2.

Said permit shall not be issued unless and until said applicant shall by said investigate be proven to have reasonably good reputation, reliability and dependability.

SECTION 3.

Said permit shall be issued to any person, firm or corporation who or which has been located and engaged in the practice of photography in said city for a period of one year or longer, without payment of the said permit fee or deposit of said bond, upon presentation by him or it to the said City Secretary of the recommendations of at least four persons whose reliability is generally known to police officers of the said city, which persons shall have been customers of said persons, firm, or corporation, during the two years previous, and whose recommendations shall state that he or it is honest, dependable, reliable and of good reputation.

SECTION 4.

Any person who shall violate or refuse to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not more than \$100.00 and each day on which violation occurs shall be considered a separate offense. PASSED AND APPROVED, this 14th day of June, A. D. 1949.

Dupree said the Baylor Stadium Corporation, a non-profit organization of friends of Baylor University, soon will announce selection of a statewide steering committee for the forthcoming campaign to finance Baylor's new \$1,500,000 Stadium. Groundbreaking for the Stadium was a feature last week end of Baylor's 104th

annual commencement program. The corporation is refining now the plans to sell seat options and interest-bearing stadium bonds to pay for the football plant. The bonds will carry educational features assuring entrance priority in future years for Baylor students and being exchangeable for tuition at Baylor.

Government relief, such as the Marshall plan, is intended to restore the national economy of friendly countries. It deals with each nation as a whole to help reestablish that country's industry and trade. It does not reach the needy as CROP does.  
CROP does not duplicate any other relief project. Because of CROP's value in building friendship and respect for the United States, our Nation's State Department pays ocean freight on CROP food shipments, and has given recognition to CROP's good will building through its Voice of America radio broadcasts.  
CROP has demonstrated American Christianity in action to the rest of the world. ### Donley County ACA Farm News

The ACP Program year is about one-half gone. Would you like to know what has been done with the funds sent to Donley County for Practice Payments? Below is a report as complete as we can give it.

Some 300 farmers and ranchers in the County will share in the payments to be made on the practices listed above. We have around \$12,000.00 left in our County Budget. That will be used to pay for fall practices such as Leaving Stalks or Stubble, Contour Seeding, Drilled Crops (wheat, etc.), Terraces to be constructed on wheat land and any other practice listed in the County Handbook.

It looks like "old man weather" just isn't going to give us a break on the moisture situation. All we

have is rain and more rain. It is really slowing up work in the County too. Don't guess we should complain, because in July and August we will probably be "crying for rain."

We hope that those of you who have been having trouble finding our office will cease to have troubles. We finally got our sign up. So now when you want to come to the office, just look for the sign.

The Community and County Conservation district was a big success and 125 farmers, ranchers and business men attended the tour. The tour was held on June 9th at one thirty in the afternoon and was headed by county agent H. M. Breedlove and Carman Rhode, local conservationist for the SCS. Demonstrations visited was sage spraying on the Gordon Maddox farm; Grass plantings, grasshopper spraying on the Forest Sawyer ranch; Austrian Winter peas, grass plantings on the H. A. Swinney farm; Hairy Vetch on the L. L. Wood farm; the Windy Valley drainage project and grass plantings on the W. O. Elliott farm. The tour ended promptly at five o'clock in the afternoon. Each demonstration was discussed and questions answered by Quentin Williams, district conservationist for the SCS, Carman Rhode of the SCS and county agent Breedlove.

Breedlove says that another such tour will be held this fall. It is good for the people to see the growth of grasses and see that at different stages of growth and also look over the types of terraces and methods being used to control erosion.

"Farmers and ranchers have shown great concern in preserving and building up their soil and we intend to give them every chance to see work that is being done over the county," Breedlove stated.

Visitors on the tour were Harry Hoare of the Amarillo Globe News, Mr. Dawkins of the state soil conservation board and several farmers from surrounding counties.
