AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR PERMIT TO ENGAGE IN THE PRACTICE OF PHOTO-GRAPHY AND PROVIDING FOR A DEPOSIT TO BE MADE TO GUARANTEE PROPER AND LEGAL WORK AND THE PAY-MENT OF A CHARGE FOR ES-TIMATING COST OF INVESTI-GATION AND PROVIDING FOR THE RECOMMENDATIONS TO BE FILED BY THOSE ENGAG-ED IN THE PRACTICE OF PHOTOGRAPHY FOR MORE THAN ONE YEAR IN THE CITY OF CLARENDON AND PRO-VIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF. Said permit shall be issued to any person, firm or corporation who or which has been located COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF and engaged in the practice of photography in said city for a period of one year or longer, without payment of the said permit fee or deposit of said bond, upon presentation by him or it to the said City Secretary of the recommendations of at least four persons whose reliability is generally known to police officers of the said city, which persons shall have been customers of said persons, firm, or corporation, during from the City Secretary it being the two years previous, and state that he or it is honest, dewhich is unknown in this city pendable, reliable and of good reputation.

SECTION 4.
