If any foreign power decided to set off a devastating bomb in any of our metropolitan areas, they wouldn't do it by airplane. The citizens in those areas would have little, if any, notice. In Washington, for instance, there are a number of embassies that are foreign soil insofar as our government is concerned. Any one of these could be employed as a situs to assemble an explosive agent that could practically wipe Washington off the map. No notice of any kind would precede such a catastrophe.
