SECURITY NEWS

Announcement was made here today by John R. Sanderson, Dis- Clarendon, on Monday, at 9:30 trict Manager of the Amarillo a. m. at the Court House, June 13. Social Security Office, located at the new post office building, that his office was now accepting applications from persons seeking to establish a period of disability under the 1954 amendments to the Social Security Act.

Mr. Sanderson stated that all persons who are now totally and permanently disabled, but who had worked at least five years on jobs covered by Social Security Sunday School every Sunday before becoming disabled should contact his office to see if this new disability provision of the Social Security Act would be of benefit to them. Sanderson added that disability applications do not provide for any immediate cash payments. Such application only makes it possible to exclude the period of total disability from the wage earner's employment record in computing the benefit amount of claims under the retirement or survivors insurance

provisions of the law. Since January 1, 1955, workers who are totally disabled by illness, injury or other physical or mental impairment which can be Use Leader Classifieds for Quick Results. expected to be long-continued

and of indefinite duration may file an application to establish a period of disability. This application must be supported by medical records furnished by the claimant. When established, the period of total disability will be excluded in computing the wage earner's average monthly wage at retirement or upon death of the wage earner.

Persons who are unable to contact the local office because of their disability may have their representative or member of the family inquire on their behalf. A free booklet, entitled "Facts For Those Who Are Disabled" is available from the local office. A representative from the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration will be in
