




BACK FOR THIRDS-The 24th Infantry Division, in Korea for the third time, puts its soldiers through assault landing practice.



Wildlife Conservation By Donavon Houdashell **Drainage-Ditch** Banks


Well managed drainage ditches provide drainage for nearby fields: however, they also can be used to produce useful wildlife. Those animals that benefit from the good management of drainage ditches are fur-bearing animals, game birds, and insect-eating songbirds. These drainage ditches provide cover and water for wildlife; wildlife, on the other hand, gets its food from nearby fields. The first aim in the good

AUSTIN - Attendance at the Game and Fish Commission mobile wildlife exhibit has passed the 1,500,000 mark, according to estimates reported to the Commission's Executive Secretary.

The exhibit comprises scores of fish and animal species from the Texas wilds and has been so improved over the ten years it has been operated that now Ray Osborne, an official of the Dallas News Sports and Vacation Show, calls it, "the finest exhibit of its kind anywhere."

The wildlife exhibit is scheduled for as many fairs, sports shows, fat stock shows and the like as is possible.

"The demand has become so great that we could keep another such outfit going full time," said the Executive Secretary.







Establishment or improvement of permanent pastures is prominent in the better farming plans of many farmers and ranchers who are improving their farming systems through Farmers Home Administration soil and water conservation loans, according to James D. Gouldy, the agency's county supervisor whose office is located in Clarendon.


The loan funds are being used to establish new pastures or to improve those already established. Some of the practices to develop good pastures, and for which soil and water conservation loan funds are being used, include seeding with recommended grasses and legumes, proper fertilizing and liming.

Brush removal is also a practice that may be necessary on some farms.


Another use of the funds may be for cross-fencing, for pasture rotation of to prevent over-grazing or damage to portions of the pasture land not ready for grazing.
