A prominent Dallas businessman will make three separate talks here Thursday April 21st on the disease of Alcoholism and the rehabilitation program of Alcoholics Anonymous. He will speak to the members of the Lions Club Thursday noon. The regular club meeting will not be held on Tuesday April 19. He will speak to the High School students Thursday afternoon and then appear before the public in general at the Pastime Theatre Thursday night

at 8 p. m. "There are 3,700,000 Americans suffering from the disease of alcoholism. At least 12,000 Americans die each year from the disease. This is a public health responsibility but almost nothing is being done about it."

The above points will be brought out by the visiting speaker when he visits here Thursday, April 21st.

The speaker, a successful Dallas businessman-a businessman who once wagered his entire business fortune on the effort to make himself quit drinking and lost-will be speaking both as a member of A. A., the rehabilitation fellowship, and of the Dallas Committee for Education on Alcoholism.

"I suffered from the disease of alcoholism for 17 years," the speaker has previously announced. "For 17 years I tried to drink socially-and never could."

The speaker recovered control of compulsive drinking through Alcoholics Anonymous, and then became interested in the program for educating the non-alcoholic public on the problem of alcoholism

"ALCOHOLISM IS a progressive and fatal disease, yet alcoholic addicts who begin in time may attain normal health and sobriety. Other diseases demand and get scientific attention, the best medical men can give. The great mass of the sufferers of the disase of alcoholism are left to the
