
Workers over 72 years of age may accept benefit checks regardless of the amount of their earnings starting January, 1955.

"We have seen the worst," said the Executive Secretary. "We have seen the inevitable result of poor land use-overgrazing, erosion-and the like. It's going to take some teamwork even after the weather returns to normalcy. This should be a good time for everyone to face the facts and act accordingly."


