#### **Wheat Marketing Quota Election** June 25th

The final decision on whether or not marketing quotas will apply to the 1956 wheat crop will be made by wheat producers themselves on June 25th.

H. M. Breedlove, county agent, has been advised by the ASC Committee for Donley County that four voting places will be available for producers on the twenty-fifth and that the voting hours will be from 8:00 A. M. to 7:00 P. M. The voting boxes will be at Boydston Elevator for all in the north part of the county: Whitefish and Skillet will vote at the Jess Grogan residence at Whitefish; Clarendon and vicinity will vote at the ASC office in Clarendon and the east end of the county will vote at the City Hall in Hedley.

It takes two thirds of the voters in favor of marketing quotas for them to be in effect; if less than two thirds approve, According to the state committee, acreage controls will be in effect regardless of whether marketing quotas are in effect or not.

Everyone is urged to vote, and opinion one way or another but time and the places to vote, Breedlove added.

The building is complete but there is a great deal of work to be done before the building is ready for use. It is planned by the show board to try to have the building ready for use by the first part of August.

County agent H. M. Breedlove announced this morning that cotton burrs would be available this fall for farmers to haul home and put on their land. Arrangements have been made by the gins in the county to add larger fans to comply with the pink boll worm control law and the cotton burrs can be put on the land this

Cotton burrs added to land at the Lubbock experiment station has increased cotton production on farms as much as fifty pounds of lint per acre and has been very beneficial in controlling blowing of the land. Breedlove says that in the past few years some of our best conservation has gone up in smoke but now farmers can haul burrs back to the farm.

Gins will not be able to hold large stack's of burrs around the gin because of fire hazards and lack of space, so farmers will be required to load the burrs right after ginning their cotton Breedlove says that at that time of the year farmers are very busy so Remember each penny dropped they can haul the burrs home and in one of the containers counts put them in a big stack and then put them on the land in the winter. This plan is good anyway because with moisture on the burrs, harmful weed seed will germinate and make the burrs safer to put on the land.
