It proves to me that all Americans are willing to help unfortunate fellow beings if they know of their misfortune. It is my hope that more effort will be made in this country to apprise the people generally of the sad plight in which many of our own American citizens are existing. I feel that if the sad plight of many of our fellow citizens had received the same publicity as the misfortunes of the Hungarian people, much would be accomplished in solving our domestic problem in this respect and lessening the heavy burden of poverty pressing down upon so many of our own people.



The fields to be certified must be isolated from similar crops according to the standards and these fields are checked by impartial state inspectors for purity and freedom from disease and weeds. Warehouses where seed are stored must measure up to certain standards and the seed are sealed in a bag with the red, white and blue state of Texas seal and the Texas certified or registered tag securely attached.
