



#### **BOSQUE DEER QUOTA UPPED**

AUSTIN-A special harvest of antlerless deer in Bosque County Sunday school and for church of the Possum Kingdom regulatory authority group will be limited to the various ranches where surplus whitetail populations exist, according to the Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission.

Principal request for the fifteen day antlerless shoot came from the Morgan Ranch in Bosque County, the only county in the eighteen-county regulatory region with surplus antlerless deer. The extra hunt will be added di-Mr. and Mrs. Elliott and girls rectly to the regular deer season beginning November 16 and ending December 15.

The Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration said permits will be issued to the interested ranches where overpopulation exists, based on the actual number of excess deer. This system is used in parts of the Hill Country where antlerless deer harvests have been successfully used to

control surpluses. The limit for the regular Bosque County season is one buck. The limit for the antlerless season was set at two for each hunter. Thus, he said, a hunter could get his buck and then participate in the antlerless season to use his other remaining option.

Wildlife biologists reported an estimated three hundred and seven surplus antlerless deer on the Morgan Ranch. The buck surplus for the regular season on that ranch was estimated at seventy five head.

Other ranches which have an overpopulation of antlerless deer include the Campbell Ranch with 138 surplus deer and the Pettit Ranch with 296 surplus deer. Smaller ranches in other parts of Bosque County also will harvest a few antlerless deer by permit.
