Local Chapter Receives Top Rating FOR MISSIONARY At National F.F.A. Convention

Number 38

The Clarendon FFA Chapter received the top rating given by the National F.F.A. Convention STATE SCHOOL MEET in its session at Kansas City last week. A gold medal rating, the highest honor possible for the national association to bestow upon a local chapter, was given the local organization. Clarendon was one of seven Texas Chapters to receive this high rating. Silverton was the only other chapter in 38 county area comprising Area I to receive this honor.

The rating is based upon the overall program of the local F.F.A. organization and takes into consideration the project program, leadership work, conduct of meetings, recreation, community service, and participation in school and community activities. The local group received the highest rating in the area last spring and one of the three highest ratings in the state.

A large plaque was presented the local chapter. The plaque is the permanent property of the local group and will be placed in the trophy case at the local high school. This is the second time the Clarendon F.F.A. has been honored with its selection as one of the top chapters in the national organization. In 1941 Clarendon was one of four chapters among the 8,000 making up the Authority organization to receive the gold medal rating. At that time, J. R. Sheriff Warns Against Putting Out Poison

Sheriff Truett Behrens reportplaints this week in regard to dogs being poisoned here in Clarendon the past week. The dogs that were poisoned were in a neighborhood where there are numerous children and creates a very dangerous situation. He stated that some people were putting out poison for Skunks and if such is the case, much care in preparation and placement should be followed. If pou plan to put out poison, inquire around a bit and learn the proper way to poison for the Skunks alone. This will eliminate the danger to children and dogs also.

We have been told that a very simple mixture can be used to kill Skunks without any danger to any other type of animal; we pass it along and you may try it if you wish. Mix just enough flour with regular baking soda so a small ball can be formed. Place these balls in areas where skunks are suspected. 





Deer Count Shows High Herd Total

AUSTIN-Calculations from incomplete studies in selected Hill Country counties indicate that estimates of Texas' deer population will have to be slanted sharply upward.

Also the investigation shows deer mortality from drought, over population and parasites through last winter aggregated many thousand in four counties alone. These tentative deductions

were disclosed by the Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration of the Game and Fish Commission on the basis of census data prepared under direction of Bob Ramsey, wildlife biologist assigned to the state's principal deer range in the Edwards Plateau region.

Estimates heretofore made of the total state deer population have set the figure at just short of half a million, mainly whitetails. But the seven Hill Country counties, used for the herd counts, reflect a combined population of almost four hundred thousand deer before the last hunting sea-

The Assistant Director said that regardless of the final totals "it is obvious that we are not harvesting as many deer as we should." He said extension of the experimental antlerless deer hunts is one sound management way the herds can be reduced to the carrying capacity of the land.

The investigations were centered in Kerr, Llano, Mason, Gillespie, Medina, Blanco and Sutton counties where the Commission has regulatory responsibility to regulate harvests on the basis of existing current conditions. But the first four named counties; bore the concentrated studies since records from previous herd counts were available there.

Euclid Hudson, president of the Texas Society for Crippled Children, today urged approval for the proposed constitutional amendment on which Texans will vote November 13, and which would enable the state to provide assistance to Texas citizens who are permanently and totally disabled.

Hudson, elected to his second term as president of the state Easter Seal Society at its annual convention in San Antonio last week, said that at present only those Texans who are either younger than 18 or older than 65 receive aid for such disabilities.

"Obviously," the TSCC leader stated, "there are many permamently and totally disabled pers whose ages fall between 18

The other members of the Board and those of the Soil Conservation Service who worked with Judge Porter deeply regret his passing and will miss his presence.


