## City Water Authority Election August 31st

### BRIEF OUTLINE OF PURPOSE OF BILL CREATING Greenbelt Municipal And Industrial Water Authority

The purpose of this law is to create an entity clothed with the power to provide a source of supply of water from seven cities, namely: Hedley, Clarendon, Wellington, Memphis, Paducah, Childress and Quanah. None of these cities at present have a dependable supply of water and none of them have the financial resource to provide an adequate source of supply. By combining themselves into an entity such as the proposed Authority, it is possible for them jointly through this means to provide and finance a source of supply that would be adequate for all of them.

In accordance with preliminary plans, prepared by recognized engineers, it is proposed that the Authority should construct a reservoir on the Salt Fork of the Red River which runs southeasterly through Donley and Collingsworth Counties, both of which counties would be represented in the Authority by the cities of Clarendon and Wellington, respectively. The exact location of the proposed reservoir has not finally been determined, but it is indicated that it will be located in Donley County fairly close to the Collingsworth County western boundary line. It is the opinion of the engineers that a surface supply of water is the only feasible and adequate source of water that should be provided for the member cities. It is not the purpose of the Authority to undertake to develop underground water supply. The Bill prohibits the Authority from seeking an underground water supply beyond the counties within which are situated the member cities. Most of the proposed member cities now obtain their water from underground sources. The Authority's supply would supersede for distribution purposes the present underground supply of each of the member cities. However, as a standby, or for peaking purposes, it contemplates that the present wells of the member cities would be maintained in a state of readiness to

supply the peak or standby needs. Otherwise, the Authority does not contemplate the use of any other underground water.

The Authority is to be governed by a Board of Directors consisting of seven members with each component city naming through its governing body a person to represent it on such Board of Directors.

The Bill contemplates later annexation of additional cities of other territory under certain conditions set forth in the Bill. A great part of the present Bill sets forth the machinery and conditions under which territory later may be annexed to the Authority. However, these provisions are somewhat standard at this time, having been provided previously in the law creating the Colorado Municipal Water District and the North Texas Municipal Water District.

The reservoir and transmission lines contemplated to be constructed by the Authority are to be financed through the issuance of bonds by the Authority. The Bill permits the issuance of revenue bonds, tax bonds, or a combination of the two. It is provided, however, that no bonds payable wholly or partly from taxes can be issued without a vote of the qualified, property taxing voters residing within the limits of the Authority. Such bonds when issued must be approved by the Attorney General and registered by the Comptroller of Public Accounts. Any revenue bonds authorized by the Authority will be secured by water purchase contracts made with each of the member cities. Such contracts must be voted by the qualified property taxing voters of each such city. The income realized from such contracts will be pledged to the payment of any revenue bonds issued by the Authority.

Although the Bill creates the Authority and names the member cities, the Authority will not actually spring into being until the creation has been confirmed at an election held within each of the member cities. If the voters of any member city vote unfavorably upon the creation of the Authority, such city automatically will be eliminated from the Authority. It is further pro-

vided that in the event the Authority proposes to issue tax bonds to provide such facilities that prior to the election on such tax bonds, a summary of the improvements to be made with the proceeds thereof must be published so as to give each member city an opportunity to determine whether such proposed improvements include facilities to provide water for such city. If it is determined that no improvements are planned for any such city, such city then may seek to withdraw from the Authority and the machinery is provided whereby that withdrawal may be accomplished.

It is expressly provided in the Bill that the Authority may not enter into a contract with the Federal Government or any of its agencies whereby under any condition title to any of its properties could pass to the Federal Government or under which contract the Authority might delegate or surrender any of its powers as a sovereign entity and political subdivision of the State of Texas.

The Authority has the power to acquire its necessary right-of-way and reservoir sites by purchase, gift or by condemnation. The power of eminent domain conferred upon the Authority is not greater or less than the power conferred upon such defined entities created under the General Law.

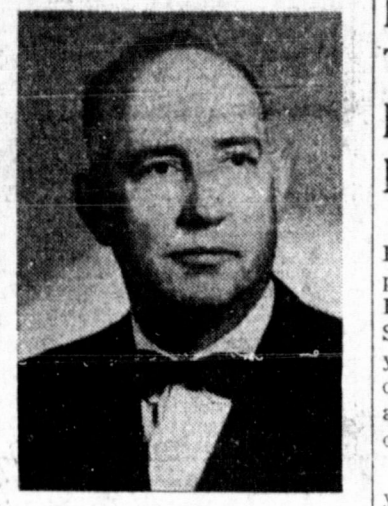

### Federal Veterinarian Testing Free of Charge For TB In Livestock Here In Donley County

According to County Agent H. M. Breedlove, the Federal Department of agriculture sends a Federal Veterinarian in to the State of Texas once every six years to test ten percent of the cattle for TB. This gives the state and counties in which the work is done a TB free accredited area.

Donley County was tested six years ago and now Dr. R. N. Allison is working in Donley County testing livestock. This work is free of charge and all the livestock producer has to do is have his cattle up and run them through a chute for testing. After ten percent of the cattle are tested then cattle from Donley County can be shipped out of state with out being tested for TB.

Anyone wanting this service should contact Breedlove or "Bud" Hermesmeyer who is working with the veterinarian. Dr. Allison suggested that he would rather test herds with not less than ten head of cattle and try to line up herds close together for each days work. Cattle do not need to be in a squeeze chute but can be in an alley type chute where they can be held for an injection of TB serum. He will return to the herds in seventy two hours to check for the reaction. Dairy herds can be checked in the dairy barn.

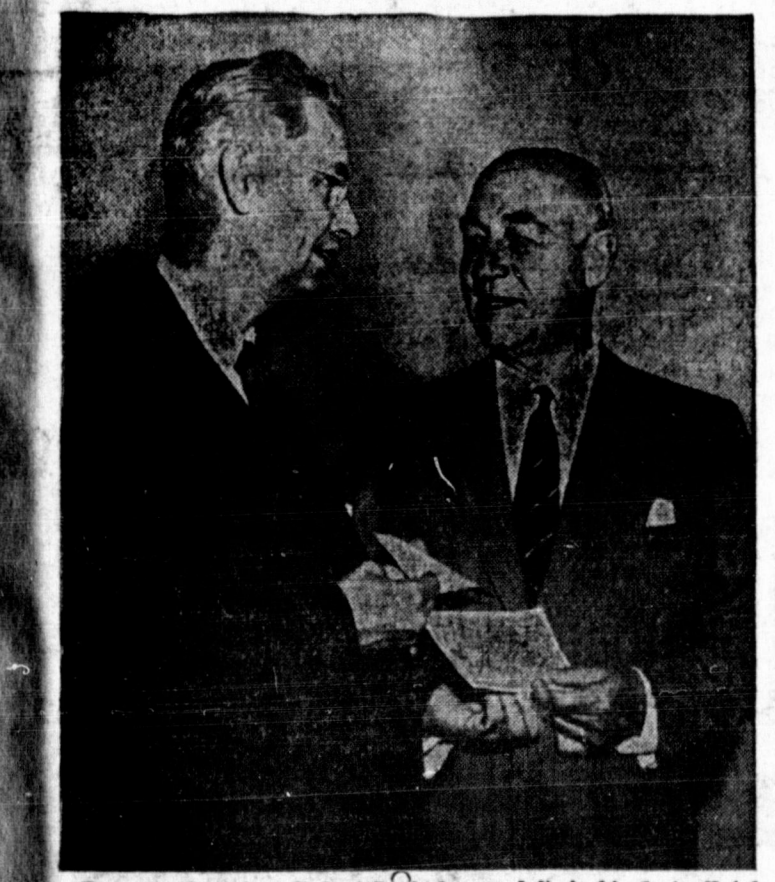
### King Brothers Shows To Highlight Hedley Cotton Festival

### THE HOOVER COMMISSION

The mail has brought many inquiries and suggestions concerning the activities of the Hoover Commission. Many of the letters insist that the government adopt the Hoover Commission Report and save a great deal of money.

Others appear to be of the opinion that all of the recommendations of the Hoover Commission have been cast aside and that this has cost the taxpayers a great deal of money.

I want to try to set the record straight, because there has been considerable misunderstanding of the entire subject. Some of this misunderstanding was brought about by advertising which was not exactly true.

The first Hoover Commission was created by Congress in 1947 and submitted a final report in

1949. This report contained recommendations relating to the reorganization of departments and agencies of the government. Many of those recommendations have been adopted. In fact, a number of them were in operation before the Hoover Commission's report was filed. In 1953 a second Hoover Commission was created by Congress and submitted a final report in June, 1955. This Commission spent 2,848,534 dollars and had personnel totaling 524 at one time. The following quotation is included in the

report of the second Commission: "The primary purpose of the Commission was to recommend methods by which savings could be made in the expenditures of the agencies of the Executive Branch without injury to the security or welfare of the country."

I especially call to your attention the underlined words to point out that, under a democratic form of government, the primary aim is the retention of the rights, privileges, powers and immunities of the individual as guaranteed under the Constitution. Some recommendations of both the Hoover Commissions, if adopted, would have resulted in a centralization of power in certain fields of government operation that could have done violence to some of those rights. I can assure everyone that all these recommendations have been, and are being, carefully weighed.

Senate Report No. 4 of the 83rd Congress was issued in January, 1953, and contained the following statement concerning the activities of the first Hoover Commission:

"Another aspect of the Hoover Commission reports, which has caused considerable confusion in the public mind because of its wide dissemination, involves the extravagant claims of tremendous monetary savings which would result from the full implementation of these reports. These estimates have varied from an ultra-conservative figure of a few million to as much as \$10 billion in

annual savings. This Committee has been unable to find any sound basis for the unsubstantiated estimates of savings claimed by some of the proponents. Even if all the Hoover Commission's recommendations had been found to be of practical application, these estimates are not based on facts and are grossly unfair to the Congress. The American people have every right to expect their representatives in Congress to act with sound judgment regardless of the pressure brought to bear upon them by those who do not have full information as to their impact upon the national welfare."

Subsequently, the Senate Committee on Government Operations issued a report on the second Hoover Commission's activities as follows:

"While these documents prepared by the various study groups form the main basis for the Commission Reports to the Congress, the Commission did not, in all instances, agree with the recommendations of its task forces, subcommittees and study groups. Many of its recommendations are based upon the experience of the members of the Commission plus independent research by the Commission.

"Nor were the 12 members of the Commission, themselves, in complete agreement upon all 20 of the Commission reports. Most of the reports contain dissents, separate statements, or reservations by one or more of the Commissioners. These were directed

usually not to a Commission report as a whole, but to specific recommendations therein."

In 1956, Mr. Percival Brundage, Director of the Bureau of the Bureau of the Budget, appeared before the Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives and was questioned by Chairman Cannon about the statements of one of the Hoover Commission officials that 4 billion dollars could be saved by a change in the budgetary system. The most that Mr. Cannon could get Mr. Brundage to say about this advertised 4 billion dollar savings was the statement that he (Mr. Brundage) felt satisfied such a change would bring about savings of several million dollars. He did not so much as use the term, billion.

You can see from these reports there is a great deal of controversy as to what can and cannot be done should all of the Hoover Commission's recommen-

dations be adopted. Of course, every dime that can be saved should be saved, and will be saved if I have my way.

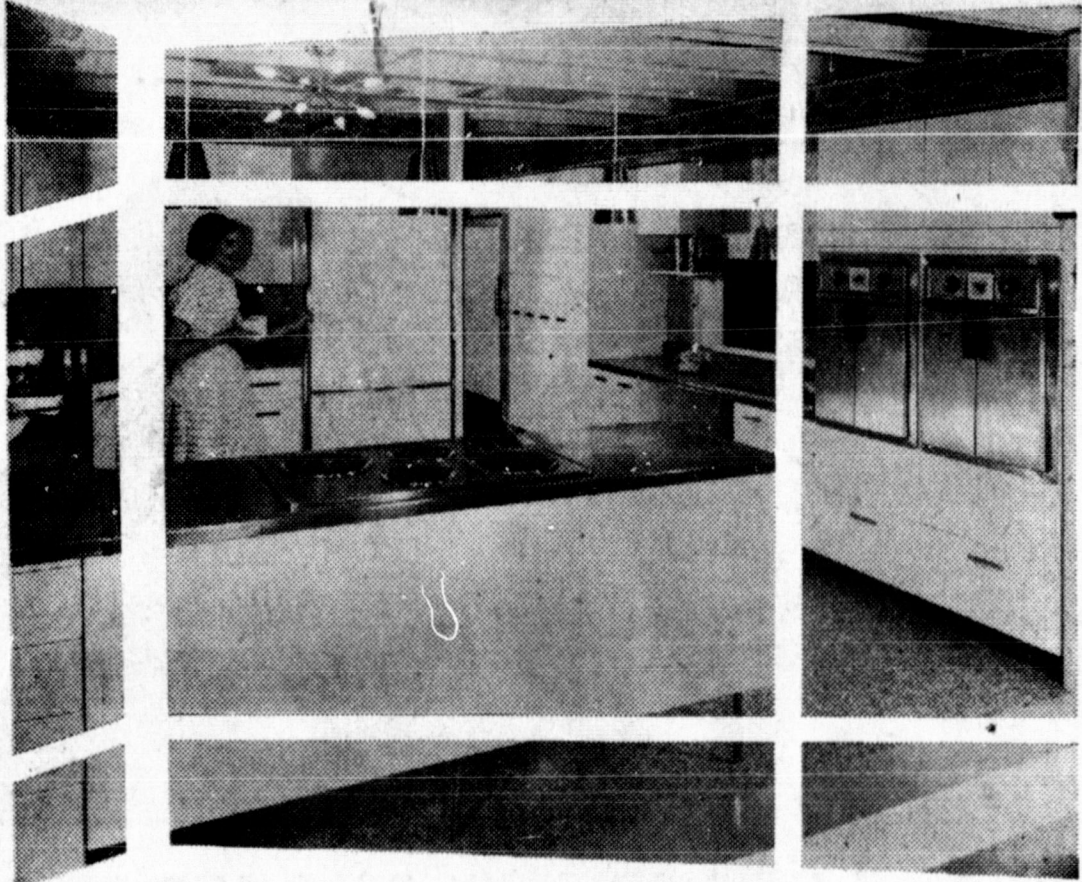

### DONLEY COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

In 1917 there were 2,276,000 people living on 436,000 farms in Texas. On January 1, 1937, it has been estimated there were 1,156,000 people living on 292,000 farms in the state. Fifty percent of the state's population in 1917 was living on farms—on Jan. 1, 1937 this figure has been reduced to 12.7 per cent. These figures indicate the increase in the ability of the Texas farmer to farm more acres through the use of modern machinery. Has his ability to maintain his soil in a productive condition kept pace with this ability to farm more acres? Soil used within its capability and treated according to its needs should be as productive a thousand years from now as it is today.

An interesting conversation between A. C. Carter and Heckle Stark last week indicates that farmers—especially those with irrigation wells—are very conscious of the fact that much of their land is not as productive as it once was, and the need to restore its former productiveness. The most practical method to do this is to grow crops specifically for the soil which will increase the organic matter in the soil.

# Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL

**AUSTIN**—Despite the static about treasury troubles, Gov. Price Daniel insists that the Texas Legislature can hold a special session and still have money left over.

Recently, House Speaker Waggoner Carr and others suggested that the state might not be able to pay session costs without a new tax. But the governor said his budget department estimates

that a brief session, limited to two or three subjects could be held for as little as \$250,000. He reported that some \$618,416 is available. This is considerably more than any previous estimate had indicated.

Governor Daniel made it clear that none of the objections have lessened his determination to issue a special call for passage of lobby control, water conservation and possibly other important measures.

### HELP ON OIL ASKED

### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37** proposing an amendment to Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable.

Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 4-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 61 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 42, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein.

The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

As the state moved into another month of low oil production, Governor Daniel wired Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower that "a real emergency exists."

He asked the President's help in obtaining a limit on foreign oil imports. "More drilling rigs are being stacked," the governor's wire noted, with an "adverse effect on state revenues."

Because of lowered demand for Texas oil, the Railroad Commission set the August allowable at 13 producing days, asme as for July. It is the lowest producing pattern ever used in the state.

### INDIVIDUAL INCOMES UP

Texasans are getting richer, according to Uncle Sam's tax reports for fiscal 1957.

For the five-state Southwestern area federal tax collections hit the all-time record total of \$4,348,149,316. More than half of this—\$2,560,867,402—came from Texas. This is a 7 per cent increase for this state over last year's collections.

Of this total, 75 per cent comes from income taxes, the remainder from employment taxes, excises, etc. Revenue officials attributed the big jump to higher salaries in the Southwest.

### IT'S AN ILL WIND

Cricket season came early this year in the Capital City. The pesky, black jumpers which pay Central Texas an annual visit in great numbers, are here.

But Marion Toole, aquatic biologist for the Texas Game and Fish Commission, says it's a lucky season for fishermen. Crickets, it seems, are considered a real delicacy by all game fish. But sunfish and bass bite them best, he says. "It's too good an opportunity for any fisherman to pass up."

So, while merchants fight them in downtown areas and home owners spray and dust around porches and patios, both fish and fishermen can have a field day. "And they'll be with us until early September," Toole added.

Texas traffic deaths and injuries jumped an estimated two per cent for the first six months of this year as compared to 1956.

Reports from the Department of Public Safety for January-June, 1957, show 96,785 accidents. Total for the same period in 1956 was 91,555 accidents. Final figures on deaths and injuries are not yet tabulated.

One bright spot, however: deaths dropped from 5.7 per million vehicle miles to 5.5 for this year.

### VETS DUE REFUNDS

Some \$16,271 in fees will be returned to veterans who started, but did not complete, transactions with the Veterans Land Board.

Before it was amended by the last Legislature, the law did not allow the board to return fees to veterans who changed their minds about buying land.

Average refund will be about \$70, largest \$100, according to Land Commissioner Earl Rudder.

### "FLU" WATCH ON

An outbreak of Asiatic "flu" in Texas is likely, say State Health Department officials.

Many Texans were believed exposed at a church conference in Grinnell, Iowa, and at the Boy Scout Jamboree in Valley Forge, Pa.

Adding to the uneasiness was a report that 50 sailors stationed at Corpus Christi had been stricken.

Present vaccines are ineffective against this Asiatic virus, said Dr. J. E. Peavy, chief epidemiologist. "But I hope a new vaccine will be ready by fall."

### VICE CAMPAIGN IN THE RED

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson's department is having to use "rubber checks" to carry on with its campaign against organized gambling.

Because of its extra activities, the department ran out of money, with no more due until the new fiscal year begins, Sept. 1. Governor Daniel granted the department \$11,425 from his special emergency fund of \$200,000. But, because of a technicality in the wording of the bill, this money isn't officially available either until 1959.

Hence, the checks written on the fund are deficiency warrants, which, said the comptroller, are really "hot checks." Banks can't get their money from them until the Legislature meets and makes them good.

## Sept. 20 Last Day To File Applications For "Hardship" Waiver

AUSTIN — Students who are residents of Texas will have until September 20 to file applications for the "hardship" waiver of the \$25 per-semester tuition increase voted by the 55th Legislature, University of Texas officials announced today.

Students whose applications are received after August 15 should be prepared to pay the full \$50 per-semester tuition fee, but will receive a refund of \$25 if their applications are acted upon favorably.

The September 20 date was set, officials said, to prevent injustice because of failure to receive information. September 20 is the last day of registration for the fall semester at the University.

Dean of Student Services H. Y. McCowan explained that it requires a full month to secure the information on each application

required by law and to process the application.

McCowan added: "For that reason an original deadline of August 1 had been set for receiving applications. Some deserving students, however, may be unaware of the statutory provisions and we are establishing the refund procedure to take care of them."

The tuition act authorizes the granting of \$25 per semester tuition waiver on the basis of demonstrated financial need. In determining financial need, consideration must be given to the financial capacity of the parents, and to the student's own efforts to finance his education as evidenced by part-time jobs, and loans from private sources.

Requests for applications for tuition waiver should be sent to the chairman of the Committee on Loans and Scholarship Information at the University.

No general revenue appropriations were made by the legislature to state colleges and universities for the tuition waivers,

but each institution was directed to grant waivers of the tuition increase—\$25 each semester—in cases of need, up to a fixed percentage of their estimated total local fund receipts.

## Vocational Agriculture Teachers Weeks In Texas—Aug. 11-17

AUSTIN—Governor Price Daniel has honored agriculture teachers throughout Texas by declaring the week of August 11-17 as Vocational Agriculture Teachers Weeks in Texas.

The governor, in the resolution, praises the agriculture teachers for encouraging the youth of Texas to devote their lives to agriculture and its improvement. Governor Daniel also praised the great strides that had been made in agriculture in Texas in the past quarter century due to the great contribution made by the vocational agriculture teachers.

The statewide association of the agriculture teachers, the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas, was also praised by the governor as being the coordinator of the efforts of the 979 vocational agriculture teachers throughout Texas, and as being the bulwark of this great movement which deserves the admiration and recognition of the citizens of Texas.

During the week of August 11-17th, approximately 1,000 teachers will attend their annual summer conference at the Rice Hotel in Houston. At the conference awards will be made to Lt. Governor Ben Ramsey, members of the Texas House and Senate, outstanding contributors to agricultural education in the newspaper and radio and TV field, and tenure awards will be given to approximately 120 vocational agriculture teachers with ten or more years of teaching experience.

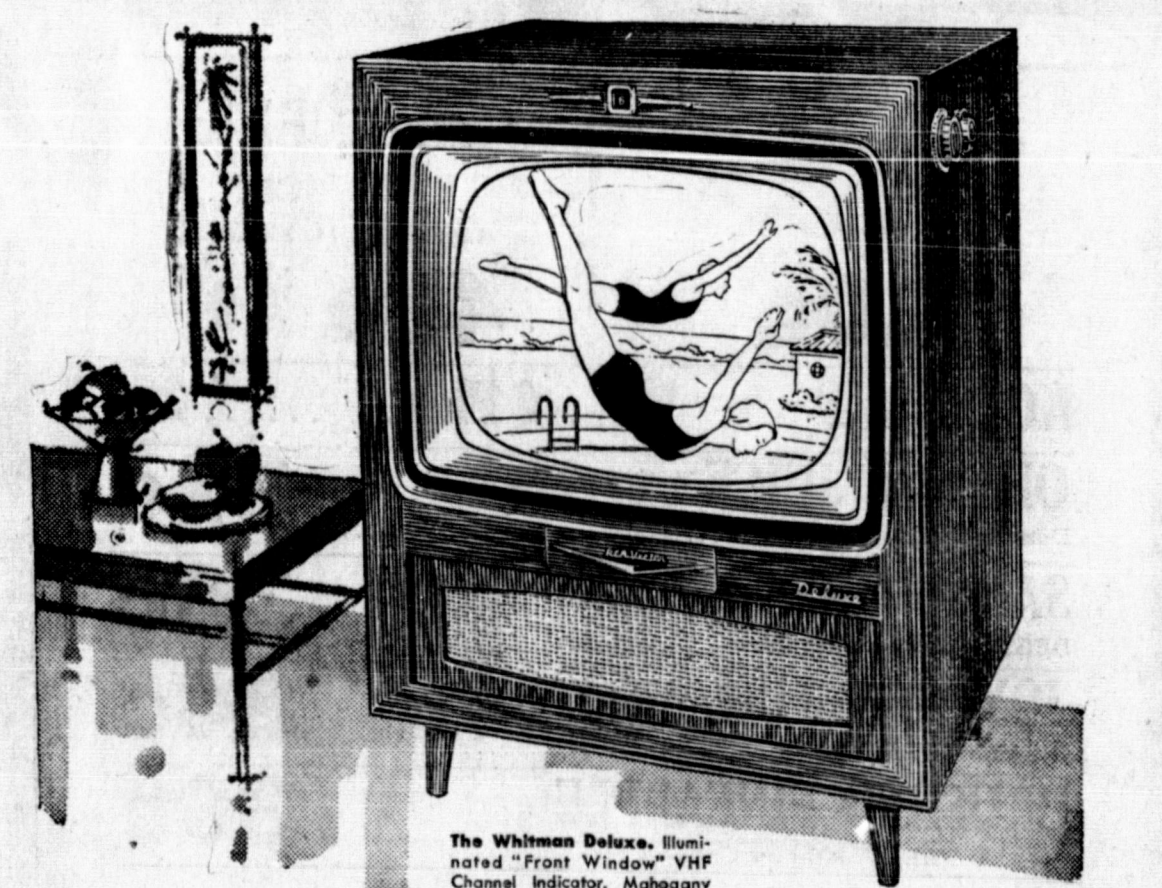
