Scooter Driver Licenses

A brighter outlook appeared this week for scooter operators when Johnnie Martin, safety officer of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said that a special scooter operator's license was available to boys between the ages of 14 and 16. Martin and Sheriff Bill Cornell met with a group of young scooter owners at afternoon at which time Patrolman Martin explained more about scooter operation.

Scooter operator's license are available provided scooters do not exceed a brake horsepower of five. Most scooters come under this heading.

As is the case with automobile driver's licenses, applicant must take written test, the sign test and the actual driving test. The license examiner follows along behind the scooter operator in the state car and grades the youth, Patrolman Martin stated.



Any motorist who has ever been mmobilized on snow or ice at a curb, or who has ever had the unfortunate experience of getting a rear wheel logged down in sticky mud or heavy sand (and who hasn't?) will immediately recognize the increased liever convenience the new locking differential has brought to motoring.

When ice or snow is encountered at a curb, with the old-style differintial the curb wheel frequently ipins and the vehicle is stuck, unable to be moved either forward or ackward.







Time ran out on the Clarendon Bronchos at Canadian last Friday night and the Wildcats walked off the field with a 12 to 6 decision over the Bronchos in an important District 2-A game. The Bronchos were on the Wildcat five yard line when the clock ran
