



Utilities Company purchased one half of the Gulf Oil Corporation's water rights at the lake, approximately one and a half million gallons per day.

Since WTU's new plant will be of the circulation type, which takes water in on one side of the plant, uses it to condense steam and discharges the water on the other side of the plant, the water will actually be used at the lake and Sweetwater will be relieved of its contract obligation to the oil company of pumping one and a half million gallons of . water daily from the lake to the city



The oil company, by selling its surplus water rights, can recover a part of its cost.


