# MONTHLY SURVEY IS **RELEASED BY BOARD** OF COUNTY WELFARE

"All needy persons on relief in Brown county are not being cared for adequately. An increase in the relief load is expected in this county soon because of the lack of employment," a recent report from the Brown County Board of Welfare states

Surplus clothes and food with a total value of \$3,645.54 were issued to clients of the Texas Relief Commission by the Board during the month of April. Of this sum. \$603.54 was the estimated value of the food issued and \$3,042 was estimated value of the clothing issued.

Clothing was issued to 472 persons and food was issued to 633 grsons. The following amounts of foods were distributed: dried beans, 557 pounds valued at \$55.70; spuds. 9,300 pounds valued at \$186; fresh apples, 9,400 pounds valued at \$34.90; shortening, 684 pounds valued at \$109.44; rice, 350 pounds valued at \$17.50. Clothing was distributed as follows: children, 1,517 garments valued at \$1,137.75; infants, 994 garments valued at \$497 women and misses 776 garments valued \$659.60; men and young 15; and two pillow cases valued at ty home demonstration agent, ar





That the fertility of our soils has been depleted seriously is obvious. Forty years ago the farms of Brown county yielded on an average 43 bushels of wheat; 55 bushels of corn and 80 bushels of oats per acre. In 1937 the average yield of these crops was less than half as large.

# The Slaughter Must Stop

and methods of checking the growing human slaughter on our highways is a step in the right direction and evidences a growing interest in this serious and terrible traffic problem.

According to respective trends in thought and life, various reasons for the appalling number of accidents have been advanced. One would say the violation of the commendable slogan, "If you drink, don't drive; if you drive don't drink" is responsible for most accidents; another, of horse and buggy days and ways, would say it is fast driving: others from whom time has taken youth and left too little of sympathy and charity would say it is wild, reckless, adventurous youth; still others would say that there are too many commercial cars unrestricted on the highways. Each, no doubt, would have facts to sustain his diagnosis.

Highway hazards are a matter of recent development. and because of lack of in had the careful thought which its dangers justify. Through a hundred years of operation, during which time they have been held to a strict and rigid accountability for damage to life and property, railroads have developed definite and distinct policies of safety. Speed limits have been fixed and rigidly enforced, brakes and other control facilities are required to be the best and to be frequently and carefully inspected and tested. The persons in charge are required to be capable, sober and alert and not permitted to be on duty above a limited number of hours without rest and sleep.

Among other remedies, the following would be recommended: more rigid requirements and more careful examinations for drivers' license; amended and more strictly enforced speed regulations; making speed limit to vary in inverse proportion to weight of vehicle and load; and for violations of load limits, speed limits, and other regulations, take up license and take vehicle off the road for a period of time.

Rescinding drivers' licenses has proved to be a most effective deterrent to drunken driving on the highways .-E. J. Miller, Judge 35th District Court.






