Sheriff Truett Behrens and deputy F. A. Fitzgerald made fast work of apprehending the robber of a McCarts Super Market in Amarillo Monday night. They received the call and were on their way to Claude to help Sheriff Moore with a road block when they spotted the green Pontiac bearing Colorado license about four miles this side of Claude. They turned around and had their man within another three miles, and less than an hour after the robbery occured. They found the money, \$1064.75 and the 45 revolver he used in the trunk of the car. 



Under current legislation, this support will be between 75 and 90 percent of parity, the minimum level within this range depending upon the supply situation at the time the determination is made.

If more than one-third of the growers disapprove quotas, there will be no marketing quotas or penalties, but price supports to eligible growers (who comply with their allotments) will be available at 50 percent of parity. Obtained From FHA Boosts Cash Income

Annual gross cash income grew from \$4,880 to \$8,021 in five years for a group of Texas farm families who obtained Farmers Home Administration farm ownership loans in 1950 to buy, enlarge, or improve their farms, the agency's State Director Walter T. McKay reported today.

The average net worth for these Texas farm families advanced from \$7,301 before they received, their farm ownership loans to approximately \$10,900 at the end of their fifth year of operation under that loan program. Before the loans were made the average family in the group was operating 189 acres but was operating 224 acres in 1955. The combined value or equipment and productive livestock owned by the average family in the group

made, and was approximately \$6,686 in 1955. Figures showing these advances, together with five-year progress along other lines, come from a survey of 1955 borrowers who obtained loans in 1950. A similar survey is made each year. The 1956 figures will be available in 1957 showing five-year pro-

loans in 1951. Farm ownership loans are made to buy family-type farms, enlarge under-sized farms, develop farms, and refinance debts. Funds come from private lenders under the insured loan program or from annually appropriated funds, and are amortized for periods up to 40 years. On an average the loans are repaid in 9 years. Insured loans are limited to 90 percent of the fair and reasonable value of the farm. A loan to buy a family-type farm cannot be made if the fair and reasonable value of the farm is more than the average value of efficient

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

number of years the ACP has offered to share the cost of seeding this kind of land to grass. Several thousand acres in the District have been returned to pasture with financial assistance from the ACP and technical assistance from Soil Conservation Service technicians through the Soil Conservation District. However, many farmers have felt that they could not afford to lose what little income this kind of land was bringing in during the period a grass cover was being established. The Conservation Reserve is designed to meet this need by paying an annual rental for the land for the period it is signed up for-either a five year or a ten year period. In the Donley District, this annual rental is-\$9.00 per acre. This is in addition to sharing 80% of the average cost of establishing grass on the land. By doing his own work and using his own equipment, most farmers will be able to establish grass on his land with very little

The Donley District has need for such a program as the Conservation Reserve to help it accomplish its conservation objective of "The use of each acre of land within its capabilities and treatment according to its needs." It is hoped that each farmer will carefully consider the needs of his land, seek whatever advice he might need in how it should be treated through his Conservation District, and then take the trouble of finding out how the Conservation Reserve and other programs can assist him in not only becoming a conservation farmer. but making more profit from his.
