

Sanderson, District Manager, announced today.

Since the objection of National Farm-City Week (November 22-28), is to stress the interrelation of rural and urban peoples, Sanderson said that the Social Security Administration will emphasize the "onenses" of its old-age. survivors, and disability program.

"Some people do not fully undersand that the social security program is the same for the farmer and for the city person," Sanderson said. "Many farmers still think that old-age, survivors, and disability insurance for them and their families is a distinct and separate program from the social security program for city folks. Some believe erroneously, that when they reach retirement age they just have to apply at their social security district office for 'farmers' benefits' and then go right on with their farming activities," he declared.

As a possible reason for this misunderstanding, may be that the social security law does contain a few special provisions for farmers in recognition of the fact that farming differs in many ways from the operation of otherbusiness enterprises. These provisions relate to the way self-employed farmers are permitted to figure their net earnings for social security purposes if their gross farm income is not more than \$1,800 and their net is less than \$1,200; also, the manner in which farm rental income received from a tenant or sharefarmer can count for social security credit if the farm landlord 'materially participates" in the operation on the land he rents

These special provisions for farm operators, however, have nothing to do with the type of social security benefits payable or work eligibility for benefits. Farmers and their families qualify for these Federal insurance payments based on a farmer's work under social security just like millions of city workers who are employed or self-employed in offices, factories, mercantile enterprises or covered professions

in urban areas. The interdependence of farm and city is a factor in the extension of old-age, survivors, and disability insurance to farm people, and it is the reason why the Social Security Administration is whole-heartedly cooperating in the observance of National Farm-City Week," Sanderson declared.





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
