> colled upon to decide whether the baby teeth should be pulled. One of the most common problems with dogs is the accumulation of tartar on their teeth. Too much tartar may cause bad breath, abcessed teeth or pyorrhea with loosening and eventual loss of teeth. The associated infection may spread to adjacent sinuses, to joints or may cause digestive disturbances that may shorten the dog's life.

A rib or knuckle bone or marrow bone to chew on once a week may help prevent accumulation of tartar. If you notice a yellow-brown coating building up on the teeth at the gum line, you should take your pet to the veterinarian for a check-up and possible scraping to remove tartar. If you plan to do the job yourself, you can get a scraper from a kennel supply firm. In using it, always push away from the gum line and toward the end of the tooth.

Cavities are rare in a dog's teeth but occasionally occur. Such teeth, or split teeth from other causes should usually be removed.

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




