Energas Company requests rate increase

The Muleshoe City Council last Tuesday discussed a proposed rate increase by the Energas Company. According to Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr, Energas, which serves this area, is proposing a rate increase of \$.89 cents to the minimum monthly bill charge. The current minimum charge is \$4.75 and with the proposed increased, it could go up to \$5.64.

Marr said Energas is also requesting increases for service charges for customers, including new installations and reconnection of delinquent accounts. Energas is proposing the increase in order to increase their annual revenues by 1.9 percent. Their last general rate increase was in 1991.

However, no formal action was taken by the city council. Marr said the city, along with others in the area, have formed a steering committee which has hired a consultant to look at Energas's request and make a recommendation to the city either to deny, amend or acept it.

Marr said that right now the steering committee is looking at Energas's request and a recommendation is expected to be made to the cities by mid-November or December.

Marr said that if the proposal is denied, Energas can file an appeal with the Texas Railroad Commission.

In other business last Tuesday, the City Council heard a report from Mike McDearmon of Southwestern Public Service (SPS). SPS is currently ungrading several lines and making improvements. The upgrade is expected to cut down on the effects in service and damage often made during lightening storms.

Former inmate files suit against Bailey County jail

A former inmate at the Bailey County Jail has filed a suit against the county jail and sheriff's department for an alleged "personal injury" he claims he received while incarcerated there.

Ismael Ramirez Reyes filed a personal injury suit in the rently an inmate in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Institutional Division at the John W. Middleton transfer facility in Abilene and is representing himself in the

Reyes is asking for \$25,000.25 for injuries he says 287th District Court on Tues- he received when he fell after and slipped and fell down beday, Oct. 18. Reyes is cur-taking a shower at the Bailey

County jail.

The suit states that Reves was arrested by the Bailey County Sheriff's Department in September of 1993 on a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. While incarcerated here, Reyes alleged that he took a shower cause of "poor unsafe conditions of confinement."

In his suit, Reyes claims that the "Bailey County jail is a health risk in which the shower does not have floor grips of floors mats to keep inmates from falling. It also states that the shower, which has a drainage inside, does not have a drainage on the outside, thus leaving water that falls out of

the shower to flow onto the

Mules frustrated by Whirlwinds

MULESHOE—For Muleshoe Mules Friday night's 45-21 loss to the Floydada Whirlwinds has to be more frustrating than embarrassing. The Mules had the advantage of seeing many of the Winds' offensive sets last week in a 9-6 loss to Friona. "Everything they ran was what we were expecting, we knew the job we had to do and tonight we just didn't get that job done," said Muleshoe head coach Randy Adair.

The one weapon that the Mules (2-6, 0-3 in District 2-3A) may not have seen against Friona was Floydada tailback Pete Cooper. The 5'10 170 pound senior exploited every hole that the overmatched Mule defensive line surrendered. Cooper started the scoring for FHS on a 54-yard scamper. The play started innocently enough as a sweep to the short side that turned in to a foot race. The Winds' Zach Abshier shanked the point after leaving MHS facing an early 6-0 deficit.

Senior quarterback Jimmy Guana brought the Mules back in a hurry, he connected

on four of five passes on the drive good for 60 yards including a pretty touch pass that wide out Daniel Garbarino snared in the corner of the endzone. Edward Rodriguez added the point after and with 4:07 remaining in the first Muleshoe led 7-6.

Following a 30-yard FHS field goal the Muleshoe offense went back to work, this time only trailing by a pair, 9-7. Rashad Kirven returned the kickoff to the 41yard line where Gauna took to the air again. This time it was a 4th and 11 out and up route run by Garbarino that went for a 27-yard score. A converted two point conversion gave the Mules a 15-9 advantage.

Cooper and his Whirlwind (3-5, 2-1 in 2-3A) teammates were quick to answer. The slippery tailback took the opening play of the drive 72yards for a touchdown. "He was a good back and we had trouble getting any hits on him," said Adair of Cooper.

Trailing 16-15 Muleshoe was forced to start from their own 8-yard line following a mishandled kickoff by Kir-

ven. Guana moved the Mules nearly to midfield when Kirven fumbled a third down carry right in to the waiting arms of Cooper. Floydada's superman followed the sidelines 65-yards for a touchdown. The fumble was one of four that Kirven would be charged with on the night, "Rashad (Kirven) is a very consistent back, this is rare for him," added Adair. "It affected the way he carried the ball the rest of the game."

Floydada had plans for all of those gifts from the Muleshoe offense, the Whirlwinds converted on all four of the turnovers and rolled of 36 unanswered points after falling behind 15-9 in the first quarter. "We knew if we could score getting the ball right after half we could lock it up," boasted WHS coach Lee Hurt. That score was another Cooper touchdown, one of his four on the night, he coupled those scores with 17 carries for 244 yards and the second quarter fumble recovery. "This was the best game of the year for me," stated the second year

that he was taken by emergency ambulance to a clinic for stronger medication for several headache pains he received from the fall.

In his suit, Reyes states, "If the Bailey County Jail would have met the Texas Commission on Jail Standards Requirements on safety conditions, injuries like this would never have happened."

Bailey County Sheriff Jerry Hicks said that it would not be proper for him to comment on the law suit. However, he did said, "The only thing I can say is that we have passed 17

consecutive jail inspections."

Hicks said that if a problem had been found during any of those inspections, the jail would have been closed.

In his suit, Reyes further claims that he is "still suffering from headache spins and right leg pain since his injury, as well as mental anguish, humiliation and physical emotional distress. He further states that he does not have a witness to confirm the incident.

The county, which is being represented by County Attorney Paul Crosnoe, has 20 days to file a response to the allegations.

In the second flight, Helen Templeton had low gross and Analita Haley won low note. Jeanette Precure was the big winner, capturing the low net championship title.







HeartFest to be held October 22-29

There's good news for health-conscious Americans, according to the American Heart Association. Finding the fat in prepared foods will be easier than ever with the new nutrition label required of food manufacturers by the Food and Drug Administration.

The new label requirements will be featured at the AHA's annual HeartFest, Oct. 22-29, held at participating grocery stores nationwide.

"When food claims to be low-fat, fat-free or lite, it's hard to know what those things mean," said Elizabeth Watson, local president. "But with the new label requirements, these terms cannot be used unless the product meets legal standards set by the government. At HeartFest, we'll explain how to read th new label and plan a low-fat menu."

The new label lists such things as total calories, calories from fat and the amount of saturated fat, cholesterol, sodium and fiber per serving. Also, it lists your daily values which is the upper limit of fat and cholesterol you can safely have every day if you normally eat around 2,350 calories. for vitamins and minerals, your daily value is 100 percent of each.

HeartFest participants can

obtain a brochure on how to read the new label. It will define terms like fat-free, lowfat, lite or light and cholesterol free so that you'll now exactly what this means.

This brochure will also cover what the product must contain in order to make health claims regarding high blood pressure or heart disease.

The HeartFest event, launched in 1985 as Food Festival, is held at thousands of grocery stores nationwide. It's goal is to promote low-fat, heart-healthful eating. Area stores will participate in the event

In addition, some stores

will offer other activities such as store tours, eduational activities and cooking demonstrations.

HeartFest is sponsored nationwide by the Ameican heart Association. The American

Heart Association recommends that total fat intake be less than 30 percent of calories

eaten each day and the satudal fat be less than 10 percent of total calories. Cholesterol in-

take should not exceed 300 milligrams a day and sodium should not exceed 3,000 milligrams a day.

One of the finest books that I've seen on suffering is Philip Yancey's Where Is God When It Hurts? Early in the book, Yancey recalls the words of noted German minister and theologian Helmut Thielicke who was asked what he saw as the greatest defect among

American Christians. His answer: "They have an inade-

quate view of suffering."

We Christians in the affluent western world are so infected by the values and mindset of our society that we often forget the truth that there can be worth in suffering. We naturally want our dentists painless, our band-aids ouch-less, and our world hurt-free. But what we want is not necessarily what we get--or even what we need.

Don't misunderstand--I'm not within a million miles of suggesting that pain is, of itself, a good thing. But I do think we'd do well to listen to the note the Christian faith trumpets forth loudly and clearly and that our own expe-

rience confirms to be true: very little of any worth has ever been accomplished without Christianity, and the cross which is at its heart, teaches us the lesson that, as Paul Tournier writes, "What disturbs our lives, puts us out, irritates us, annoys us, affects us, makes us suffer--severely sometimes--does not make us grow and develop, but does make growth and development possible, on condition, of course, that we are not destroyed by it."

Growth never comes without struggle. Joseph had his pit. Daniel had his lion's den. Jesus had his cross. And He tells us plainly that anyone who would be His must take up his own cross and follow Him. No one has ever invented a comfortable cross. Carrying a cross always involves suffering of some sort, but Jesus has also told us that "he who does not take up his cross and follow me is not worthy of me" (Matthew 10:38). No cross, no crown.

Luke records that on his first missionary journey, Paul urged the young disciples to faith and told them, "Through many tribulations we must enter the kingdom of God" (Acts 14:22). The truth is that there is no other way.
