About 1900 there was much controversy as to which was superior, ground lenses or blown lenses. In 1937 TO THE Dr. Feinbloom, a New York optometrist, was able to combine a prescription ground glass front **RODEO** and **CELEBRATION** portion set in plastic for comfort and lightness. Then a year later **Obring Laboratories in New York** came out with the first practical, accurate all plastic contact lenses. These lenses required use of a buffer solution between lens and eye but gave good vision and could be worn from 4 to 10 hours by some patients. No real improvement was made in the Obring lenses till just after World War II when developments made using the buffer solution unnecessary and the size of the lenses began to decrease.
