KARL LOVELADY Karl Lovelady Speaks To The Farmers

I believe in a broader "Farmto-Market" road program by trying to get an additional \$50,000,-000 per year to the amount now spent, for more farm roads.

I believe in a much broader rural electrification and rural telephone program so that every farmer will benefit.

I would like to see a state supported experimental farm, to be located in the heart of the vegetable growing district, for experimentation in the growing of vegetables.

I would amend the present employment law so that the TEXAS EMPLOYMENT COMMISSION would bring into any given area suitable labor to be used on the farm where said labor is not locally available at the time when this labor is most needed by the farmer.



LOST OIL FORESEEN

If Texas continues to limit oil production to market demand, the state may lose permanently some of its underground oil resources.

Railroad Commission Chairman Olin Culberson told a group of some 600 Southwestern oil men that if present trends continue, development of secondary recovery programs will not be justified. In short, going after the last drop available from a pool is hardly worthwhile when production is stringently limited.

Culbertson suggested to the Texas Petroleum Research Committee's Oil Recovery Conference that a new approach might be needed to conserve Texas' prime resource. Alternative, he said, might be the loss of well over half the oil under Texas.
