Encouragement for this community's hope of attracting more industry is implied in a report just released by the University of Oklahoma. In keeping with the well known trend of companies shifting to the southern edge of the U.S., the study indicates that 79 per cent more corporations were headquartered in Texas in 1975 than ten years before.

Booming Houston heads the parade of progress with an 118 per cent increase in the number of corporate headquarters in the ten years. Fort Worth has gained 73 per cent, Dallas 67, and San Antonio 59. Nationwide the increase was less than 15 per cent.

Also, 16 states of the North and Northeast had an average increase of less than 6 per cent whereas the same number of states across the South and Southwest averaged an increase of 41 per cent. The five leaders of that area, all with gains of more than the average, are Texas, Arizona, Florida, South Carolina and Virginia.

All of this is food for optimism. Without a doubt the trend of progress is moving our way. Muenster can confidently look forward to a share in the development if it will maintain its reputation as a good place to live. Of course, with an increase of opportunity, we hope that a larger portion of our youngsters will be induced to stay and apply their talents in our community.

Understandably, this southward drift of business is disliked in the North as much as it is liked in South. And legislators up north are seeking ways to hinder the exodus of industry from their area. Representative Omar Burleson says a new bill entitled National Employment Priorities Act has been introduced for that obvious purpose. It provides that if a manufacturing plant is considering a move which would cause as many as 15% of its employees to lose their jobs, it would be required to notify the Secretary of Labor two years in advance and become the subject of a government investigation at the request of the Secretary of Labor, a union, or 10% of its employees. After a public hearing the government would determine whether the move is justified.

Burleson adds that the legislation has union support, and it is understood to have strong backing in the US Senate. As a matter of fact, Vice President Mondale was a sponsor of the idea during his last term in the Senate.

It is hard to imagine a more arbitrary policy of pushing industries around. This completely disregards the owner's right to do as he sees fit and forces him instead to do as dictated by politicians and labor bosses... whose concern, incidentally, is quite easily understood.

Big Labor wants the industries to remain up North and East where compulsory unionism is in effect. It is getting panicky about relocation of industry to Right to Work States, mostly in the South, where workers are free to belong or not belong to a union. The Senate's support of the scheme has a similar explanation. Many senators of the North and East get strong political support from Labor and pay their political debt by doing Labor's bidding in government. If the bill becomes law industry's chance of making a change will disappear almost completely, and Labor's grip on industry will be vastly increased.

A similar brainstorm proposed by Senator Proxmire would require a lending institution to lend money more on the basis of political and social requirements than on economics... the government determining what the requirements are. Known as the Community Reinvestment Act, it would allow a federal agency rather than the lender to determine the merit of a loan.

Barron's Weekly says that the act is a "fair name for foul legislation", and that "the ultimate objective is federal allocation of private capital with all its attendant potentialities for waste, abuse and political evil. Behind the carefully contrived facade of

## Budget of \$226,608 Adopted by Council

A budget of \$226,608 for the fiscal year beginning October 1 was adopted by the Muenster City Council at its regular meeting Monday night. The amount includes \$154,000 in general fund expenditures and \$72,608 for the water and sewer departments, however expected receipts are higher in each case and the council is counting on a balance of near \$25,000.

Anticipated spending in the general fund was listed as follows: Police department \$26,197; Fire department \$4,200; Garbage department \$36,128; Street department \$50,955; Health department \$1,975; Park department \$4,200; Swimming pool \$4,200; Library \$3,100; Administration \$23,045.

Receipts to support the budget were estimated at \$168,505. First source of revenue is the local ad valorem tax based on \$4,664,098 of as-

essed valuation in real and personal property plus \$23,800 in oil royalties, a total of \$4,687,898. With normal adjustment for delinquency, penalty and interest, the estimated tax return is \$32,154.24. Other expected revenue is listed as follows: Franchise tax \$14,974.19; Revenue sharing \$18,000.00; Swim pool receipts \$3,200; City sales tax \$48,000; Court fines \$7,000; County pay to fire department \$1,500; Garbage fees \$35,227; Licenses \$400; Oil royalty \$50; Building permits \$100; Miscellaneous \$7,500.

Receipts as well as expenditures are calculated on the basis of the past two years with adjustment for inflation and other known relevant factors. As estimated by the council, the city should have a balance of \$14,505.43 in its general fund at the end of the fiscal year.

A separate operation of the city is the Water and Sewer Department, with income estimated as follows: Sales and service \$94,453; Permits \$600; Miscellaneous \$5,000; Interest on reserve funds \$42. Those add to an expected income of \$100,695.

Operating cost of the water department consists mainly of power, salaries and social security, supplies and chemicals and maintenance of trucks, mains, wells, etc., plus billing expense... all adding to \$47,961.

Operation of the sewer system, again consisting principally of salaries, power, maintenance and supplies adds to an estimated \$23,647, and combined expenditure of the two departments is \$71,608.

According to the council's calculations the total expense of the departments subtracted from the total revenue leaves a net revenue of \$29,077. Of this amount \$6,720 is earmarked for debt retirement and \$22,357 remain at a balance on hand for the departments. However the total is substantially reduced by transferring \$12,000 to the city's lake fund. This is in keeping with a recently adopted resolution to invest \$1000 a month in the lake fund. Principal and interest accumulated thereby will give the city a head start on its bond payment schedule.

Balance remaining in the two departments after the investment is estimated at \$10,357. Combined with \$14,505.43 in the general fund, the city expects to have a total balance of \$24,862.43.

Because of the seasonal heavy demand for blood, the center's supply is below normal and a good response is urgently needed.

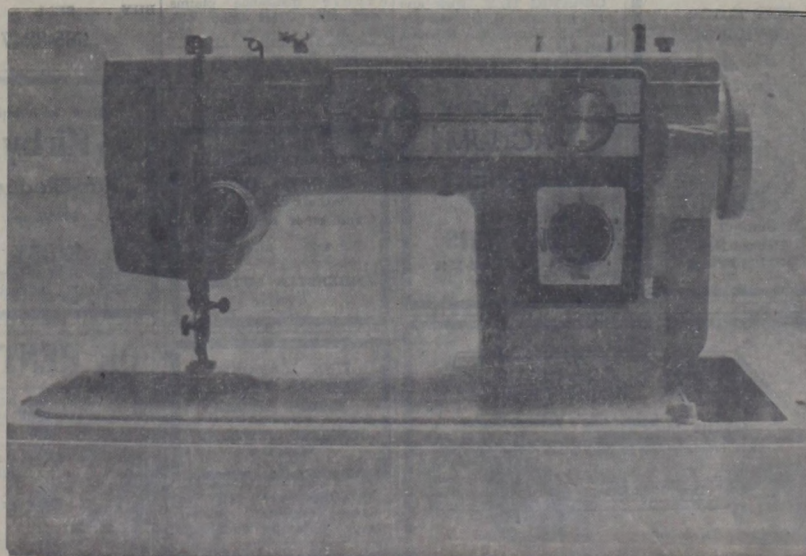

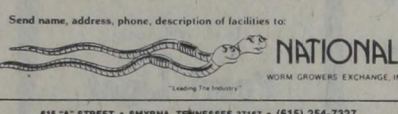

# SAVING TIPS

on electric air conditioning



Air conditioning provides lots of comfort during the summer months, but for many thousands of homeowners it is also the biggest factor in the cost of electricity. On the average, air conditioning accounts for about half of summertime electric bills.

Here are ways you can hold down the cost of air conditioning and still enjoy its comfort.

### Central Systems

1. Set thermostat on 78°, or higher, during the summer. Turn unit off if you'll be away from home several days.
2. Keep equipment at top operating efficiency. Have it checked seasonally by qualified serviceman.
3. Check filter every 30 days. Dirty filters cause equipment to use excessive electricity. If filter is permanent, clean by manufacturer's directions; if it's disposable, it should be replaced when dirty.
4. Keep furniture, draperies away from air outlets and returns. Clean grills often.
5. Close draperies and blinds to keep out direct sunlight.
6. Keep fireplace damper closed.
7. Proper home insulation keeps the heat out, cuts energy use. Insulation questions? Call TP&L.
8. Shade on roof and walls can reduce energy needed to cool. But trim trees, shrubs away from outside compressor unit. Keep it free of leaves, debris. If air flow is blocked, unit uses more energy.
9. Weatherstrip doors and windows; caulk cracks to prevent drafts and cool air loss.

10. Keep windows closed. Open outside doors as little as possible.

### Window Units

Follow above suggestions, plus these:

11. Buy units with highest "energy efficiency ratio" (EER). Uses less electricity to cool. If EER is not on sales tag, ask for it or figure it yourself. Divide "wattage" into "BTU" capacity. Both figures are on unit.
12. Place unit where it'll get as little direct sun as possible.
13. Aim air outlets at lower half of doorway to next room to allow warm air from that room to enter at the doortop for recooling, recirculation.
14. Never vent air conditioner into garage. Ventilation is usually too poor for top performance of your unit.

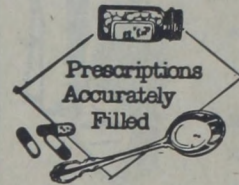

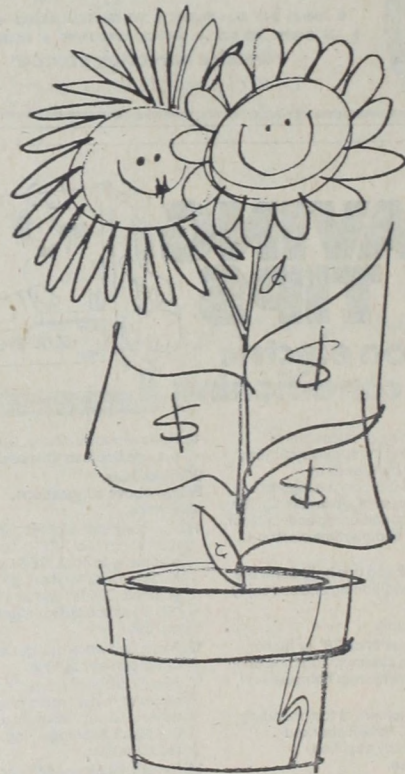

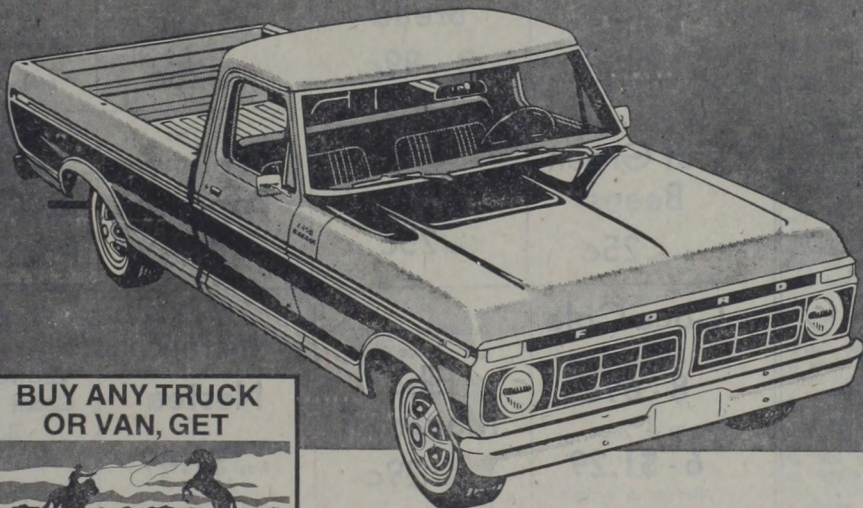

### Council Okays Annexing Area West of City

Preliminaries to the annexation of some 30 acres to the southwest of the city got underway Monday night when the Valeron Corporation presented to the city council its request for addition of the area on which its new plant will be located.

Ground for the new structure, which was cleared last week, is situated a short distance west of Ash Street and south of the point where a farm road merges with Highway 82.

The city council combined that petition with one submitted a month earlier by Southtown Partners and asked City Attorney Julian Smith to begin paper work for the annexation.

Also concerning the same area was an order to proceed with extension of water and sewer lines and a decision to change the city's policy in charging for the extension.

Heretofore the city paid the full cost which was recovered in part each time a new connection was made. The method has resulted in long delays if development of the area was slow.

The new policy is to bill the developer for the initial cost and let him recover the cost as new customers are added. It was assumed that because of his financial interest, the developer would have more inducement to get occupants for the area. An ordinance creating the new policy is being prepared for consideration at the next council meeting.

Other city improvement concerns a petition for new pavement in the southeast part of town, specifically about six blocks on Hickory, Eddy and Mesquite Streets.

The project received favorable consideration, but also a reminder that curbing is needed in several places before the city will authorize the paving. The suggestion was to have the missing curb installed as soon as possible and let it settle until next summer when a better paving job can be expected.

Also okayed at the meeting was a suggestion to increase electrical power in the city park. The request follows recent power failures at large gatherings, and the council agreed to have TP&L make the necessary installation.

Patrolman David Province was authorized to attend a nine weeks class in a police academy at Sherman in order to qualify for state certification as a police officer. The state regulation requires an officer to have the certificate within six months of being employed.

A final bit of business was acceptance of Tuggle Motor Company's bid for purchase of a new patrol car. It was in the amount of \$4100 with trade, the lowest submitted.

This community's Senior Nutrition and Activities Program (SNAP) got under way last Thursday with a kickoff luncheon attended by 103 persons, including representatives from almost all the local civic and parish organizations. A special guest was Mrs. Elizabeth Neu, 106. Others were three ladies from Callisburg who are organizing a program in their community. A door prize, given by Gehrig Hardware, was won by Sister Theresina.

The Muenster program is directed by Mrs. Hugo Lutkenhaus with Mrs. Robert Klement as her assistant. They are working in cooperation with Mrs. Joy Jones who heads the Texoma Region SNAP program, which services twelve communities in Grayson, Fannin and Cooke Counties.

Other jobs to be handled by volunteers is taking meals to shut ins, helping in the serving line at meals and taking charge of recreation or projects. Another service, for which a qualified person can receive compensation, is the handy man, doing odd jobs which aged and feeble cannot do for themselves.

Meals for the program are prepared in a central kitchen of the region and transported in thermos containers in order to stay very close to original temperature. The volume of food sent is determined by the number of participants, plus usually a few extras in case they are needed. Last week 103 persons were served at the community center and 10 shut ins had meals delivered to their homes.

The program does not charge for meals, however participants are encouraged to donate in order to help meet the expense.

### Cruising with Marine ROTC

Thomas Bright is participating in the summer cruise program identified with Marine ROTC Cadets beginning on July 17 off the West Coast. While based in San Diego, all ROTC cadets in the unit were aboard a submarine 3 days and 2 nights and Thomas had the great fun of steering the sub for about an hour.

Last week cadets were aboard surface vessels at Coronado Island and at Corpus Christi Naval Air Base later they will be aboard Naval and Marine Aircraft. Bright will arrive at home in late August before returning to VMI.
