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Good news in the state's crime prevention effort is the passage of a joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Texas constitution which would allow judges to deny bail to repeat offenders.

Considering that many crimes are committed by persons who are free on bail at the time of the offense, this appears to be an obvious way to reduce the number of crimes.

There are limits, of course, in accordance with honoring rights of the accused. For one thing an order denying bail must be issued within 7 days of a person's incarceration for the repeat offense, and it can be effective only for only 60 days. Also an appeal from an order denying bail must be given top priority by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The next step toward making this a good thing is a speed up of court action so that the case can be settled before the 60 days expires. In this way lots of criminals can be out of circulation from the date of arrest until the end of their sentence. Reducing the number of criminals to which the public is exposed will undoubtedly make a big difference.

Possibly this system could also have a desirable effect on criminals. The person who is free on bail would likely be more hesitant about repeating a crime when he knows there will be no bail following the next arrest.

With regard to lesser crimes as well as capital crimes, punishment is definitely a deterrent. The more likely the punishment the less frequent the crimes. Opponents of capital punishment deny that it would decrease capital crime, but abundant statistics say the opposite. Common sense also tells us that crime is less probable when punishment is more probable.

Good news on the energy front is a program being pushed by Senate Republicans as more productive than the program suggested by President Carter. Despite early fears of a trend to ultra liberalism in the legislature, there have been signs that common sense will make a stand when the chips are down. We saw it in rejection of the picketing hill. We have hopes of seeing it again in working out the energy problem.

The two plans agree in the matter of conservation. Both approve of insulation and both would offer tax incentive for its installation. Likewise both favor decreased consumption of gas and gasoline but their ways of achieving it are very different. Carter says increase the tax to discourage consumption, but he wants to keep the controls on prices the producers can charge. He does not want the oil industry to reap windfall profits.

The other side proposes an end to the price controls, thereby allowing the old economic law of supply and demand to establish fair and realistic prices. An important incentive to them is encouraging exploration and production, eventually accumulating a supply that matches the demand, and establishes realistic prices.

Conceivably oil companies can make lots of money that way, and they should be subject to "windfall profits tax", but only after allowance is made for their reinvestment of profits in finding and developing production. A good policy it seems, is to give the oil industry the green light. Let it do the job for us, and let it answer to IRS like any other business for its profits.

The energy solution also involves continued research in nuclear and solar energy. As regards the latter, the only concern is to develop efficient ways to collect and store it. The other, unfortunately is still delayed by fears of the unknown. Even though experience so far has been gratifying, Washington is cautious until it knows more about the atomic plants.

But possibilities are unlimited for the county's most abundant fuel coal. Experts conservatively estimate that it is sufficient to supply all our energy needs for at least the next few centuries. The only problem is transportation, and a good possibility in that respect is the coal slurry pipeline using water to

After that the school board will be ready to accept bids and hopefully get an early start on construction. It was indicated that local investors will have an opportunity to buy some of the bonds. Information will be available at Muenster State Bank.

City Gets \$2541 Sales Tax Rebate

The volume of Muenster business which is subject to state and city tax continues to run ahead of last year's, according to the latest remittance and report received by the city from Comptroller Bob Bullock.

The rebate check was in the amount of \$2,541.39 through the period ending May 6, 1977, as compared with \$2,001.00 for the corresponding period last year.

Bullock also reported that payments to the city to date this year are \$15,749.71, a 16 per cent increase over the \$13,496.60 received for the same period of 1976.

Muenster's check was one of 867 sent to Texas cities and towns that assess the 1 per cent tax. The total was \$22 million bringing total rebates for the 8 months of the current fiscal year to \$235.3 million over the same period of fiscal 76. This 23 per cent increase is somewhat misleading, May collections this time cover 5 weeks instead of the usual 4.

Rebates to other cities of this area and their percentage of change to date were reported as follows by the comptroller's office: Gainesville \$115,818.74, down 6%; Lindsay \$2,924.70, up 20%; Nocona \$4,835.17, no change; Pilot Point \$620.65, up 18%; Saint Jo \$627.00, up 14%; Sanger \$963.97, up 34%; Whitesboro \$1,365.99, up 8%.

A new lignite-fueled electric generating unit is in the final stages of testing, near Henderson, in East Texas, and when the unit is placed in commercial service, sometime in the next few weeks, Texas Power & Light Company's dependence on higher-priced natural gas for boiler fuel will be further reduced.

The new, 750,000-kilowatt unit, Martin Lake Number One, is owned by Texas Power & Light, Dallas Power & Light, and Texas Electric Service Company. TP&L will receive 60 percent of the electricity supplied by the new unit.

Three additional lignite-fueled units at Martin Lake are scheduled to be placed in service, respectively, in 1978, 1979, and 1983. Each of the units will also be of 750,000-kilowatt capacity. They will be the largest known lignite-fueled generating units in operation.

Texas Power & Light and its affiliates have previously placed four other lignite units on line. Two are the Big Brown units near Fairfield, which produce a total of 1,150,000-kilowatts. Two others are Monticello Units One and Two, near Mount Pleasant, which together produce 1,150,000-kilowatts.

Currently 40% of the electricity supplied to TP&L customers comes from lignite-fueled generating plants. By the end of 1978, the company expects to have more than 60 percent of its electricity generated from lignite.

All lignite plans are located in close proximity to large lignite deposits.
