Two down and one to go. Two years of war, and we hope this year will be the last. If the present status can be considered as a sign of coming events, the Nazi war machine will have given up the ghost long before next December and Nippon will be either knocked out or punch drunk.

Looking back at the two years we find ample cause for encouragement. Despite unpreparedness we exacted a heavy toll from the advancing enemy during the first rating became effective on Nov. year. We won the fight for the time and mustered adequate forces to launch the victory drive.

What has happened since clearly indicates the outcome. The axis driven out of Africa, Sicily and part of Italy. One axis partner knocked out of the war. Russia almost cleared of the invaders German industries and cities pounded to rubble. Rebels in occupied countries growing bolder. Morale in Germany beginning to totter. Strategic islands of the Pacific wrested from Japan.

That's progress, but it doesn't quite give the complete picture. The margin of supremacy which enables the allies to take the initiative continues to widen. We are outstripping the enemy in both quality and quantity of planes, guns, ships, tanks and other implements of war. At the same time we are keeping well ahead of our losses whereas in many cases the enemy is not. An advantage that will continue to grow in our favor. One that can grow fast enough to become decisive in a few

Let's hope for our sake - because every day of fighting increases our casualty toll - and for the sake of humanity in general that the powers in Germany, whether the Nazi party, the general staff, or any other group, will soon see the light of reason. There's no point in struggling through the many months to complete annihilation, but pig headedness would result in just

Another source of comfort on the second anniversary of our entry into the war: Our casualties have been fairly low. Much lower than during the shorter period of our participation in the first world to another camp. He had been on war. Thanks to fine leadership we have made progress with surpris- since his entry in the army in ingly little sacrifice of life. And thanks to medical genius and superb care we have succeeded in saving many whose wounds would have been fatal in previous wars. Americans can be eternally proud that their country practices what it preaches. Proclaiming every man's right to life, it makes every effort to save all the lives possible

According to Con's understanding of the Roosevelt, Churchill, Kai-Shek confab, the plan for Eastern Asia could be framed in the same slogan Japan has been using all along. "Asia for Asiatics." The difference lies in the implication. Japan meant "for the Nipponese breed of Asiatics to dominate and exploit" whereas our idea is an opportunity for the Asiatics to live in freedom, enjoying the greatest measure of comfort and prosperity their great continent can offer.

No doubt the Asiatics will be as happy over the decision as we are. To them this means relief from the opression of monkey faced militarists. To us it means the end of a growing threat to our national security. Pushed back to the confines of their own native land, and pulverized a little to boot, the Nips may learn the penalty of treachery and fanatic ambitions.

Present prospects do not mean however, that the time has come for us to start coasting. Just the opposite. Fight all the harder now that we have the enemy reeling. (Continued on page 8)

Farmers Must File Tax Statements By Dec. 15 Deadline

Farmers who have sufficient income to require filing a declaration of estimated 1943 income and Victory tax are required to file and make payment on or before December 15, unless they complied with this requirement on September 15, which applied to most other persons.

Farmers and others making their first report this time will not receive a declaration form, but Pvt Earl Walterscheid, who was must ask for it, if they do not

SELECTING SEED PEANUTS

Choosing seed should be given first thought in making plans to meet the large peanut acreage. Albert Brient, county agent, says that to obtain good stands and high yields only seed of good germination quality should be planted

The severe drought and extremely hot summer are responsible for a rather serious condition af-fecting peanut seed, especially in the principal commercial peanut growing areas of the state. Brient suggests that farmers who produc-ed nuts of good quality store at least enough for their own planting needs. Even in the drier areas, he added, some farmers produced a fair crop of a quality suitable for planting. Peanuts which are sound and not shriveled, and which grade well on the market, should have good germination. Regard-less, it will be well to have a germination test made before plant-

If too many farmers sell all of their peanuts now with the intention of buying planting seed next spring, Brient cautions that they may find it difficult to locate supplies of good seed. In that case they will have to take a chance on seed of inferior quality. Generally, this would be unfortunate for the grower because poor seed results in poor yields.

The Extension Service has been informed that on account of the large demand for meal, oil and edible peanuts, storage has been light this fall. Storage in previous years has been heavy.

Brient says that this condition makes it doubly important for farmers who produced good quality peanuts to store a supply for planting. They should be stored unshelled as peanuts in the shell retain germination better than shelled seed.
